

GRAVE-YARDS AS GOLD MINES.

"There are about 17,000 dentists in the United States and they pack into the teeth of the American people a ton of pure gold every year, I guess about five times that weight of loss precious metal, such as tin, silver and platinum, go the same way. Now, these metals are worth \$1,000,000, and in the twenty-first century all the coin in the United States will be buried in the graveyards." The dentist looked distressed at the result of his calculations, and the reporter, to revive him, suggested that the figures were an argument in favor of cremation. The dentist shrugged his shoulders. "Yes," said he, "but you've no idea how the gold is thus becoming used up. People used to be content with filling the dark caverns of their molars with any kind of metal, now it must be gold. There is also a growing industry in filling artificial teeth."

"How can they want filling?" asked the surprised reporter.

"Why, my dear sir, they are made so. You know how carpenters will pick the fairest, smoothest board for interior work in a house and will then have a painter to daub it all over with knots, cross-grains and splits? So the modern patron of artificial teeth takes his elegant new set to the dentist and has him drill out vacancies to fill. Looks natural, don't you see? Hundreds of pounds of gold are disposed of in this way every year. It isn't so particularly the gold that the wearer of these artificial teeth wants to display as it is to have the average citizen look upon them as his natural grinders. You see, don't you?" and the dentist tapped his own false teeth with a little probe that he held in his hand.

"Is the artificial-teeth industry a growing one?" inquired the reporter.

"O, yes; although statistics show that only one third of the people of the United States who really need artificial teeth avail themselves of them. Strange, isn't it? Yet there are about 4,000,000 of them made in this country a year, as it is. Prices have come down terribly, though, and where dentists used to retire after eight or nine years of practice and live in luxury the rest of their lives, they now have to struggle on the best of their wits and then die poor. We formerly had from \$40 to \$100 for a double set of teeth. Now \$20 is a good price, and good ones that will last five or six years can be bought for from \$8 to \$16."

"Is the decay of teeth increasing or diminishing among the people of this country?"

"O, increasing. Two hundred years ago one person in five had sound teeth. A hundred years ago but one person in twenty-five had perfect teeth, and in this nineteenth century age of reform our very latest statistics show that but one person in eighty had perfectly sound teeth. It's an alarming condition of things, and by the same ratio it doesn't take a very deep mathematician to see that the time is near at hand when unsound teeth will be universal. Their decay is largely augmented by the use of cheap dentifrices and powders which are advertised to give them a pearly look. It does just the reverse. It removes the sparkling enamel and puts in its place a ghastly plaster-of-paris color that is positively repulsive."—Cleveland Herald.

In nine cases out of ten, remarks an exchange, when an animal is sick, the digestion is wrong, charcoal is the most efficient and rapid curative. The hired man came in with the intelligence that one of the finest cows was very sick, and a kind neighbor proposed the usual drug and poisons. The owner being ill and unable to examine the cow, concluded that the trouble came from overeating, and ordered a teaspoonful of pulverized charcoal to be given in water. It was mixed, placed in a junk bottle, the head turned downward. In five minutes improvement was visible, and in a few minutes the animal was in the pasture quietly grazing. Another instance of success occurred with a young heifer which had become badly bloated from eating green apples after a hard wind. The bloated was so severe that the sides were as hard as a barrel. The old remedy, saleratus, was tried for correcting the acidity. But the attempts at putting it down always raised coughing, and it did little good. Half a teaspoonful of fresh-powdered charcoal was given. In six hours all the appearance of the bloated was gone, and the heifer was well.

A scientist says that the reason kissing is so pleasant is because the teeth, jaw-bones and lips are full of nerves, and when the lips meet an electrical current is generated. He should explain why it is the electric current does not work when he kisses his mother-in-law to please his wife. Science cannot upset our religious notions about kissing.

Making a Barrel Around a Bung.

Mr. Mark L. Doring, mechanical engineer, of this city, has recently taken out a patent for a barrel without staves or hoops, all in one piece. The material he uses to make this seamless barrel is wood pulp. A certain amount of pulp is placed in an iron cylinder, the inside of which is shaped exactly like a barrel. This cylinder is arranged to revolve by an ingenious arrangement both ways; that is, the ordinary way that a barrel would revolve, and revolve at the same time head over head at right angles, at about 190 revolutions a minute. The centrifugal force of this double revolution throws the pulp equally in every direction, spreading it, so to speak, equally all over the inside surface of the cylinder. After being revolved in this manner for three or four minutes air is then pumped through the bung (which is made tight around the pipe conveying the air) till a pressure of 100 pounds to the inch is obtained. This is done without a cessation of the movement of the revolving cylinder. The pressure of this air squeezes all the water in the pulp through the brass lining of the cylinder which is perforated with minute holes, and is carried away in the grooves of the iron cylinder. After being revolved for three minutes under this pressure, the two halves of the cylinder are opened and a perfectly shaped barrel is taken out, all complete with heads in, which is laid aside for twenty-four hours for the purpose of being seasoned, when it is then placed in a drying room, heated by steam to 160 degrees of heat, and kept there for about three days, when it is taken out all finished for the market.—"Cleveland Leader."

The San Francisco Custom House has at last obtained a permanent interpreter for use on incoming Chinese steamers. This is Mr. Vroman, who was born in China, the son of a missionary, and who is said to have spoken Chinese before he spoke English. He is supposed to have a knowledge of all the Chinese dialects and he was recommended by Rev. Mr. Gibson and appointed on the recommendation of Collector Sullivan by the Secretary of the Treasury. Surveyor Morton considers him thoroughly competent and satisfactory, and says he has long thought it necessary to have a white interpreter.

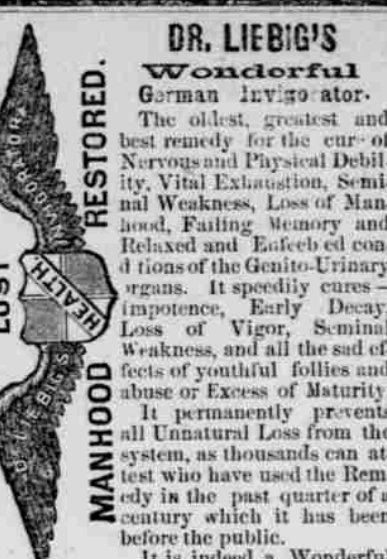

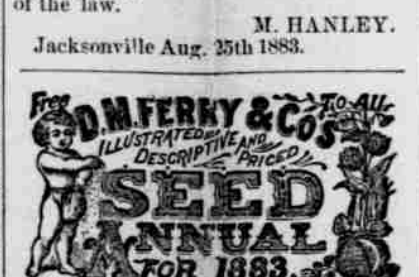
