EADLY OUT OF JOINT.

The evening "Telegram" comprises into a few short paragraphs, published under the above caption, matters well worth the attention of all the producers of the northwest. In reprinting these paragraphs we desire to impress as far as possible upon our agricultural producers the necessity of greater variety and abundance of production. Consumption of all sorts of food products has vastly increased but the supply has not increased with it. The "Telegram" says.

This is a fruit country, but it is producing only as much fruit as its uses required ten years ago.

It is a potato country, but the potato product has not increased with the increased consumption.

It is a dairy country, but there has been no increase in the production of butter to correspond with the larger demand.

It is a cattle country, but the heads have diminished rather than increased under a demand hitherto unknown, and beef is as high here as in New York.

We might run through the whole list of products with similar results.

Nothing is abundant but wheat. Farmers have a craze about wheat and grow it at a loss, to the neglect of far more profitable crops.

No note has been taken by them of the enormously increased demand in this city and at all the towns of Oregon and Washington for fruits, vegetables, meats, eggs and dairy products, and in consequence we have the dear old market in the United States for every article of food except flour only.

No country can produce all these things better than our own. The profit of producing them at prices much less than those now prevailing will still be very large. Neglect to produce them is the greatest drawback the country now suffers. What is the use of talking about the need of starting manufacturing enterprises when in a country so well fitted for agricultural products we don't even raise our own peas and potatoes and eggs command 40 to 50 cents a dozen.

Land Frauds in the Northwest.

Washington, Sept. 22. The commissioner of the general land office said today, in regard to timber land frauds discovered in California: "I have had knowledge of these operations for some time, and have had agents out there making an investigation. In consequence of reports received from them I have suspended action upon all timber land cases in California, Oregon and Washington territory. Persons interested are not getting any patents, and they will not get any until I am satisfied as to the honesty of their entries." In explanation of the nature of their illegal operations Commissioner McFarland said: "Congress, by special act, provided for the sale to individuals of separate tracts of timber land in California, Oregon and Washington territory. In the procurement by one person of a large number of such tracts through co-operation with others, who purchased them only to transfer them to him, is a clear violation of the spirit of the law."

The complete returns to the General Land Office of public lands disposed of during the fiscal year ending June 30th show that 19,035,683 acres were taken up in that time, an increase of more than 5,000,000 acres over the total for the previous year. Of the aggregate amount, 8,171,194 were taken up under the Homestead Act, 3,101,553 under the Timber Culture Act, and the remainder by cash sales and other means. Dakota leads the list of States and Territories with a total of 7,317,398 acres disposed of. Minnesota comes next with 1,414,489, followed closely by Nebraska and Kansas.

Delos Bratt, who lived at the mouth of Beaver creek on the Klamath, has been missing since last Spring. At that time it was rightly conjectured that he had strayed into the mountains and became lost and a fruitless search was made for him in all directions by relatives, friends and neighbors. His remains were found one day last week by some parties who were out hunting on the top of the Siskiyou mountains. They were lying under or near an old log, on which his son and son-in-law had seated themselves to rest while searching for him last Spring, and were identified by the clothing and boots. It is supposed that Mr. Bratt was lost in the storm, and had wandered around until he became exhausted and lay down in the snow and went to sleep and perished.—"Yreka Union."

Our Naval Force.

The New York "Herald" has the following editorial on the American Navy in a late issue: "On the eastern and western shores of the Pacific ocean in South America and in Asia, there happens to be a call for a display of naval force by our country as a reasonable safeguard for American residents in China, and at the same time in Peru. There is imminence of war between France and China, and the riots which have already occurred in Canton have announced Chinese antipathy towards residents of every foreign nationality. It is characteristic of the lower orders of Chinese to display this enmity whenever their country is embroiled with any foreign power. Very important American interests are at stake in half a dozen great Chinese ports. The prejudices against our people, which persecution of the Chinese in California and anti-Chinese legislation at Washington have intensified, not to speak of other considerations, require a powerful naval representation of our country, in the event of any great field of military and commercial commotion. These all demand immediate reinforcement of our Asiatic squadron."

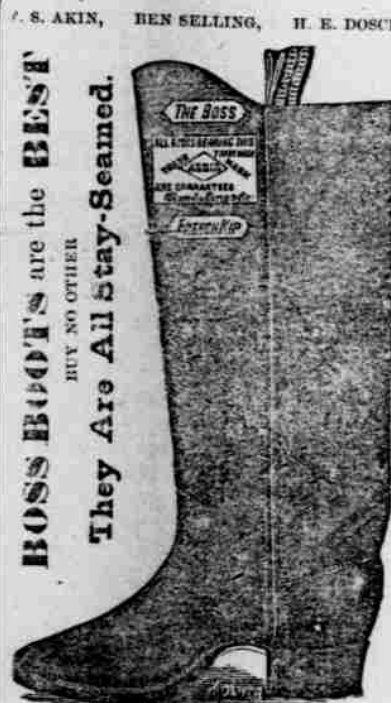

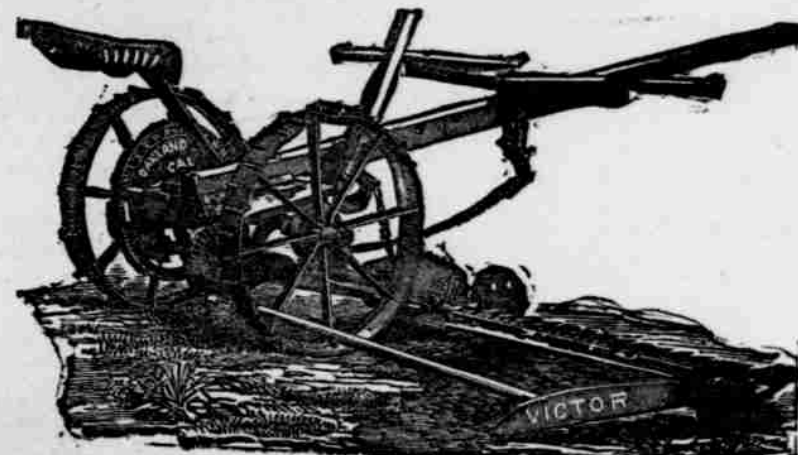
