The Circuit Judgeship.

It may be said that we are taking a great deal of pains lately to refer to this matter. This is true; and we intend to keep this subject prominently before the people until the last vote is polled on the second day of next June.

The first Judicial district, though largely Democratic, has been singularly fortunate since the first organization of the District, in the selection of its Judges. They have been men of character and standing and we believe, honest and incorruptible in the discharge of their high and important trusts; and such only should be called to positions of responsibility.

Since this is not, and cannot, in its very nature, be tortured into a political office, the public should be careful to vote for those only who appreciate the responsibility and delicacy of the trust confided to them, and whose ability, legal acquirements, and fine sense of honor would command respect, confidence and insure the prompt and efficient discharge of every duty devolving upon them. These thoughts are suggested by the nomination of Mr. C. A. Cogswell of Lake county for the office of Circuit Judge by the Democratic party at its late State convention.

We do not know Mr. Cogswell, neither do we know anything concerning his qualifications for that important office; nor can we say, with the light before us, that the party could have done better in this district. Large available timber seemed to be scarce. Mr. Cogswell may be a good man for the position. We will wait and see what can be said for him. There is, however, one significant fact regarding Mr. Cogswell, and that is that though he has long been a resident of this District, he is scarcely known as a lawyer, and certainly has no reputation as one of ability. If he has ever been prominent in any leading or important cases we have never heard of it. As a man, Mr. Cogswell may be good enough, and good enough perhaps as a lawyer in a small town, but as the Circuit Judge of this district with its important and complicated interests, requiring superior judgment and ability we do not think he is the man and we believe the votes will so decide in next June.

The California and Oregon.

GENERAL MANAGER TOWNE INTERVIEWED WITH REGARD TO THE SUSPENSION OF WORK.

San Francisco, April 23.—It having been learned that work on the California and Oregon railroad, which was suddenly resumed with a great flourish by the Central Pacific railroad company, had suddenly been abandoned, and nearly 1000 white laborers, and as many more Chinese thrown out of employment, General Manager Towne was interviewed last evening.

"What is the cause for the sudden cessation of labor on the Oregon extension?"

"Our people," replied Mr. Towne, "do not intend to build railroads while the legislature maintains its present attitude toward us."

"What has the legislature to do with the completion or non-completion of the California and Oregon?"

"Just this," said the railroad manager raising his finger and shaking it decisively: "They are fighting capital. Money can't be borrowed in this state now to build railroads with. Now the California and Oregon is a much needed road, but it will never be completed, simply because no eastern capitalists are willing to venture his money on such shaky securities as California offers to the market. Railroad building here is a thing of the past."

"But the Oregon and California line is nearly finished, is it not?"

"Yes; it is only a short distance from the state line now."

"And the California and Oregon has not far to go to reach the Oregon line, has it?"

"About sixty miles, I believe."

"And you mean to tell me that your company cannot build these sixty miles road?" said the reporter, "and complete this coast throughfare from San Francisco to Portland, simply because money can't be raised to prosecute the work?"

"That's just what I mean," said the general manager, sticking to his point persistently, and going on to show how wretchedly they had ventured all their hopes and capital on the completion of the road had been forced to sell their land, saw-mills and other property, on account of its "collapse."

It remains to read between the lines

and discern the real cause for this sudden abandonment of this pet scheme of the Central Pacific managers. If it is not intended for great effect on the legislature, in some unexplained manner it may be that it has been discovered that there is to be no staving off the inevitable in the matter of the forfeiture of the land as proposed by the present congress, and for the redemption of which work on the extension was resumed.

The first complete volume of the book by Hon. James G. Blaine, "Twenty Years in Congress," came from the binders last Wednesday. It comprises some 646 pages, with thirty-one steel portraits and a map showing the political history of the country in a graphic and ingenious form. It is written in a clear, vigorous style, has much the dignity of history and contains many sketches of eminent men of the period which it covers. The first seven chapters of the book discuss the causes of the civil war. A long chapter reviewing the history of the tariff follows. In this Mr. Blaine mentions the fact that President Washington signed the first protective tariff bill. In all this discussion Mr. Blaine has made an evident effort to be impartial and has had fair success. Personal sketches are given of nearly every member of the famous Forty-third Congress. Conkling's name appears frequently in the latter part of the book and he is very often referred to in the most complimentary terms, while many extracts from his speeches are given. No general estimate of his character, however, is made. Of Grant, Mr. Blaine says that all his honors were earned; that there was no political influence behind him, and that he was a man who succeeded because he understood thoroughly how to control himself. The space devoted to Logan is very brief, but the comments on him and his work are very complimentary.
