EDITORIAL NOTES.

It is estimated that there are seventeen thousand dentists in this country who use a million of gold yearly in filling their victim's teeth.

Harper's "Weekly" says: The Democratic party seeks power simply to seize the spoils. "Turn the rascal out, means only give the rascal a chance."

Republicans are not despondent over the Eastern elections. Democrats take hats on off years and the Republicans accept them back when the President is to be elected.

Ben Rutler has not yet accepted the Greenback nomination for governor of Massachusetts, but there is not the slightest possibility of his declining. An ice-house two will burn down from spontaneous combustion before Benjamin lets go of that tiger-cat's tail.

New Tacoma, the "future of great" Washington territory, already has forty lawyers, the total population being but 3,500. The local paper says each one of the forty came with the idea that he was to be the principal man in the territory, and in due time a United States Senator.

Ex-Senator McDonald, a prominent Democratic candidate for the Presidential nomination, was asked what he thought of the Ohio election, frankly confessed he did not regard it as an assurance of a Democratic victory in 1884. Local factors entered into it that could not be calculated on next year.

The statement is made that Conkling and Blaine have adjusted their differences, Conkling promising to vote New York at the next national convention, in return for Blaine's support in securing the former's return to the Senate. The statement is denied by intimate friends of Conkling, who say they hate each other.

Mr. Vennor, the Canadian weather-"guesser," prognosticates that the coming winter "will be warm open and wet, with little or no snow during the close of the year. The winter will be an exceptional one, with severe storms on the lakes." Professor Richard Mansill, the Rock Island weather forecaster, says of the coming December that "the temperature will average above the mean of the season. It will be rather a pleasant winter month, with a few sharp storms, producing heavy snows in the far north and a few heavy rains in the central and southern states."

Jennie June said before the Senate labor committee: "Work is infinitely more important to a woman than vote. The great trouble with the women of America is that they have not been, and are not, brought up to work for pay. A woman is compelled to work at sewing at thirty cents a day because she does not know how to sew. If she did, good wages as dressmakers and tailors are at a command because there is a good field and very few to fill it, and those few are women who have been educated to work. The washwoman receives \$1.25 per day, because she knows how to wash. The whole truth is a lack of industrial education in the common school system."

It has been alleged that in 1842 the fastest time made by a trotting horse was 2:30, in a single instance. Prof. W. H. Bremen, starting from that point, has prepared a table showing speed that has been achieved. During the decade following 1843, the number of horses that had trotted a mile in 2:30, or better, had increased to fourteen; in 1863, there were fifty nine; in 1873, 376, and by the close of the season of 1882, there were 1648. The table further shows that up to 1882, 495 horses had trotted a mile in 2:25, or better; 275 in 2:23, or better; 156 in 2:21, or better; sixty in 2:18, or better; eighteen in 2:17, or better, and eight in 2:15 or better. It would seem that the limit of equine endurance had been very nearly reached.

Mr. Robinson, the Republican candidate for Governor of Massachusetts, has defined his position on the question of prohibition with commendable clearness. He says that in his opinion the present local option "is all that the people will enforce, is of little effect in any State." The present law in Massachusetts gives any town the power to adopt a prohibitory law for itself by a majority of its citizens, and experience has shown that this is as far as a State can wisely go in the matter. Sweeping prohibitory enactments which public sentiment does sustain have been designated as "legislation by hurricane" by so uncompromising a teetotaler as John Bright, and the class of temperance advocates who still insist upon them or nothing grows smaller every year. There are assurances that they are fewer than ever in Massachusetts this year, and that consequently General Butler's assistance from that quarter will be perceptibly diminished.

CORRESPONDENCE.

WOODVILLE Or., Oct 9, 1883. Our old friend, Mr. John P. The pile driver is at work on the foundation for Evans creek bridge. Jarrett's force is at Rock Point. E. W. H.

Correspondents of our northern exchanges furnish the following: The end of the track at the O. & C. R. R. front has reached a point 95 miles south of Roseburg, and four miles the other side of Grant's Pass. Several high trestles are under construction between the end of the track and Grant's Pass, and the road will likely be opened to the latter point by the middle of next month. Between Grant's Pass and Rock Point, 17 miles beyond, a large force is engaged, and, except one deep cut at Bloody run, this portion of the grade will be finished within two weeks. There is also a large force this side of Rogue river, and this week advance graders will be well up toward Ashland. Prospects are fair of having the line opened for traffic to Ashland by the middle of February. The weather throughout the season has been favorable, and fall rains thus far have not interfered with operations. Progress on the main Siskiyou tunnel has been satisfactory, work being pushed from both ends. This week's report shows a perforation of 203 feet at the north end and 84 feet at the south end, with a heading of 115 feet beyond. The rock is rapidly improving and it is believed that timbering will be no longer necessary.

Work on the California end of the railroad is not progressing very rapidly, but the Yreka "Journal" thinks it will be more substantial than the Oregon road. The masonry, bridge, tunnel and trestle work will be continued right along during the winter, so that the grading can be rushed ahead rapidly during next summer, by putting on a large force of men, who can work to advantage on the entire route.

Besides selling the R. R. right-of-way at the Oregon boundary, for the sum of one dollar, Rufus Cole has also sold over 37 acres to the C. P. R. R. Co., at nearly \$10 an acre, which indicates the building of a round house, shops and other works, at that point, which has evidently been decided upon as the place of junction with the Oregon branch. "Journal."

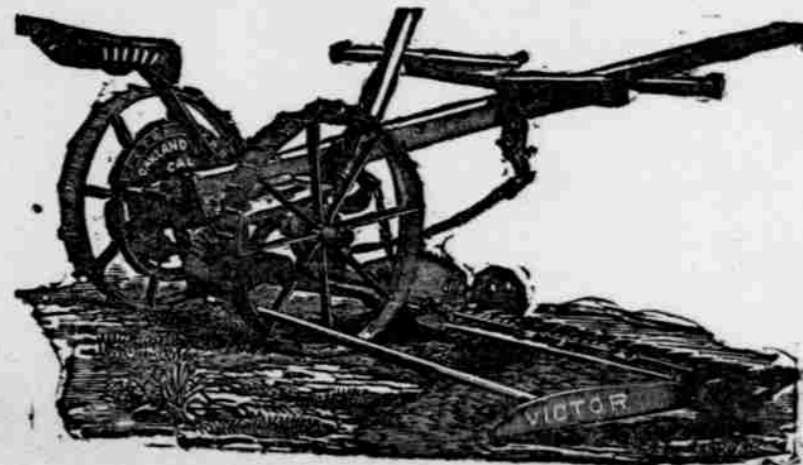
