EDITORIAL NOTES.

John McCullough, the tragedian is seriously ill at Cleveland Ohio.

The Tennessee Legislature has passed a bill abolishing public execution in that state.

The question of permitting cremation in Pennsylvania, is now before the Legislature of that state.

The Cincinnati Relief Committee has expended nearly \$400,000 for the relief of sufferers by the recent floods in Ohio.

The Missouri Legislature has refused to submit a prohibition amendment to a vote of the people of that state.

The bill authorizing the city of San Francisco to issue bonds to defray the expenses of municipal government, has been signed by the governor.

Tilden is being brought forward as a Presidential candidate. If the sage of Grover, should conclude to foreclose his mortgage on the Democratic party, he will no doubt be afforded the privilege of being again defeated.

The Chinese government is adopting every measure in their power to drive Americans from that country. Burdensome and annoying restrictions are placed on their business, and new enterprises are entirely prohibited if undertaken by Americans.

A few days ago, the "News" devoted a half column of its first page to the details of a brutal and disgraceful prize fight between a couple of Pennsylvania-bullies. Spring poetry or a St. Jacobs Oil advertisement would be a vast improvement upon such disgusting trash.

A Spokane Indian claims that he died and went to Heaven, and the Great Spirit told him that Wiggins was a fraud; and sent him back to tell this to the rest of his tribe. If that Indian shouldn't get back to Heaven again, Wiggins will have another sin to answer for.

The Forty-eighth Congress will meet the first Monday in next December. The Senate will be composed of 36 Democrats, and 2 Readjusters. The Readjusters will probably act with the Republicans on all important questions. The House will consist of 120 Democrats, and 20 Readjusters. There are now two vacancies in the House.

The official paper of the Northern Pacific Railway Company is making an effort to change the name of "Mount Rainier" to its original Indian name of "Mount Tacoma." Hereafter the latter name will be the one used in the guide book and other publications of the Northern Pacific and the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company. The name "Rainier" was given to this peak as a compliment to an English admiral who never saw the mountain.

A great deal has been said about the relative value of "pluck" and "luck." Pluck is generally rated much higher than luck, and some writers insist that an ounce of the former is worth several tons of the latter. That may be very well for popular lectures and school compositions, but if any young man, while battling with this ungenerous old world, strikes a vein of good luck the best thing he can do is to locate a claim and go to work without stopping to calculate its exact value in pluck.

John S. Gray, Secretary of the Board of Harbor Commissioners at San Francisco, has absconded, leaving a deficit in his accounts of about \$50,000. Some over inquisitive people are disposed to ask, what the members of the board of Commissioners were doing while their Secretary was fixing up the books, and getting away with the money. His defalcations cover a period of several months; and the irregularities occurring during that time were, or should have been, known to the board, and if known, were certainly sufficient to induce an investigation. If Bank examiners, Board of Trustees, and Commissioners, would give a little more attention to their business, and not leave the whole of the affairs of which they are intrusted to their cashiers, or clerks, or secretaries, there would be a great decrease in the number of those of this character.

THE COMING THOUSANDS.

Early in the year as it is, telegrams from San Francisco and other points on the line of travel between this city and the East announce the coming of thousands of strangers; a most extraordinary flow of emigration to the Northwest. To Portland, which is the gateway to the half a dozen inland empires here in the Northwest, this emigration means an unparalleled business activity and prosperity. To the empires about us it means the addition of a material strength given to this new country in the tens of thousands of stout arms and willing hearts coming to swell the army of laborers and craftsmen. It means the opening up of farms, the establishment of new industries, the building of new homes, and towns and cities. It means the development of the vast resources of the Northwest: advantage taken of the constantly-recurring surprises which here come forward to contribute to man's welfare. One sentence in a recent telegram attracts attention, viz: "most of the settlers arriving here en route to Portland are practical farmers." Implementing with advantage discipline is what we most desire. Men are wanted who will occupy and cultivate the land. And laborers are needed too. The fact is that in the Northwest laborers need have no fear about getting employment, for at the present time there is work enough for ten times as many men as are here to perform it. The development of new railway interests and the steady, increased business activity make labor abundant. There is no reason why an honest, able bodied man should loiter around Portland or any other town or city in the country. "Northwest News."

