

GETS THE SUGAR CROP.

It is reported that Claus Spreckels has purchased the sugar crop of most of the Hawaiian plantations. There are upwards of seventy sugar plantations on the Hawaiian Islands. Spreckels is controlling owner in the largest of these, the Maui plantation, which he expects will produce some 8000 to 9000 tons of sugar this year. He has bargained for the sugar to be made from all other plantations except the Una plantation and eight or ten small plantations, for which Hackfeldt & Co., of Honolulu, are agents. These outside plantations will produce from 8,000 to 10,000 tons of sugar. The remainder of the crop will be turned over to Claus Spreckels on their respective plantations or at landings. The Hawaiian Islands have produced annually 35,000 to 40,000 tons of sugar. With sufficient rain the crop this year may reach 50,000 tons, and in that event Spreckels would get 40,000 tons. Terms of the purchases are said to be most favorable to Spreckels. The price to be paid is the cost of dutiable sugar from West Indies landed in New York less three quarters of a cent per pound, without regard to color. For example, if sugars from Cuba polarizing 91 per cent. saccharine matter cost 7 3/4 cents landed at New York, the same grade of sugar landed at San Francisco is to net the Hawaiian planter 7 cents. There is a provision of one eighth of one cent advance or decline, according as sugar varies one point either way. It is also stipulated that the sugar shall be shipped to San Francisco in some of the vessels owned by the Oceanic steamship company, of which Spreckels is the controlling owner. There are 100,000,000 pounds sugar distributed annually from San Francisco. Refiners have a good business and good profits. The freight tariff on sugar from New York by rail being two cents per pound, with the additional advantage of securing 60,000,000 to 80,000,000 pounds of sugar at three quarters of a cent less than dutiable sugars can be landed at New York from the West Indies, and with the largest refinery in the country, if not in the world, it will be seen that Spreckels and his co-owners have got a good thing in the sugar trade.

Bills Presented.

A special to the "Oregonian" from Washington says: Representative M. C. George of Oregon introduced a big bundle of bills and memorials in the house on the 12th, among them many heretofore introduced by Dolph and Slater in the Senate. Among George's memorials were the following: From the Legislature of Oregon for harbor of refuge at Port Orford; for an appropriation for a lighthouse at the mouth of the Umpqua river; asking aid for a railroad from Roseburg to Coos Bay; asking for an increase of rates for government surveys; asking for an appropriation for improvement of the Coquille river; asking a forfeiture of the land grant to the Oregon Central railway; asking aid for repairs of the military road from Jacksonville to Fort Klamath; asking aid to build a railroad from Crescent City to the Dalles; asking pay and pensions for Oregon volunteers who served in the Rogue river war; asking for the payment of a balance on the territory of Oregon, expended in the Rogue river war, and for a grant of lands to soldiers of that and succeeding Indian wars; a memorial from citizens of Oregon asking for the improvement of the Umpqua river.

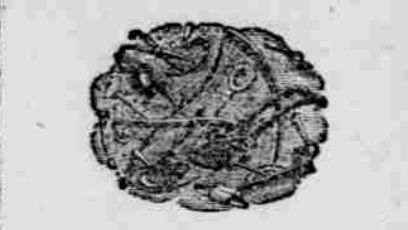
