The "Statesman" is authority for
the statement that there is a well de-
fined case of smallpox in Marion
county 18 miles from Salem, and that
the neighborhood where the case is
considerably excited over the matter,
as quite a number of persons were ex-
posed to the disease before it was
known what was the matter.

bill: Oakland Cal., \$80,000; Wil-
mington, Cal., \$30,000; Yellowstone
river, \$10,000; Red river of the North,
\$10,000; entrance to Coos bay and
harbor, Or., \$20,000; entrance to Ya-
quina bay, Or., \$30,000; mouth of Co-
lumbia river, Or., \$750,000.

A Yreka dispatch of the 16th says:
James Short of Callahan's, aged 60
years, while in a rage yesterday, made
a murderous assault upon his son,
aged 20 years, with a butcher knife.
The boy dodged the blow, the knife
striking into the door casing. A com-
plaint for assault with intent to
murder was lodged against the father
and he is now in jail.

The Northern Pacific railroad com-
pany has let to J. B. Montgomery &
Co. the contract for constructing the
grade and the bridging of the link
between Portland and Kalama. Work
will begin immediately, and the con-
tract requires that it be finished Sep-
tember 1st. The company will lay the
iron. The line is thirty miles long,
and there will be three miles of side
track.

The Oregon Woman Suffrage As-
sociation has elected the following offi-
cers for the ensuing year: President
Mrs. H. A. Loughery; vice president,
Mrs. A. S. Dunaway; recording
secretary, Miss Mary Combs; cor-
responding secretary, Miss Anna
Feamster; treasurer, Mrs. E. Johnson.
All except the recording secretary
were re-elected, having held the same
positions last year.

Our American flag has been vindi-
cated again. At Chicago a week ago
they voted on three types of female
beauty represented by Miss Minnie Pal-
mer, an American, who got 31,291 votes;
Mrs. Langtry, the English beauty, who
got 15,279 votes and Miss Palmer's
colored maid, who is a negro beauty,
with 2,100. Again will the eagle flap
his wings and shout derision at the
lion and the unicorn.

A most distressing disaster occurred
in the coal mines near Bradwood, a
small mining village in Illinois, this
week. The mines occupy nearly a hun-
dred acres the greater part of which
has been worked out and abandoned.
Recent heavy rains had covered the
surrounding country with water when
the mine caved in and the helpless
miners were at the mercy of the flood.
The mines filled so rapidly that very
few who were in them at the time
were able to escape and between
seventy-five and eighty are supposed to
be drowned. None of the bodies have
yet been recovered.

MURDERED.—Dr. Hugh J. Glenn, a
half brother of Major James T. Glenn,
an old resident of Jackson county, and
the Democratic nominee for the office
of Governor of California four years
ago, was shot and killed by his former
bookkeeper at Jacinto Cal., on the
18th inst. The particulars are as fol-
lows: Miller shot Glenn with a shot-
gun, at a distance of about 60 feet, the
charge taking effect in the head. The
doctor is still alive, but his brain is
oozing from the wound and there is
little or no hope of recovery. Miller
refused to surrender until shot in the
knee by R. M. Cochran, Glenn's su-
perintendent, when he was arrested
and confined. The only cause yet
known for the shooting is that Miller
did not give satisfaction as a book-
keeper and was discharged the day be-
fore. A dispatch from Jacinto, says
Dr. Glenn died about 9 p. m. Miller,
now in jail for shooting Dr. Glenn, re-
fuses to say anything about the affair.
He says Cochran, who shot him in the
leg to make him surrender, did right.
Miller's leg is badly swollen, and very
painful. He was very much afraid of
a mob when he was lodged in jail. Mrs.
Miller, his wife, is terribly prostrated
with the news of the shooting, and is
very ill. No lady stands higher in
the estimation of the people, and she
has borne many trials with a fortitude
that has won for her the admiration
of all. Everybody sympathizes with
her and her family. A Willow dis-
patch says: Huron Miller, the man
who murdered Dr. Glenn, is about 55
years old and married. He was ad-
dicted to intemperance, which was the
cause of his discharge. Miller had
known Glenn intimately for many
years. Glenn started him in business,
but through dissipation Miller was un-
successful and was finally forced to
accept a menial situation at a nomi-
nal salary. Glenn found him in this
plight and gave him a situation as
bookkeeper. Monday Glenn found
Miller applied insolent language to his
benefactor, who at once discharged
him. Since his discharge, Miller has
been hanging around Jacinto under
pretext of hunting. It is now thought
he was only waiting an opportunity
to execute his terrible design.

TOWNS LICENSES.—Within the past
week, the Town Board of Ashland has
passed two ordinances of general in-
terest—one to license the selling of liquor
in quantities of one quart or more
within the town. The license is placed
at \$100 per year, and will not be in-
sued for a shorter period than 6 months.
The penalty for selling without such
license is from \$5 to \$200, in default
of which the person convicted is to be
imprisoned in the town jail. The other
ordinance requires business houses and
business men to pay license at the fol-
lowing rates per year: General mer-
chandise, \$40. Hardware stock, \$20.
Groceries and provisions, \$15. Hotel,
\$20. Boarding house (over 3 board-
ers), \$10. Livery stable, \$20. Drug
store, \$20. Harness stock, \$15. Restau-
rant, \$20. Confectionery, cigar or
variety store, \$10. Flouring mill,
\$10. Woolen mills, \$40. Furniture
store, \$12.50. Millinery stock, \$5.
Jewelry stock, \$10. Hall for rent,
\$10. Butcher shop, \$20. Commercial
traveler, \$5. Second hand store, \$10.
Stallion or jack, \$5. Meat peddler,
\$10. Auctioneer, \$10. The object of
the license is to raise revenue to meet
expenses of the town government—pay
marshal for night watching, street
lighting, etc. At present the night
watchman is paid by private contribu-
tions of business houses, and other ex-
penses have been met chiefly by the
direct property tax. A property tax
will hardly be needed now, unless for
some extensive public improvement, of
sidewalks or streets or something of
the kind.—"Tidings"

KILLED BY A FALLING TREE.—Frank
Hesley, who will be remembered in
Ashland as the one from whom the
ladies bought the saloon building on
Granite street, died recently at
Frank's place, near Spencer, on the
Linkville road, from the effects of in-
juries received on the 15th of January
last. On that day in felling a tree he
was caught and badly injured by some
of the limbs, and although he was given
surgical attention and care, he died
from the injuries on Wednesday, the
14th inst. He was in his 55th year
Anyone knowing the address of any

OREGON STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.—
This school was established at Mon-
mouth, Polk county, by the last leg-

better teachers for the public schools

six regular professors and teachers,
besides assistants, and the enrollment
of students is already over 100.