The "Springfield Republican" is not satisfied with Ben. Butler's administration as Governor of Massachusetts. Almost all the papers of that State are indulging in pretty pointed criticism of Butler, but the Republican is especially severe. Here is what it has to say: "Gov. Butler, who 'blowed' at North Easton about his readiness to 'devote every hour, every thought, every energy, every exertion, every quality of mind that I possess' to the commonwealth, has spent six days this week at Washington, partly as an attorney before the secretary of the treasury in behalf of an illicit distiller of whisky who has been caught by the revenue officers. Since his inauguration he has had law business twice at Washington, once or more in Rhode Island, to say nothing of New Hampshire and New York. He has also sent in a veto message, which able lawyers say is totally mistaken in its view of the law. As the veto message was dated and delivered February 26th, two days after Gov. Butler who had left the state, and when Lieut. Gov. Ames was acting governor, it is doubtful if it has any effect, and Richard Olney has advised his clients that they are already incorporated. 'Whenever the chair of the government shall be vacant by reason of his death, or absence from the commonwealth,' says the constitution, the lieutenant governor shall, 'during such vacancy,' perform the duties. The responsibility for the date, 'February 26th,' is thrown on the governor's clerk."

Germany has been indulging in some rather unfriendly legislation toward this country recently. Some time ago the German government intimated its intention to prohibit the importation of American pork; for the alleged reason that it was diseased. Before any definite action was taken in the matter, however, this government requested Germany to appoint a commission to inquire into the healthfulness of American pork. That government paid no attention to the request, and enacted a law prohibiting the importation of pork from this country. The people of this country are disposed to regard this as a decidedly unfriendly act, and there is a strong probability that the next Congress will give Germany the benefit of a little retaliatory legislation. Our imports from that country are sufficient to make such legislation entirely feasible.

During the census year there were 1,447,983 babies in the United States. There were more persons of 70 years than there were persons of 61 years. Those of 80 years outnumbered those of 70. The males outnumbered the females by about a million. One-sixth of the population is of foreign birth. The population has doubled since 1850. The population of cities has quadrupled. There were 7,670,493 people engaged in agriculture, 4,074,238 in the various professions, 1,810,256 in trade and transportation and 3,837,112 in manufacturing.

WHISKY AMENDMENTS IN OHIO.

The constitution of Ohio, as it now stands, forbids the issuance of license for the sale of liquors. It is hard to tell from this, whether the men who made the constitution of that state were in favor of free whisky, or whether they occupied the high moral ground that the liquor traffic was such a gigantic evil that the state had no moral right to reap a revenue for its indulgence and could not therefore grant license for that purpose. Many people—not from Ohio—are disposed to accept the free whisky theory; but native Buckeyes are ready to back the high moral hypothesis and they have all the probabilities on their side at least. For whatever reason the provision was placed in the constitution of Ohio it is there, and that fact has been a source of much anxiety to Ohio politicians. The Legislature now proposes to settle the whisky question so far as the state constitution can settle it, by submitting to the people two amendments; one prohibiting the sale of liquor, and the other authorizing the license system. The people of Ohio will thus be afforded an opportunity to solve the question in any one of three ways: defeat both amendments and leave the matter as it is, adopt the license system and regulate the traffic, or accepted the prohibition amendment and make a mess of the whole business. It is impossible to surmise with any certainty, what the voters of Ohio will decide on this question, but they have a fair chance to be heard on all sides of the matter and they ought to settle it to suit them this time.

Eight o'clock.

