EDITORIAL NOTES.

The democrats have made a canvass of Ohio by congressional districts by which it is shown that they have had a majority. The two Cincinnati districts are credited with 5,000 democratic majority to produce the result, and other districts are similarly gerrymandered. The estimate is also said to give the republicans all conceded points.

For the information of our readers the prices of tickets over the Northern Pacific railroad are given: From Portland to Chicago, first class \$114, second class \$84, third class \$54; Portland to Boston \$136.15, second class \$102, third class \$73; Portland to New York \$137.25, second class \$101, third class \$71; Portland to St. Paul, Minn., \$100, second class \$75, third class \$50. The above is the rate for tickets only.

Archbishop Seghers has been called to Rome. He is accompanied by Father Heglebos, of New Tacoma, and Messrs. Burri, Sindon and Thomas, who will enter a Montreal college and study for the priesthood. The object of the Bishop's call to the vatican could not be learned, but it is thought to have been occasioned by the papal discussion of either one of the three subjects—the Irish question, Catholicism in the United States, or the public school question.

A circular has just been issued, which directs as follows: "Officers taking testimony in timber land cases must require the witnesses to testify as to the actual character of the soil, and to state whether or not it would be suitable for cultivation by ordinary farming process, if cleared of its timber, and whether the land is broken rugged or mountainous, or otherwise; whether it would pay to clear it for farming purposes, and whether it has any value for grazing purposes or for the water there may be thereon."

Charles Wallace, of Missouri, is a wonderful marksman, and in his exploits he is ably seconded by his wife. She will, at a distance of 125 feet, hold a ten-cent piece between her lips, and her husband will knock it out of her mouth every time without harm. This is regarded as the most difficult shot ever made, and it has been done many times. A common tack is placed on a white surface, point toward him, and he will drive a bullet on the tack's point nine times out of ten; and he will stand 100 yards away, holding a ten-cent piece between his fingers, which his wife will shoot out with a revolver. A special from New York says—"After having seen Tilden and studied his methods of doing business, I am well convinced that he is as capable now of enduring a canvass as in 1879. It is reported that he will leave New York this week on the Yosemite, for the south, going as far as Rio Janeiro. Tilden's movements are watched with the keenest interest by New York politicians. Notwithstanding Dana's persistent assurance that he will not accept the democratic nomination for President, democrats in New York, particularly the county democracy, have the nerve to assert that the old man is playing persistently and assiduously for the great prize. Dana keeps insisting that Tilden is not a candidate, mainly because he is one himself, and working to have Tilden throw his influence to him. Watterson is now hard at work for McDonald, but he would be delighted with a ticket made up of Tilden and McDonald."

The following official statement has been issued by the Northern Pacific railroad company: "The complete mileage of the Northern Pacific railroad and branches is as follows: Main line, including the line from St. Paul to Sauk Rapids, 1954 miles; branch lines, 446 miles. Total bonded indebtedness, main line, \$39,529,200; add to bonded indebtedness outstanding dividends and script, \$4,640,821; and excess of expenditures over proceeds of bonds (for which funding arrangements have been made), \$8,000,000; total, \$52,163,021; bonded indebtedness of branch lines, 446 miles at \$20,000 per mile, \$8,920,000, upon which interest does not accrue for eighteen months to two years; the estimated earnings for the twelve months from September 1883, are \$15,000,000, the expenses, including rentals and taxes, will be 60 per cent—\$9,000,000; remainder, \$6,000,000. The interest on fixed charges, as above viz, 6 per cent on \$52,163,021, is \$3,129,781; surplus, \$2,870,219. The interest on \$34,522,200 on bonds was provided for two years in the proceeds of the sale of the bonds."

STATE UNIVERSITY.

The State University at Eugene City opened last week with an attendance of 160 pupils the first day. The "Statesman" says the school is under the control of President Johnson, Professors Condon, Bailey, Straub, Collier, Lambert and Mrs. Spiller, and Tutors Burke and Woodcock.

