

The New Teacher.

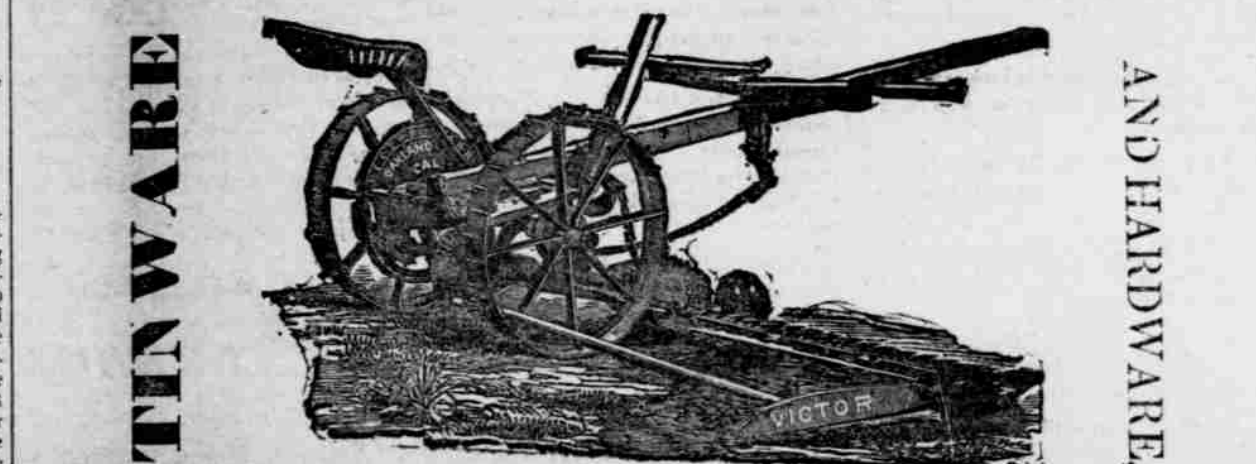
