EDITORIAL NOTES.

Gladstone has recovered his health and has returned home.

The bill to extend the time for the payment of tax on whiskey now in the bonded warehouses, died in the hands of the House.

Acting Governor, Jas. S. Boynton, of Georgia, has ordered a special election to be held April 14th, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Governor Stephens.

After the first of next May the tax on manufactured tobacco and snuff will be 8 cents per pound; on cigars \$3 per thousand and on cigarettes 50 cents per thousand.

Upon the resignation of Senator Davis, Senator Edmunds, of Vermont, was elected President pro tem. of the Senate. He is now by virtue of his office Vice-President of the United States.

Indiana comes to the front with the largest crop of would be Presidents of any other state in the Union. McDonald, Hendricks, Niblack and Harrison are the patriots who are ready to sacrifice four years of their life in the White House.

A London society for the suppression of blasphemous literature proposes to suppress the works of Huxley, Tyndall, Herbert Spencer, John Stuart Mill and John Morley. Why not try something practical? Take a pitcher of water and go up and put out the sun, for instance.

The proposed new charter for San Francisco was rejected by the people of that city by a majority of 32. The friends of the charter are much chagrined at this result, and declare that the charter was defeated by fraud. There is a prospect that the election will be contested.

Three hundred women are soon to leave Ireland for New Hampshire to work in a cotton factory. That is a practical way of settling the Irish question so far as they are concerned. No more starvation for those women, when once they touch the shore of Uncle Sam's country.

The flood along the lower Mississippi is still increasing and the scenes so recently familiar to the people along the Ohio are being repeated only on a smaller scale. Though the river is still slowly rising it is believed to have almost reached its highest point unless reinforced by additional rains.

The dead lock in the Michigan Senatorial struggle has at last ended and Mr. Thomas W. Palmer has been elected Senator from that state. Mr. Palmer has very little political reputation but his excellent character and sterling worth give promise of good work in the new field to which he has been called. This seems to be an "old" year for the prominent politicians.

The river and harbor bill as passed by the House, appropriated the following items to Oregon: Coos Bay, \$20,000; Yaquina, \$30,000; Locks at the Cascades, \$125,000; Lower Willamette and Columbia, \$40,000; Coquille, \$7,000; mouth of the Columbia river, \$7,000. The bill, however failed to pass the Senate. It might be well for those papers that have been standing on tip toe and vociferously demanding to know what Representative George has done, to paste this item in their hats.

England has made a demand on the United States for the extradition of Sheridan who, it is alleged, was implicated in the Phoenix Park murders. It is contrary to the policy of this government, to grant extradition for political offenses; but if it can be satisfactorily shown, that Sheridan was implicated in the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, England's demand will no doubt be granted. A similar demand has also been made on France for one Byrne upon the same grounds.

The law increasing the pension of one-armed and one-legged soldiers from 24 to 30 dollars a month, and of one-handed and one-footed soldiers from 18 to 25 dollars per month, is now in effect. The commissioner of pensions, has issued a circular, requesting all persons entitled to the benefit of the new law, to forward their pension certificates to him, and he will issue new ones calling for the proper increase. No new proof is required and all that is necessary is, to forward the certificate.

The Nebraska legislature proposes to break up the associated press monopoly. A law has just been passed by that august assembly which provides that telegraph companies doing business in that state, shall deliver news dispatches to anybody who will pay for them. If Nebraska was an independent government, such a law might be enforced provided the constitution was not so strong enough, but the trouble with such laws in this country is that there is a national constitution.

A Remarkable Man.

One of the most remarkable careers of any man of this generation is that of Judah P. Benjamin. It will be remembered that he was the Secretary of State of the Southern Confederacy. Just before the capture of Richmond, Mr. Benjamin and Jeff Davis left the city together and fled from the approaching army. Davis, however, went to meet his wife and fell into the hands of the Union soldiers. Hearing of this, Benjamin assumed the guise of a farmer and thus made good his escape to the Gulf coast. Procuring a small boat, he coasted along as far as Key West. Here he secured a small sailboat and put out to sea. The Gulf stream carried him far out into the ocean, his boat became unmanageable, and he found himself one hundred miles from land with only three men to assist him in the management of the boat, and a very small store of provisions for their subsistence. In this extremity he was almost ready to yield up the ghost, when a fortunate change of the wind carried him to the Bahama Islands. From here he made his way to London where he arrived in September, 1865. In June following he was admitted to the bar. As might be supposed practice came to him very slowly at first, and for two years he maintained himself by writing editorial for the London newspapers. In 1868 a new widely known and well recognized authority among courts and lawyers. From that time his practice increased with a rapidity that was truly astonishing. He has since amassed a large fortune, as the fruits of his practice, and a short time since retired from the bar. Though now over 70 years of age Mr. Benjamin is in excellent health and the vigor of his faculties remain entirely unimpaired. The career of this remarkable man at the English bar is the source of much satisfaction to the people of the whole country and particularly of the south, and furnishes another illustration of the truth of the old saying that "truth is stranger than fiction."

New system of Telegraphy.

