Obituaries.

News reached here on Tuesday last of the death of Wm. Kreutzer, an old-time resident of Jacksonville, at Seattle on that day. He had not been well for some time past and thinking a change of climate might benefit him he moved to Seattle leaving Mrs. Kreutzer in charge of the bakery business here. He was a native of Germany, aged about 48 years, was well and most favorably known in this section and leaves a wife and a large circle of friends to mourn his loss. We extend our sympathies to the bereaved widow.

Peter Reiser an old and respected citizen of Josephine county died at Kerbyville on Tuesday last after an illness of only twenty-four hours. Mr. Reiser has been a resident of Southern Oregon since 1858, most of the time engaged in mining and for the last two years he has kept a saloon in Kerbyville at the old George Grotz stand. He was well known in this section and we doubt if there are one among his large circle of acquaintances that did not like and respect him. He was a widower, aged about 59 years and leaves a grown-up son in Detroit, Michigan, who will probably come out to take charge of the place. His remains were buried in the Odd Fellow's cemetery near Kerbyville on Wednesday under the auspices of that order and was followed to the grave by the largest funeral procession ever seen in Josephine county, Circuit Court having adjourned in respect to his memory, and to allow all in attendance to be present at the funeral. May his soul rest in peace.

A telegraphic dispatch was received by the secretary of Jacksonville lodge No. 10, I. O. O. F., conveying the intelligence of the death of Clinton Schiefelin at his home in Los Angeles, Cal., April 15. Mr. S. was one of Jacksonville's earliest pioneers, a man of sterling integrity, generous impulses, and kind, benevolent disposition. He had gathered around him here a host of warm friends that mourn the stroke that cuts off, in the prime of useful manhood, a loving husband, kind affectionate father, and firm, and steadfast friend. He was a member of Jacksonville Lodge No. 10, I. O. O. F., and exemplified the tenets of that order in his pure and useful life. There's a vacant seat in our lodge room, a broken link in the endless chain of friendship, a part of the infinite love waited back to its eternal source; another crown laid down on the altar of Truth and we bow in submission as we wait to our departed one our last farewell. To his bereaved wife and children long and favorably known to us, we tender our sincere sympathy and condolence in their hour of affliction.

Madame Jane Holt, proprietor of the U. S. Hotel, died here last Sunday night after several months slowly failing health. Madame Holt was a Southern Oregon pioneer and had been engaged in the hotel business ever since she resided here, having formerly kept the Franco American, and was well known all over the coast. She was a native of France, proud of the land of her birth, and never lost the impress of her nationality. She was of generous disposition, and many live to tell of her charities. Her hospitality was an inseparable part of her very self and in her endeavor to entertain she could not be excelled. Her funeral took place from the Catholic church, Rev. Father Blanchet officiating. Many friends followed to the grave the remains of one whose faults all leaned to virtue's side and so we leave her resting from the toils of the day on the verdant hillside with spring in all its liveliest mantle robes of beauty. The blue expanse of heaven canopied over her and the all merciful and loving hand of omnipotence to judge the merits of the great heart forever stilled. May the often sorely tried spirit rest in peace as the years roll on to the endless and beautiful shores of eternity.

Railroad Items.

The general belief is that work is stopped on the Redding end on account of capitalists or company refusing to put any more money in the road at present.

News reached here Wednesday evening that Strobbridge, superintendent of construction on railroad above Redding, visited all the camps on Sacramento river, and notified all hands to knock off work, as further railroad building would be stopped for the present. It is the intention however to finish the road to the 40 mile stake above Redding, which will allow turning over for government acceptance two twenty mile sections. This will bring the railroad terminus to a little this side of Dog Creek, and about 80 miles from Yreka. It is said the company find a tough job in cutting through tunnel 4, being unable to make more than a few inches some days with the Barleigh drills. As soon as tunnel 4 is opened, trains can be run to the Sacramento bridge, about 30 miles north of Redding and shortly after, the road will be completed to Dog Creek, as the small tunnels above the bridge and the grading require very little more work to be ready for laying the track.

The Marysville "Appeal" says: Chief Engineer Hood's party of railroad surveyors arrived at Redding last week for a summer campaign on the extension. But Saturday the party were ordered to San Fernando through on the Southern Pacific for a short time, thence to Fort Yuma. This item is confirmatory of the report that the Central Pacific was about to abandon the extension and union of the Oregon roads. The stoppage of work since proves the above item to be true. There will be nearly 7,000 Chinamen and the greater portion of 1,500 white men thrown out of work by suspension of railroad work above Redding.—"Yreka Journal."
