THE FIRST CASE.—The first case tried in Klamath county was that of Hazen vs. Hazen. S. N. Hazen, the plaintiff, came and alleged a variety of shortcomings and weaknesses on the part of his undutiful spouse. In fact, he presented a whole section of reasons why the fickle goddess of love had winged her eternal flight, and left his hearthstone desolate and bare. And now comes the complained of dame, and charges her lord with divers and sundry shortcomings on his part, and besought the court on her account, to cancel the matrimonial contract and compel the said plaintiff to pay unto her the said defendant, a part of the coin which constituted his earthly possessions. The upshot of all this was that his Honor Judge Hanna, harked unto the prayer of the defendant and dismissed the plaintiff's complaint upon good and sufficient grounds, and granted the defendant one hundred and fifty dollars but no divorce. So ended the first case in Klamath county.

KELLY VS. RUBLE.—This much litigated case has recently been given considerable prominence by the publication of a paragraph in the "Oregonian." We have no disposition to discuss the merits of either side of this case, or to advertise our individual preference in the matter. The item above referred to however, contains a suggestion of unfairness toward our circuit Judge which, had the matter been thoroughly understood by the "Oregonian," we are sure would never have appeared. Judge Hanna's action in the case, it is needless to say, is governed entirely by the facts presented and the law as he understands it, and by nothing else. There is nothing very strange, or unusual in the fact that Judge Hanna's interpretation of the law is not in harmony with that of the supreme court. This is an every day occurrence in courts. The drift of public opinion in this community, though it may have set strongly in favor of Kelly, has had nothing whatever to do in forming the opinion of Judge Hanna. Whatever may be the final outcome of this case, it is to be hoped that it will not be made the occasion of any more so insinuating paragraphs as that which appeared in the "Oregonian." Let the case be fairly tried and determined by the courts; not by the newspapers.

A company has been organized at Washington to cut a ship canal from St. Johns river, 20 miles above Jacksonville, Fla., to a point on the Suwanee river, on the Gulf of Mexico. The estimated cost of the work is \$30,000,000, and \$26,000,000 of it is already subscribed. The canal will be about 100 miles long and deep enough to float the largest steamers from the ocean to the gulf. It is expected to be under contract by September and to be completed in 3 years.