There are a few parents in Jacksonville who need to be reminded that there is a town ordinance now in force, which prohibits boys and girls, under eighteen years of age, from being on the streets after eight o'clock at night, unless accompanied by a parent or guardian, or unless occupied in the performance of some errand authorized by a parent or guardian. The Marshal is especially charged with the duty of attending to the enforcement of this ordinance, and he is obliged to arrest any person, whom he has reason to believe is violating it; and unless a reasonable and sufficient excuse be furnished to him showing that such person had a right, under said Ordinance, to be upon the streets, the Marshal shall take him in custody and make complaint before the Recorder. If the offender is found guilty of a violation of this ordinance, he shall be fined in any sum not more than ten dollars and in default of payment thereof, be imprisoned in the town jail not more than ten days. It would be well for parents to see that their children are at home before eight o'clock.

The new tariff and revenue bill makes only a very small reduction in the tariff on wool. Under the old law, the rate on No. 1 raw wool, valued at the last port whence exported at 32 cents or less per pound, was 10 cents per pound and 11 per cent. "ad valorem; valued over 32 cents, 12 cents per pound and 10 per cent.; on No. 2 wool, valued at 32 cents or less, 10 cents per pound and 10 per cent.; on No. 3, valued at 12 cents or less, 3 cents per pound, and valued over 12 cents, 6 cents per pound. Under the new law, on No. 1 wool, valued as above at 30 cents, or less per pound, the duty is 10 cents per pound; if valued exceeding 30 cents, 12 cents per pound; No. 2, valued at 30 cents, or less, 10 cents per pound; if over 30 cents 12 cents per pound; No. 3, valued at 12 cents, or less, 2 1/2 cents per pound; if over 12 cents, 5 cents per pound. Washed wool is subject to twice and scoured wool to three times the above duty. The wool growers have no great reason to complain of the reduction effected by the new bill.

The Legislature of New York has passed a bill compelling all telegraph and telephone wires to be placed underground after March 1st, 1883.

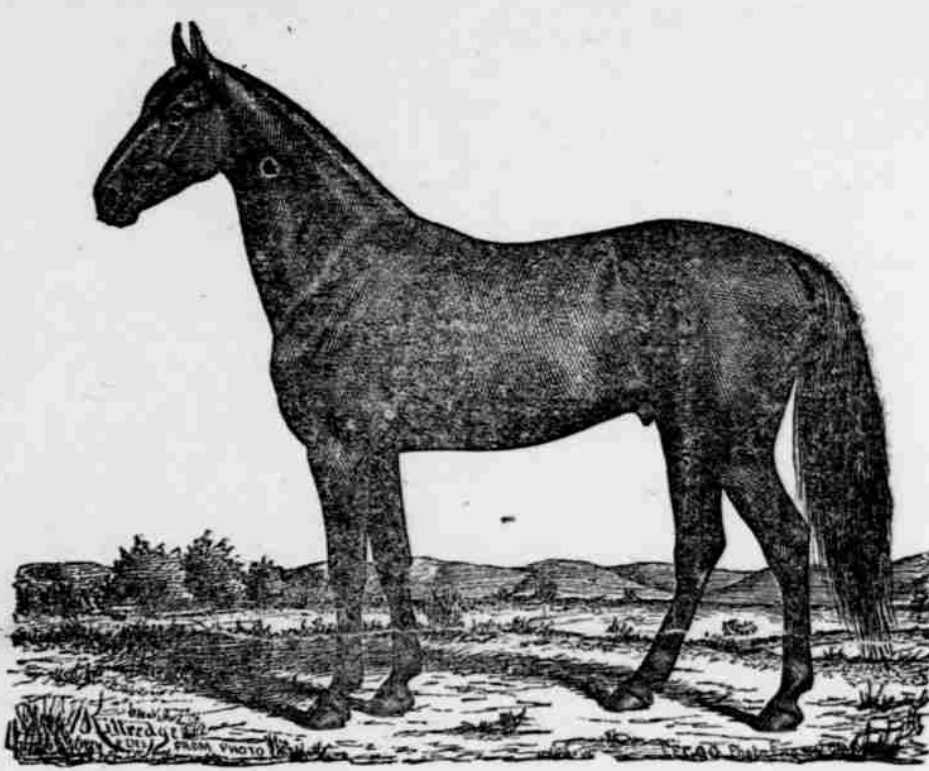
