The large emigration from Germany has caused the formation of a "Colonial Association" for the purpose of shaping the direction of the emigrating stream. Prince Hohenlohe Langenburg is its President and 490 branch societies have been formed in various parts of the empire, with a membership of over 30,000. At the last meeting of the central association plans for establishing colonies in Syria and Paraguay were considered. During the past year a total of 166,199 persons left Germany, mostly for the United States, and the authorities, unable to keep the people at home, will do all to prevent the emigrants from going to this country.

The Nebraska member of the Democratic national committee asks the New York Sun why a declaration in favor of a tariff for revenue only will not be a good Democratic platform plank. And the Sun replies that its "great objection to the platform proposed is that it is not possible with it to win the election of 1884 or that of 1888." And the reply of the Sun may be taken as the key-note of the situation from a Democratic standpoint. It is not with them a question of principle. On all the great issues of the day they seek, not to ascertain which will best promote the interest of the people and the welfare of the country, but which position on any of those issues will secure to the Democracy the greatest number of votes.

Though Villard was supposed to have lost everything he had in the Northern Pacific collapse, there have been numerous side speculations in which he was interested which promise to yield such profits as to give him a fortune. One of these was the real estate scheme at Portland, Or., Villard, Jay Gould and others bought for \$45,000 a tract of land near Portland five years ago. It was left unimproved through all the subsequent railroad building and improvement at that point. J. B. Montgomery, who built the Willamette branch of the Northern Pacific Railroad, was interested in the purchase. He told a friend here last fall that he had sold lots out of the tract for sums aggregating \$265,000 and had six-sevenths of the tract yet remaining, comprising the most valuable portions of it.

The house has passed the bill introduced by M. C. George authorizing the secretary of the treasury to pay Mrs. Louisa Boddy \$5,400, damages for Modoc Indian depredations. These damages consisted of the murder of her husband, William Boddy, and two sons, on November 29th, 1872, by Captain Jack and his band, who were aroused by the expedition, under Canby to dislodge them from the lava beds. The Boddy family lived near Lost river, Oregon, and lost not only their lives but all of their property during the Modoc war. There was some opposition to the bill, but the committee on Indian affairs presented a long report, and George, Henly and Budd each made a speech upon it. Budd claimed the government was responsible for the murders because it had attempted to remove the Modocs with an inadequate force, and by threats and menaces excited them to war. Holman and some others objected to the principle established by the bill, but Henly cited numerous precedents for it, and said if it was now intended to reverse the former practice he hoped the house would not begin on the wife of Boddy, who surely was entitled to relief. The bill was passed without further opposition.

Those who have attended receptions and other occasions this winter at Washington have remarked the unusual display of "low necks." It is the style just now, more than heretofore, for fashionable society to strip itself down to that condition which Mr. Anthony Comstock says should not be tolerated even in an art collector's private parties.

A stranger who went to the President's last reception was asked: How did you enjoy the levee? "Well, I saw several duds and a good many nudes," was the reply. This extreme fashion is eliciting much unfavorable comment both here and elsewhere, as it prevails in fashionable circles everywhere. It is a question whether women who at a public gathering expose their persons in a manner that would almost cause a ballet girl to blush can be really modest. And yet mothers send their blooming young daughters out in this fashion. These are admired. Pretty, fair young shoulders are attractive, but when stout matrons of middle age, and scrawny women still older, bare their necks beyond all sense of delicacy and limit, modest people are ashamed. There were ladies at the President's reception who felt like turning their faces to the wall to hide their blushes, so shocking low were some of the dresses.

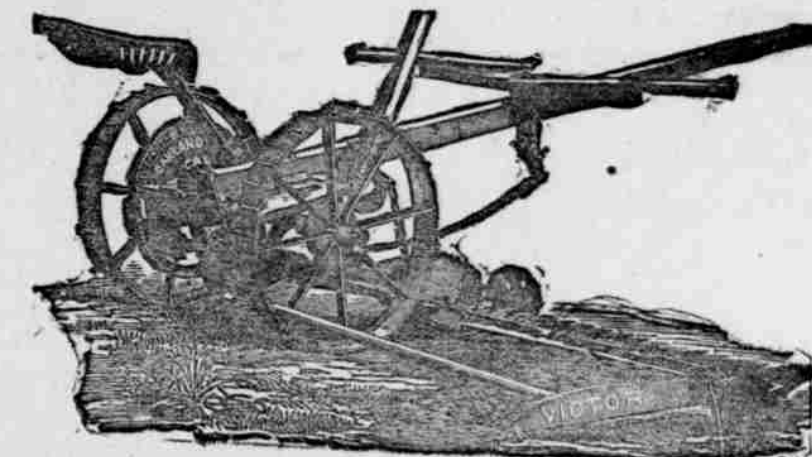
