Father Edward O'Dea, a native of this state, and well known in Portland, officiated as master of ceremonies at the Catholic Cathedral in that city in the celebration of high mass on Sunday. Father O'Dea passed through the public schools of that city and then went to Montreal Canada, where he completed his studies in an institute of the church.

The Yreka "Journal" says that a number of persons in that county are talking about going to Alaska in the spring, to prospect that country, where gold mines have lately been discovered. If a gold mining field were known to exist at the north pole, it would no doubt be soon explored, or even a rumor to that effect, with some foundation, would be effective in starting successful expeditions to reach the pole.

After an illness of about three weeks Henry Norton of Ashland breathed his last on Monday the 12th inst., and his remains were interred in the Ashland cemetery on the following day, the funeral being conducted by the A. O. U. W. Lodge at that place. Mr. Norton has been a resident of this valley since 1860, was respected by all who knew him and was about 38 years of age. He leaves a wife and four children to mourn his loss.

DOVEILL VS. GRISWOLD.—We are furnished full particulars of the sale of the Griswold property at Salem by the "Oregonian," and this is the result of the clean-up: The amount realized by the sale of the Griswold property at Salem on Wednesday, was as follows: Block B3, \$21,335; lot 1, block 47, \$30,000; total, \$51,335. Deducting from this for costs \$3788 20 leaves the net of \$47,546 80 which was divided equally between the United States and B. F. Dowell, giving each the snug sum of \$23,773 40. The property was sold subject to rights of dower, which means that if Mrs. Griswold outlives her husband she will receive one-third the rents of the property during her life time, if she can get it. The balance due on judgment against Griswold is \$15,025 19. Deducting traveling expenses, etc., from the amount received by Dowell, it leaves him about \$10,000 for about six years' labor, and he has earned every cent of the money. The Griswold block was purchased by H. D. P. Thompson and Hon. J. J. Murphy was the purchaser of the other block. B. F. Dowell will proceed to amuse himself in looking to secure the sale of the large brick building known as the agricultural works, formerly owned by Griswold, to liquidate that balance. If perseverance conquers he will likely carry this point.

The jail is in good condition, with the exception of the front door and floor of one cell, which has been damaged by prisoners. We lodged the patients in the hospital well lodged and fed.
