

RAILROAD CONJECTURES.

The suspension of work on the Siskiyou and Buck Rock tunnels is exciting much comment, and every one is speculating as to the cause of the abrupt termination of the work so ably commenced. Some believe that the action of Congress on land grants to railroads has something to do with it, while others are of the opinion that the property will change hands at an early date, and there are still others who advance the idea that the funds of the present owners have been exhausted. We believe the most probable cause to be an unsatisfactory survey. The line at present crosses the wagon road about half a mile below the Toll House, and then doubles and then runs back several miles to obtain a grade, passes through the Buck Rock tunnels, five in number, and then turns again and follows a ridge back past the Toll House, and thence along the mountain side to the Siskiyou Tunnel, making the road eleven miles in length from the Toll House to the Siskiyou Tunnel, whereas the actual air line distance does not exceed one and a half miles. The road almost crosses itself in its crazy efforts to secure a grade to reach the Siskiyou Tunnel, which is located well upon the mountain side. At this late day the company makes the discovery that, by putting through a tunnel 7,000 feet in length, they can save ten miles of road, besides the construction of the five Buck Rock tunnels, which would always require one or two watchmen at each tunnel. One thousand two hundred feet remain to be finished at the Siskiyou Tunnel, and the aggregate number of feet yet to be completed at the Buck Rock tunnels is 3340, making a total of 4540 feet unfinished in the six tunnels. If the proposed big tunnel is put through, which will start near the Toll House, it will require only 2460 feet more than the completion of the present tunnels, and the saving of the construction of ten miles of road would more than offset the additional cost of tunneling, besides saving the wear and tear of rolling stock over the extra ten miles, and the cost of keeping the track in repairs in after years.—"Yreka Union."

What to Drink to Keep You Warm.

"If you want a drink that will keep you warm a whole night long out of doors," said an old policeman to a friend, "don't drink whisky or rum or any liquor. The heat they afford is short lived, and leaves you cold and weak. They are worse than nothing. But drink a glass of ale and pepper—new ale and common black pepper. It will affect your head, but it will keep your blood warm in the keenest wind and coldest rain." "I never tried the pepper part of the prescription," said a Third Avenue car driver, "but ale, I know, thought to be very warming. We car drivers have colder work than policeman do, I think, and the old ones among us have tried every drink you ever heard of. A lot of us were talking the whole thing over the other night. Hot rum, hot whisky, brandy and ginger, and all the cold, clear alcoholic drinks were discussed. But the majority were in favor of hot coffee. That is the least hurtful, the most heating, and the longest lasting drink I know of."—"New York Sun."

The Oakland "Vidette" gives the "Times" (Dem.) of that city this severe blow below the belt. It says: "The Oakland 'Times' complains that at the end of the year there were \$130,000,000 in the United States treasury, and says this is not the way things were under the last Democratic administration. For once the 'Vidette' and the 'Times' agree. At the close of the last Democratic administration the treasury was stolen dry, the Government bankrupted and unable to negotiate loans for less than 12 per cent., and a civil war upon our hands."

Another tragedy is reported from Douglas county. Loon lake is a small valley six miles south of Scottsburg, within which a notorious rough named John Kelly has resided for a number of years, and as a bully and terror to all others in that locality. Last Monday he was shot and mortally wounded by a neighbor named J. F. Butterfield. This Kelly was a dangerous man, and had frequently threatened and attempted to intimidate Butterfield, with this as the final result of his continued annoyance. He has since died.

General Sheridan has recommended to Congress that thirty-six military posts, mainly in the Territories, be opened for settlement. He says that they are no longer necessary for military purposes, as the Indians have been driven back and civilization has done away with the need of the army. They include in all 711,680 acres of public land.

How Much Makes a Man Rich.

"To be rich," said William L. Marcy, at one time Secretary of State, "requires only a satisfactory condition of mind. One man may be rich with \$100, while another in the possession of millions may think himself poor, and if necessities of life are enjoyed by each, it is evident that the man who is best satisfied with his possession is the richest." To illustrate this idea Mr. Marcy related the following anecdote.

"While I was Governor of the State of New York I was called upon one morning at my office by a rough specimen of a back-woodsman, who stalked in and commenced conversation by inquiring 'if I was Mr. Marcy.' I replied that I was my name. 'Bill Marcy' said he. I nodded assent. Used to live in Southport didn't ye? I answered in the affirmative, and began to feel a little curious to know who my visitor was, and what he was a driving at.

"That's what I told 'em" cried the back-woodsman, bringing his hand down on his thigh with tremendous force. "I told 'em you was the same Bill Marcy who used to live in Southport; but they wouldn't believe it, and I promised the next time I came to Albany to come and see you, and find out for sartin' Why, you know me, don't you, Bill?"

"I didn't exactly like to ignore his acquaintance altogether, but for the life of me I couldn't recollect having seen him before, and so I replied he had a familiar countenance, but that I was not able to call him by name. 'My name is Jack Smith,' answered the back-woodsman, 'and we used to go to school together thirty years ago, in the little red school-house in old Southport. Well, times have changed since then, and you have become a great man and got rich, I suppose.' 'I shook my head and was going to contradict that impression, when he broke in:

"Oh, yes, you are; I know you are rich; no use denying it; you was compeller for—for a long time, and the next time we heard of you you was governor. You must have had a heap of money, and I am glad of it—glad to see you getting along so smart; you was always a smart lad at school, and I knew that you would come to something."

"I thanked him for his good wishes and opinion, but told him that political life did not pay so well as he imagined. 'I suppose,' said I, 'fortune has smiled upon you since you left Southport.' 'Oh, yes,' said he, 'I hain't got nothing to complain of; I must say I have got along right smart; you see, shortly after you left Southport our whole family moved up into Vermont, and put right into the woods, and I reckon our family cut down more trees and cleared more land than any other in the whole State."

"And so you have made a good thing. How much do you consider yourself worth?" I asked, feeling a little curious to know what he considered a fortune, as he seemed to be well satisfied with his.

"Well," he replied, "I don't know exactly how much I am worth, but I think (straightening himself up), if all my debts were paid, I should be worth \$300 clear cash! He was rich, for he was satisfied."

Yesterday afternoon, about three o'clock, two sons of Mr. John Schram, the old harness maker of Oregon City, were skating on a lake a half mile below that town, when one of the boys fell through the ice. His brother made great attempts to rescue him, and finally caught him, but was unable to pull him out, and they both went down together. Parties near gave the alarm, and soon all Oregon City was wild with excitement, hundreds running to the scene of the accident. The bodies were recovered about five o'clock, and were brought to Oregon City just as the evening express train was passing. The boys' names are Otto and Horace, and their ages twelve and eighteen years.—"Albany Herald."

Chinese Quail in Oregon.

Noticing a strange bird in a cage at Malarkey's market, a reporter stopped to find out what it was. He was told it was a Chinese quail. It is the smallest of the species. Some twenty-five dozen of these birds were received here by the last steamer, direct from China. They are about half the size of our mountain quail, which they resemble in shape. The plumage is not so handsome as either our quail or pheasant, being lighter in color and plainer. These birds are much esteemed by the Chinese, both as a delicate dish and on account of the fecundity of the males, which is so great that they are used for fighting in pits the same as game cocks are. Although no bigger than a robin, they will fight till the last grip.—"Oregonian."
