

H. W. Scott, editor of the "Oregonian" has gone to Chicago to attend the bedside of his son, who is dangerously ill.

The 48th Congress was organized on the 3rd inst., by the election of Carlisle Speaker of the House, by a vote of 191, to 112 for Keifer, with five scattering votes.

On Wednesday the U. S. Circuit court returned a verdict in favor of Boyle for \$1,000 to solace him for the whipping he received at the hands of the Astoria vigilantes last July.

Justice Field of the supreme court, has sustained Judge Deady's decision granting to Wells Fargo and Co. an injunction to prevent the O. R. and N. and O. and C. companies from ousting their express from the trains and steamers.

Mr. Tilden was for Samuel J. Randall for speaker, and it should be definitely understood that the Democrat who opposes Mr. Tilden's wishes at this time will have to scratch along without a postoffice after Mr. Tilden is elected to the Presidency again.

From all the talk we hear about the physical condition of Tilden, Cleveland, Hendricks, Hancock, Seymour, English, and other ambitious statesmen, we feel warranted in predicting that the next national democratic convention will partake largely of the nature of a fat stock show.

It is now reported that Samuel J. Tilden has for years contemplated donating his large library to the city of New York, which will include Gramercy Park house. The property is estimated to be worth not less than \$1,000,000, and the library is the most extensive private library in the country.

A correspondent says Mr. Blaine will aim to be absolutely impartial in his new book; no friends are to be applauded, no enemies pilloried in it. It is to be judicial and calm in its tone, and he means to make it "the greatest effort of his life." He declared to a correspondent that he no longer longed for the hurly-burly of political life again. He has "dropped out of it so easily and completely that he can look back upon the past twenty years as a sort of Vanity Fair of which he was a part." The correspondent adds that if there is a tinge of the partisan in Mr. Blaine, he was unable to discover it.

A carefully written article was published recently in the New York "Times," showing that woman suffrage had been a failure in Wyoming. It is now reported that this article has caused "profound indignation" in Cheyenne, where women are not looked upon with favor as office-holders, they are valued as voters. We are not interested in the fact that Cheyenne is indignation. What we want is the facts. If woman suffrage has been a success in that territory, if it has made politics purer, reduced the number of grogeries and improved the social condition of the community, by all means let its advocates furnish the proof. What we want is facts, not indignation.

Wallace Sweet of Florence, Lane county, writes to the "Oregonian" claiming for his county the honor of having the oldest pioneer in Oregon. He says: "G. B. Garnier arrived in Oregon on the 1st day of October, 1820. He is personally acquainted with Mr. Gober, Marion county's old pioneer. He is hale and hearty and his memory is good. Mr. Gober, he well remembers, came to Oregon two years after he arrived. Mr. Garnier was born June 24, 1801, and now lives in a remote part of Lane county." It must make the '49ers feel like immigrants of '42 and '43 no more than young men, to hear of the real pioneers. Until further returns are in Lane county carries the broom.

One day last week there were two loads of deer meat brought to town and sold in our streets. The owner being notified that the game law had gone into effect and that he was liable under the same he mildly answered that it was all doe meat offered and that the law allowed him to kill does until the first of January. The necks of some of the does offered being some what swollen the attention of the hunter was called to that fact, but no argument whatever could convince him that they were bucks. The wisdom that prompted our legislators to allow the does to be killed two months later than the bucks cannot be comprehended by us; the does appear to us to require the most protection in order to prevent their entire extermination.

Mr. Blaine has developed a plan for getting rid of the taxes collected on spirits and malt liquors, which will doubtless be well considered by the incoming congress. It is to distribute the receipts among the States in proportion to population. Strictly speaking, Blaine is not the originator of the plan, but his endorsement of it will make it popular. The Logan scheme was about the same, and there was another one broached to give these receipts to the States for educational purposes. Blaine's plan is simply to give them to the States unconditionally each State to do what it may seem fit with its share. Thus Virginia might use her share to pay her debt, North Carolina and Tennessee the same, Louisiana might apply hers to the improvement of the Mississippi, and California hers to the improvement of the Sacramento and San Joaquin, or to the lessening of the State taxes. These receipts, Mr. Blaine says, aggregated \$86,000,000 the last fiscal year. That is about \$1 70 per capita. The majority of the States will probably be tempted to accept this plan. If they are the tax on spirits and malt liquors will be retained, and that will end the clamor for tariff reduction, for all the revenue collected under the existing tariff, with all the resources from other taxes, will be required to carry on the Government.—"Chronicle."

Senator Miller's Alaska Bill.

Senator Miller will introduce a bill in the Senate this week, to provide civil government for Alaska. Section 1 provides that Alaska shall be a civil and judicial district. Section 2 provides for the establishment of a district court and the appointment of a district judge, to perform also the duties of governor, ex-officio, and see that the laws are executed. Section 3 provides for the appointment of a clerk of the court, who shall also be treasurer of the district, and ex-officio registrar and recorder of the land office at Sitka, and recorder of deeds and registrar of wills for the territory. Section 4 provides for the appointment of five commissioners, who shall reside, one at Wrangell, one at Sitka, one at Ounahaska, and one at Kodiak. They shall act as justices of the peace, notaries public, etc. Section 5 provides for the appointment of a United States district attorney, who shall also be ex-officio surveyor general of the territory. Section 6 makes the collector of customs for the district ex-officio marshal. He is given power to appoint five deputy marshals. The general laws of Oregon, civil and criminal, so far as applicable, are made the laws of Alaska.
