Bills introduced by Slater.

Senator Slater of Oregon introduced in the Senate yesterday a bill for the relief of the State, providing that she be paid \$257,109, her quota for the direct tax laid under the law of August 5, 1861; also, a bill for the relief of citizens of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana who served in the Nez Perces war providing that the soldiers get \$3 per diem and the injured and disabled receive a pension; also, a bill fixing the price for lands in Bitter Root valley, M. T., within the limit of the Northern Pacific grant at \$1 25 per acre; also, a bill requiring the Commissioner of the land office to state the account between the United States and Oregon for 5 per cent. of the minimum price of the public lands now included within the borders of all the Indian reservations in the State and directing the Secretary of the Treasury to pay the same; also, an old bill conferring upon the orphan of settlers in the territory of Oregon prior to the year 1855, who did not obtain land, right to pre-empt an equivalent amount to which their parents would have been entitled.

It is officially announced that Henry Villard has resigned the Presidency of the Oregon Transcontinental and the Oregon Railway and Navigation companies, and that W. Endicott Jr. of Boston succeeds him as President of the Oregon Transcontinental Company and T. Jefferson Coolidge of Boston as President of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company. Coolidge will also enter the Oregon Transcontinental Board of Directors. The reason assigned for the resignation of Villard is that he says he became impressed with the conviction that it would not be proper for him to continue President of all the companies, whose management he has heretofore directed, after the completion of the Northern Pacific. Villard some weeks ago urgently pressed Endicott to accept the Presidency of the Oregon Transcontinental. Although nothing official is known, it is understood that an effort is making to dispose of Villard, and that he retires from the Presidency of the Northern Pacific Company in January, to be succeeded by Frederick Billings, with Oakes as Vice President and general manager.

Wm. Endicott, Jr., of Boston, who succeeds to the Presidency of the Oregon and Transcontinental, is the head of the Boston support of Mr. Villard and has long been his personal friend. He is a director of the Oregon and Transcontinental, Co. of the Oregon Railway and Navigation and of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy companies. He is also a member of the firm of C. F. Hovey & Co., and is a director of several Boston banks—in short, one of the solid men of Boston. Since the organization of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company he has been its third largest stockholder, being ranked only by Mr. Villard and Mr. W. S. Ladd of Portland. He visited Oregon three years ago, in company with Mr. Villard, and looked the country over thoroughly. It may be of interest, that he has been a leader in the anti-Butler movement in Massachusetts. T. Jefferson Coolidge, the new President of the O. R. and N. Co., is also a well known capitalist of Boston. He is interested in the manufacture of cotton, and treasurer of a prominent cotton mill. He has been a large holder of Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe stock and was for a short time President of that company. What his relations to the O. R. and N. Co. have been we are not informed. He is said, however, to be a backer of Villard, and the friends of the latter here claim that his election, and that of Endicott as well, means a continuation of the Villard policy.

This is how the Redding "Free Press" comments on a recent episode of that village:

The Judicial Dramatic Company played to a crowded house in Shasta Tuesday. The farce, entitled "Trial by Jury," was an interesting one, and the actors gave a splendid representation of how a man can commit a foul murder, and through the machinations of the law, garbled testimony and general incompetency, escape the just desert of his crime. The play was founded on fact.

Senator Dolph, of Oregon, and Representative Henley, of California, and Cassidy, of Nevada, constitute the subcommittee of the Pacific coast delegation, to construct a bill that will remedy the defects in the Chinese Restriction law.

Secretary Folger has designated Portland, Oregon, and Port Townsend, W. T. ports at which important merchandise can be shipped in bond for transit through the United States and from the British possessions.

