It has been alleged that in 1842 the fastest time nade by a trotting horse was 2:30, in a single instance. Prof. W. H. Bremen, starting from that point, has prepared a table showing speed that has been achieved. During the decade following 1843, the number of horses that had trotted a mile in 2:30, or better, had increased to fourteen; in 1863, there were fifty nine; in 1873, 376, and by the close of the season of 1882, there were 1648. The table further shows that up to 1882, 495 horses had trottel a mile in 2:25, or better: 275 in 2:23, or better; 156 in 2:21, or better; sixty in 2:18, or better; eighteen in 2:17, or better, and eight in 2:15 or better. It would seem that the limit of equine endurance had been very nearly reached.
