Teachers Institute.

CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK.

Ways and means. 1—Lectures and talks. 2—Questions and answers. 3—Diagrams and notes. 4—Class exercises for illustration. 5—General discussions. 6—Query box. 7—Critics work.

The subject, "school records," was then presented by Prof. Royal, the discussion being continued by President Van Scoy, Supt. Colvig, Rev. B. J. Sharp and others. The discussion, "daily duties of the teacher," was opened by Jasper Hall who presented a variety of methods for the teacher's work during the temporary organization of the school, the discussion being acknowledged by Messrs. Colvig, Willits, Royal, McElroy and Miss Woolen. Song by the class. On motion the following critics were appointed: L. F. Willits and Belle Woolen. The institute adjourned until 1:30 p.m. Afternoon session. The institute opened promptly at 1:30 o'clock at which time the discussion, reading and methods of teaching, was opened by Prof. M. G. Royal. The second section of this discussion, "reading in advanced grades," was opened by Supt. W. M. Colvig, who gave some practical examples of several well known styles now in use. Followed by Supt. McElroy who presented the following points: pronunciation, emphasis, inflection, pitch, force, rate, quality of voice and pauses. A few requisites in teaching, an interesting essay, was then read by Miss Belle Woolen. Song by the class. "Methods of recitation" by President Van Scoy. The following points were discussed: As to particulars depends, 1st, the age of the pupil, 2d on advancement of pupils; 3rd, on routine of branches. English grammar—Class work by Prof. L. F. Willits who gave some practical methods of teaching this branch in conjunction with a recitation from one of his classes from the Ashland public school. The subject of penmanship was presented by O. A. Preston. Song by the class. Following by modern methods of teaching the blind by Mr. Kinzie. Institute adjourned at 7:30 p.m. Evening session. At an early hour the College Hall was crowded with a large audience of citizens of Ashland and vicinity. Solo, "The Bridge" by Prof. Royal. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Sharp. "The relation of education to society," an excellent address was then given by Rev. Mr. Clyde of Ashland. Song by the choir, followed by an instructive and interesting address, "character and learning," by President Van Scoy of the Willamette University. Institute adjourned until 9 a.m. Thursday.

Thursday Oct. 25, morning session. Exercises of the day commenced with a song by the class, after which prayer offered by Mr. Utick of Ashland. Officer's report by L. F. Willits read and considered. The query box opened and the following questions submitted for discussion—"Should teachers keep their whips in sight of pupils?" "How can neatness best be taught in the school-room?" "How many words in the English language ending in cion?" What motives and incentives to study ought to be applied to?" was ably presented by M. Yoder. Pres. Van Scoy, Rev. Mr. Clyde, Supt. Colvig and Prof. Royal each took part in the discussion of this subject. "Should prizes be offered as incentives to study?" by Robt. A. Gray—followed by Pres. Van Scoy Misses Della Pennelaker Belle Woolen and Supt. Colvig—following this Supt. McElroy spoke upon the topic "Organization and grading of district schools—outlining a programme of daily exercises &c. &c. Class work—methods of teaching written arithmetic, subject introduced by L. F. Willits assisted by one of the classes from the Ashland public school. Song by the choir. Orthography—methods of teaching by Robt. A. Gray. Pres. Van Scoy in treating the subject gave a highly interesting class exercise in written spelling. Class work continued by Prof. M. G. Royal, assisted by one of the college classes. Exercises in geography—including globe work diagramming &c. were replete with useful instruction. Typical methods of teaching geography was ably discussed by Miss Maggie Sargent and Mr. Jasper Hall. Select reading "Some pedagogic errors" by Mrs. L. F. Willits. Song by the choir. School hygiene—Dr. J. H. Chittenden, this subject was debated at some length by Supt. Colvig Prof. Van Scoy, Mr. Yoder Supt. McElroy Rev. Mr. Clyde and others. Methods of teaching natural history" by Prof. Royal was very interesting. "Methods of class-work" and "Self preparation of teacher by Pres. Van Scoy might be considered one of the most useful discussions of the institute. Closely connected with the subject arose a debate on the question of "Pupils taking books home at night," the following took part, Pres. Van Scoy, Prof. Royal and Willits and Miss M. G. Royal. "What practical uses can be made of newspapers in the public schools?" Subject opened by M. Yoder continued by Supt. Colvig Pres. Van Scoy L. F. Willits and Supt. McElroy. On motion the following committee on resolutions were appointed.

Messrs. Colvig, Hall, Willits. Misses Mattie Russ II, Belle Woolen.

Evening session Thursday Oct. 25.

Literary and musical entertainment opened at 7:30, when the following programme was given:

Overture—By the Ashland Orchestra and Band, under the leadership of Prof. J. S. Hume. Quartette—By Miss Pennelaker Miss Fox, and Miss Royal and McElroy. Reading—"Rum's Mania" by Jasper Hall.

At the conclusion of the entertainment the following resolutions were read and adopted:

EDITORIAL NOTES.

During the nine months ending September 30, 4,244 miles of main track were added to the railroads of the United States. This is only about half what was accomplished during the same period of last year.

The "Oregonian" truly says the thing that is the matter with the Pacific northwest is this, namely, it has little productive industry, even in agriculture. Its redemption from this condition depends on the rapidity with which its resources are developed—that is, in the growth and activity of its productive industry.

By reference to the assessments statement of this county for the present year, the amount of taxable property will be found to be \$2,345,085 as against \$2,463,283 for last year. Thus showing a difference against us, for this year of \$118,198. With the increased expenses of the year, we predict a worst deficit. Something wrong somewhere—"Enterprise."

The democratic plurality was reduced in the Ohio election from 19,115 at the last previous election to 9,893. A repetition of that kind of gain next year would not be wholly ruinous to the Republican party, though it thinks it can do better. Judge Hoody's election is by a plurality which falls 10,000 short of being a majority of the votes cast for Governor.

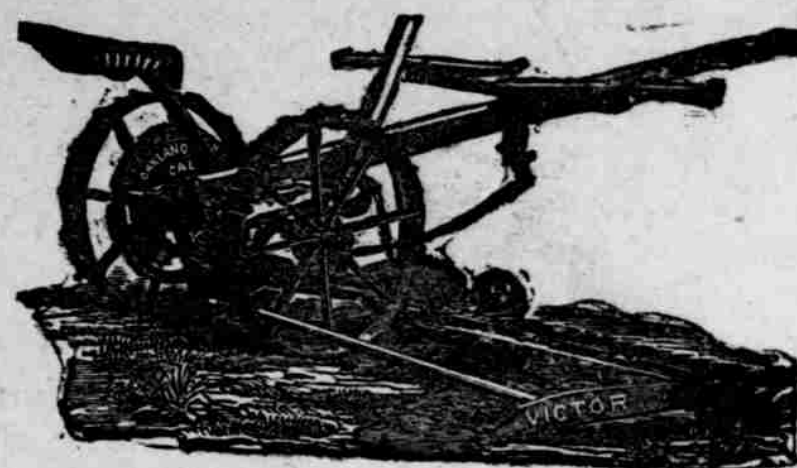