There are bells of high and low degree; the bell of Moscow, that is noted for its great size, and the Independence Bell that rang out liberty to this great land. We have church bells that call us to the house of God, dinner bells that call us to our meals. But of all the bells, the City Bell of the town of Jacksonville is the most lonely. I visited it recently for the purpose of an interview. I asked the bell to give me its history, and it answered as follows: "I was born in the land of the rising Sun. A short time after I was born, the venerable City Fathers, ordered that I report at the Town Hall in Jacksonville. With high hopes and expectations I left the land of my birth, to enter the sphere of my usefulness in a far off Sunset land. I crossed the snowy mountains, I rode upon the raging billows, and came very near being lost at sea. But I arrived safe and in good order at my destination. I was unpacked, and commented upon. They said I was a cheap bell, and a good bell. This made me happy, for I then believed my days of usefulness had arrived. But you can imagine my disgust when I was set aside, and have not since been noticed. I set here day after day on these cold rocks, and cannot say a word. I listen at each meeting of the venerable Fathers, but not a word is said of me. If I was on top of this hall my voice would be heard through all the land. I would ring out the curfew each night, and warn the gay and festive young hoodlums, that it was time to seek the parental roof. I would warn the good people of the fire fiend; and when the sun arose on Christmas morn I would proclaim joy to the town. But here I sit from day to day a useless mass of matter, of no use to the world, and I wish I was dissolved back again into the elements." The bell ceased to speak. I left it in gloomy grief, sighing for things that could be and are not.

Here is a cue for the temperance folks. It is now said that beef tea is supplanting whisky as a beverage in Omaha. A barkeeper said a few days ago to a reporter who inquired into the matter: "At first we laughed at the idea of going to the trouble of making it, but now we laugh because we do make it. We sell over 100 drinks per day, and as it is a 15 cent drink there is no reason why we should not smile. Who drinks it, do you say? Why, everybody; the man about town who has been out with the boys comes in here in the morning and calls for beef tea; the business man comes in the afternoon and braces his system with beef tea; the temperance man who drops in with a blushing friend takes beef tea; and, in fact, everybody is becoming a slave to it."

A movement is being made in Ohio favoring compulsory education, the State to furnish school books. We say amen to the proposition, and wish it were the law of the land. Every child between the age of six or seven, and eighteen, not idiots, should be compelled to attend public school at least six months in each year, and at public expense.

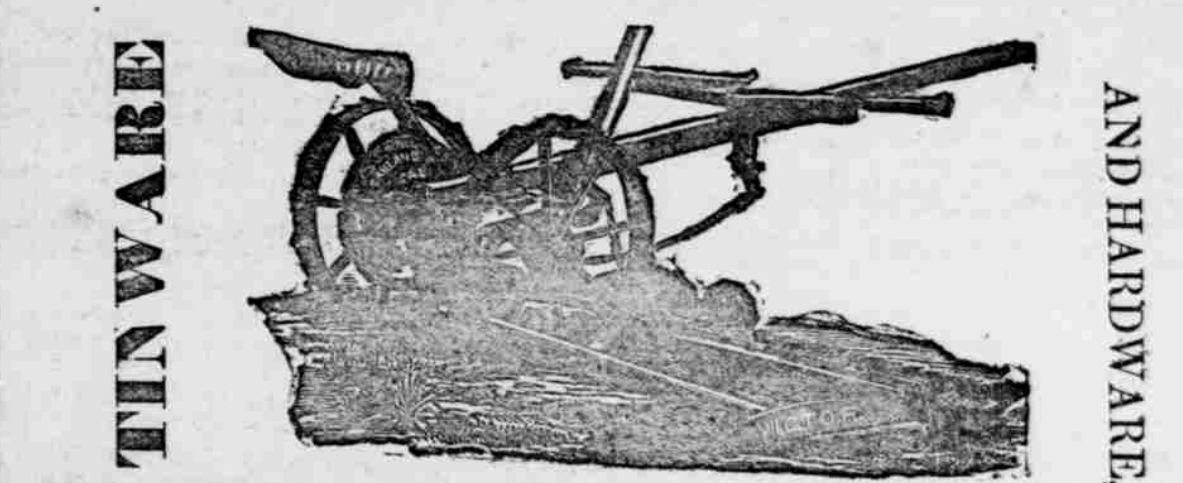