A new telegraph company has established a line from New York to Cleveland, and by the use of some new appliances has succeeded in achieving results heretofore unknown in the science of telegraphy. It is estimated that, by this new method, three thousand words, per minute can be transmitted, and that two wires, worked according to the new system, will accomplish as much as sixty, operated in the old way. The company uses a compound wire, which consists of very fine steel, covered with copper. It uses a new method of sending dispatches which enables this to be done with exceeding rapidity, as well as a new system, called the Gray harmonic system, by which one wire is enabled to do as much work as eight or ten ordinary wires. Every dispatch, as delivered, is a perfect fac simile of the hand writing of the original dispatch. If the new system, employed by this company, is found practical, it will add another long chapter to the wonders of electricity, and ought to effect a radical reduction in the price of telegraphic communication.

Bills That Did Not Pass.

The following are some of the principal measures before the 47th Congress which failed to become laws: A bill for the admission of Washington Territory, as a state and also one for the admission of Dakota. A bill to establish a postal saving depository; to limit the coinage of silver, suspend the issue of silver certificates, and provide for the issue of gold certificates. To establish a uniform system of bankruptcy; to incorporate the Nicaragua canal company; to prevent political assessments; to pension survivors of the Mexican and Indian wars. A bill providing who shall perform the duties of President in case of the inability of both President and Vice-President; for the relief of Fitz John Porter. Also the bill to place General Grant on the retired list and the one to increase the amount paid land grant railroads for conveying mails. A great many private bills and bills of minor importance met a well deserved death.

The Senate tariff bill was passed on the last day of the late Congress and is now a law. Although this bill is by no means entirely satisfactory to every interest affected by it, yet it is admitted on all hands to be a vast improvement upon the present law. The fact that it was passed by a Republican Congress, is sufficient to call down Democratic denunciations long and loud, but the country will consider the bill fairly, and in the light of all the difficulties which surrounded its passage. If the next Congress, which will be largely Democratic, can do better, the country will remember them accordingly.

THE NORTHWEST OF 1883.

The prospects of the great Northwest never presented a more favorable aspect than are indicated at this time. The Northern Pacific road will unite us with the East before another six months are passed; the Oregon and California will extend to near the State line and embrace a large extent of country heretofore isolated from market, while the O. R. & N. Co's road will reach Baker City in the Southeastern part of the State, which will add to the trade of the metropolis two valleys, rich in products, minerals and extensive stock ranges, besides the various other extensions which are being projected. These enterprises are employing thousands of men, and distributing millions of dollars in money. Along the lines of the roads, improvements are everywhere noted by the increased population in the towns and the settlement of the surrounding country. The completion of the Northern Pacific road will bring to the Northwest thousands of people and add millions of permanent wealth. The farmers will find a ready and profitable market for all their products. There is no surplus wheat to carry over, and stock of every character is not in excess of present demands, and will not meet the wants of the immigration which will arrive next Fall. Those who arrive after the completion of the railroads, will be consumers of the products, as well as the thousands of men who will be employed in other occupations. For the farmers, if we have a favorable Spring so as to enable them to reseed their frozen ground, which is now indicated, we predict a most profitable year; while for the towns, we see no reason why they should not keep pace with the advances made in the country. So far as Portland is concerned, and we include East Portland as well as Albina—the prospects are more than flattering. Every branch of industry must of necessity be profitable this Summer. The supply of capital is equal to the demand, and there has never been a year when there was so much improvement made as now contemplated. Thousands of people will be employed in various occupations, who will use their earnings here, and of the millions of dollars which will be paid out for labor, material etc., much will find its permanent home in Portland, and throughout the State. Property of every character is steadily advancing, and as its demand is increased, will continue to do so. It is the boom which the great Northwest has been looking for, and which is due to superior inducements presented to the people who come here. The climate and productiveness of soil all attract the seekers to this promising country, which within the past two years has drawn so much public attention. While we are not inclined to reflect on the probable progress of any part of the Pacific Coast, it must now be an admitted fact that the Northwest is the center of attraction and will in time become the great section of export and import from every part of the Pacific Coast as well as Europe.—"Standard."

Alexander H. Stephens.

Alex. H. Stephens is dead. In one respect, at least, he was truly the most remarkable man of his age. He has been an invalid for more than fifty years, yet despite this, he has accomplished results, far beyond the reach of most men who are blessed with a sound body, and good digestion. In spite of infirmities that would have prostrated almost any other man, he has, by the force of an indomitable will, kept a conspicuous place in American politics. In the main, his political principles were contrary to the spirit of this government; and his teachings, though in themselves moderated by his own innate honesty, and tempered somewhat by his high sense of duty, yet still contained that germ of political heresy which, in the hands of less honest and more selfish men, seeks the entire destruction of the Union. He was born in 1812, and entered political life at the age of twenty-four. He was first elected to Congress in 1843, and held his seat in that body until 1853, when he voluntarily retired. Upon the approach of the civil war, he endeavored to maintain a middle course, by opposing the policy of secession, yet still claiming, as he always claimed, the right of secession. In 1861, he was elected vice president of the Southern Confederacy, which position he held until the Southern Confederacy ceased to exist. After the re-entrance of Georgia and its restoration to the Union, he was again elected to Congress where he remained continuously until last year, when he was elected governor of his State by a large majority. In his own state, Mr. Stephens was always very popular, and was never defeated for any office to which he aspired.
