

Sargent Declines the Russian Mission.

Washington, March 29.—On receipt of Secretary Frelinghuysen's telegram informing him of a complimentary manner of his transfer to St. Petersburg, and the unanimous confirmation of his nomination by the United States senate, Minister Sargent cabled the secretary a warm expression of gratitude for the approval of his course in the Lasker matter, and for the action of the president and the senate in conferring upon him the Russian mission, but adds that he could not accept it, and wished to resign the post at Berlin to-day. In response to further telegrams from Frelinghuysen Sargent telegraphs repeating his assurances of gratitude, but adhering to his purpose, because of ill health, and for other reasons, to be explained by letter. He adds that he would to-day turn over the legation to the secretary of the legation, taking a leave of absence, on the expiration of which he will formally announce to the German government his resignation.

Following is a recapitulation of the votes cast: Blaine, 1515; Lincoln, 35; Edmunds, 16; Logan, 15; Arthur, 14; General Sherman, 14; John Sherman, 10; Grant and Conkling, 1 each.
