EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Czar of all the Russias has been crowned at last.

The Pennsylvania legislature has passed a bill prohibiting political assessments.

Chief Justice Waite is on his way to the Pacific Coast. He will probably visit this state during his trip.

The main tent of Barnum's great circus was burned in Chicago this week. The loss including tent, wardrobe &c. amounts to about \$60,000.

Fifty members of the Texas legislature have been indicted for gambling. The next day after the indictments were returned an enterprising thief broke into the county clerk's office and stole them. They were probably wanted as campaign documents for the next election.

The collection of religious cranks called the "Salvation Army" came to grief, in New Haven Conn. recently. The army was assailed by a mob and the whole forces put to rout. The police refused to interfere and the sympathy of the people seem about equally divided between the contending forces.

The frost which destroyed young fruit in western Oregon did not extend so far south as the Rogue river valley, and the fruit crop there will be the largest for years. Apples and peaches, particularly, promise well. The O. & C. R. R. will have advanced to within thirty miles of Jacksonville by August, so that fruit may easily be shipped to us from there. Douglas county is now supplying this market with strawberries, and later in the season Jackson county will send us apples and peaches. The "Oregonian" says it's a fine thing to have prosperous neighbors.

The insane patients at East Portland will be moved on the 4th of next September, if the new building at Salem can be made ready by that time. It is the intention of the Board to have everything ready for the reception of the State patients by that time. It will be even necessary to have everything in readiness before the patients can be moved into their new quarters, even the victuals cooked and on the table, the rooms furnished complete in every particular. As many of the insane are helpless, humanity requires that everything that it is possible to be done to ameliorate the suffering of those unfortunate persons should be done, of which there are perhaps none more cognizant than the present Board and attending physicians.

The Pittsburg "Dispatch" tells of an upright judge in Alleghany county, Pa., White by name. It seems that the judge went fishing in the Ohio river for jack salmon recently, under the belief that jack salmon were in season. Owing to the inherent perversity of the finny tribe, a fine black bass persisted in impaling itself on the judge's hook, regardless of the fact that it was violating the law in allowing itself to be caught before the 1st of June. When Judge White's attention was called to the matter, he vindicated the law by promptly appearing before himself and pleading guilty to a violation of the game law. The judge then proceeded to fine himself \$10, but in view of the fact that this was supposed to be the first offense, he remitted the costs. He escaped the disagreeable necessity of committing himself until the fine was paid by promptly paying to himself, as the court.

Word comes to us, says the Roseburg "Independent," of an attempt on the part of some youths to blow up a score or more of school children in one of the rural districts. The road hands had been using giant powder near the school house to clear the public road of obstructions, and left some powder in a can on the works. Some three or four boys belonging to the school, perhaps more thoughtless than wicked, succeeded in putting a large blast in the road, where a large number of the little children had to pass in going to their homes, and when school was dismissed in the evening ran to their fuse, intending an explosion when the children should arrive at this point of danger. Luckily for all concerned, the fuse failed to burn as readily as expected, when the modern Guy Fawkes, the leader of the plot, seeing from his ambush the scholars pass in safety, returned to see what had caused his failure, when the blast exploded, tearing off a piece of the youth's cheek and nose. The pedagogue in charge, learning of the attempt to injure the little children, ferreted out the plotters and administered to the young conspirators a chastisement, which it is to be hoped will make them more thoughtful for the safety of others.

FOREIGN PARENTAGE.

One of the most curious and interesting articles in the volumes containing a compendium of the tenth census, just published, presents a statement of the number of persons in the United States whose parents, one or both, are of foreign nativity. The total is a prodigious one, enormously exceeding the number who constitute what is usually called "the foreign element" in the United States. In round numbers there were, in 1880, four and a half millions of persons in the United States, native born, who had fathers and mothers of Irish birth; nearly five millions whose fathers and mothers were born in Germany; two millions whose parents were natives of England and Scotland; one million who had British American, and above half a million who had Scandinavian fathers and mothers. The whole number of persons in the United States in 1880 having one or both parents foreign born was nearly fifteen millions. Add to this multitude born of parents of foreign nativity the whole number of persons of foreign birth in the United States in 1880, and we get a total of 21,633,937 of the 50, 155,783 inhabitants which the country then contained.

Over two fifths of our population then are persons of foreign birth, or the offspring of parents born in foreign lands. With these people families are usually much larger than among those distinctively and wholly American. The census figures show plainly enough that without the large and steady introduction of the foreign stock we should make very slow national progress, if indeed, we made any at all. But in a generation or two the foreign stock becomes so far Americanized that it increases but slowly, and hence the proportion of persons of foreign birth, or born of foreign parents, is still maintained.

But it is singular to note how rapid, notwithstanding this vast influx of foreign blood, the assimilation is. Children of foreign parents, born in the United States, become Americans with wonderful facility of adaption. Most of them, long before they grow up, are indistinguishable from those whose ancestry runs back in a long American line. Our public school system does much towards producing this result, and the active interest which all classes take in public affairs contributes powerfully to the same end. In many cases even those persons who were men and women before they came to America adapt themselves with an easy flexibility to the customs of American life. If reading and writing come by nature, as the profound Dogberry stated, it comes by nature also to or to become an American citizen. Otherwise our country, great as it is, would soon swallow more than it could digest, and there would be many eruptions as gross as those of the gorged Cyclops of Virgilian fable.

The Roseburg and Coos Bay Railroad.

A special dispatch to the "Oregonian" in reference to this enterprise says: Captain Besse who returned from the north several days ago, where he had been in the interest of eastern capitalists, to report upon the project of building a road from Roseburg to Coos Bay, has completed his report and will submit it to the parties interested on his arrival in Boston. It is understood from private sources that the report is favorable, and that the road will be commenced as soon as the preliminaries are arranged. A gentleman who is conversant with the plan of the projectors says capital has been subscribed and nothing remains but to complete certain transfers. It is expected that the whole matter will be settled during the present month, and that in a comparatively short time work will be commenced in earnest. Final surveys will be made and the road permanently located as soon as possible.

Postmaster General Gresham, among the other reforms he has inaugurated, has issued an order that first and second class postmasters shall attend personally to the duties of their offices.

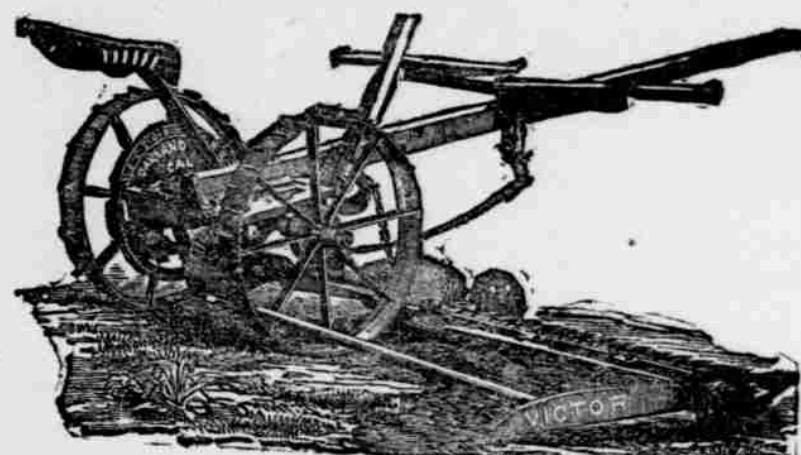