President Johnson is a self-made man. He went from Corvallis to Yale, where he graduated with honors, having paid his way by money earned by himself. He has been a teacher about 25 years. President Johnson is a devout member of the Baptist Church. Rev. Thomas Condon is a graduate of a leading seminary of New York, and was for many years a minister of the Congregational Church. He has the best cabinet and is the best naturalist and geologist on this coast. He was formerly president of the Pacific University at Forest Grove. Prof. Bailey is also entitled to be called revered, being an ordained Baptist minister. He is a graduate of Brown University; is a natural mathematician, and his lectures on astronomy are highly appreciative and scientific. He is such a lover of study that he spends his summer vacation in working all the problems in the newly published edition of calculus and mathematical astronomy. He was formerly president of the McMinville college. Prof. Straub is a German born American. He graduated in one of the leading universities of Pennsylvania. Language is his specialty. The best beer-guzzled sauerkraut fed scholar Germany can send out can't get ahead of him in German, and in French he converses as fluently as if he had been born in France and drank wine all his life. He is also an expert in Latin, Greek and Hebrew, and added to these accomplishments, he is a first-class photographer. He was serving as a short hand reporter in the courts of Philadelphia, when his health failed him and he came to Oregon. Prof. Collier has an interesting history. He educated himself and saw tougher times than the average Oregon student sees. He and ex-Gov. Gibbs "bached" in the attic of the first Normal School of New York, (and the U. S. too) taking care of recitation rooms to earn money to buy their bread. They both graduated from that institution in the same class. Prof. Collier then came to Ohio and entered Oberlin, at the same time teaching in the preparatory department. He was there four or five years and finished the course. He was afterwards president of a university in which Mrs. James A. Garfield (then unmarried) was principal of the preparatory department. He has been Professor of Natural History in the Pacific University since, and also chemist in the medical department of the Willamette University when it was located at Salem. He now teaches chemistry and mechanics. He is second to none in popularity with his pupils.

The prospectus of A. G. Walling's proposed history of Southern Oregon has been handed us. The literary work, in the hands of Mr. H. O. Lang, a writer of ability and experience and a gentleman who is acquainted with the work of such an enterprise, having been identified with many similar undertakings, will be a model. In the whole compilation of the work thoroughness, correctness and excellence will be the paramount objects, without regard to expense. The territory will soon be canvassed for minor details and subscriptions for the work, and no one is too poor to subscribe for a work which treats of his own country and himself or pioneer parents. We expect the work will receive the encouragement of all our people, and we heartily commend the gentlemen interested in its completion to everyone in this section, whose support in this enterprise they merit.

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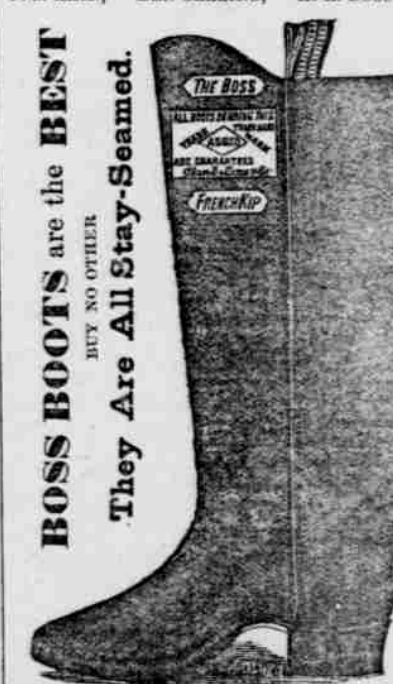

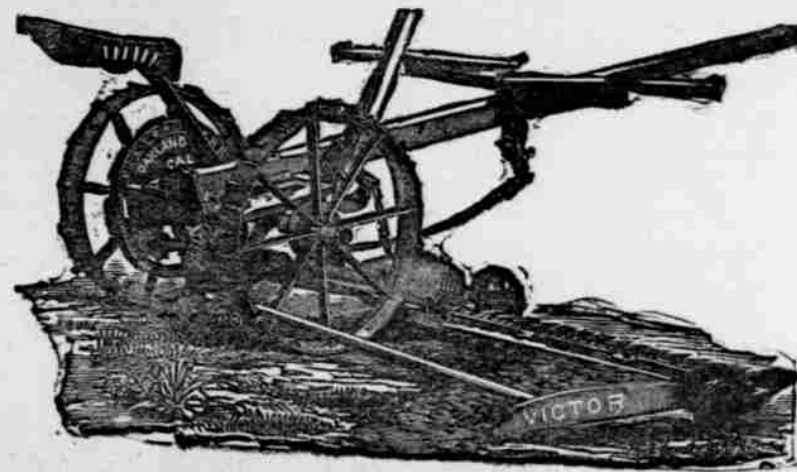

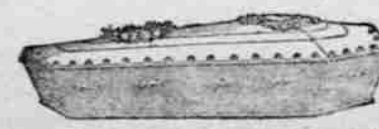
