Our Ticket.

We are proud to present to our readers to-day the standard bearers of our party knowing that each name represents individual worth, and the ticket placed before you brings out the best legal, and legislative ability of the state. By our effort we can add, only, to the majorities of the gentlemen as the state is so largely Republican, that their election is a foregone conclusion, and the fact that they have been placed in the field by our party, when a nomination is equivalent to an election, as this unanimous choice is the best evidence of their fitness for the position to which the representative men of our party from all parts of the state have called them.

Hon. Binger Hermann, of Douglas, our candidate for Congress, has been a resident of the southern part of the state for the last twenty five years. His father, Dr. Hermann, brought out a German colony and settled at Coos Bay in 1858; and Binger, with all the energy of German youth, imbibed the indomitable spirit of the western pioneer and is today a man of splendid physique, fine mental attainments, a brilliant lawyer, fluent and graceful speaker, and is eminently qualified to represent us in the halls of Congress being the peer intellectually and morally of any man in the state. Mr. Hermann stands before us with a reputation unsullied and a man of the strictest integrity, fine sense of honor, and a generous interest in the well-being of his fellow men, he is well qualified in every way to succeed our present distinguished representative Hon. M. C. George and we bespeak for him the earnest and hearty support of the Republicans of the state.

Judge L. Flinn of Albany is the nominee for Supreme Judge, and while he is not well-known having never been much engaged in politics, his friends recommend him most highly and say that he will add dignity and force to the Supreme Court of the State when elected.

The nominees for Electors are D. P. Thompson of Multnomah, J. C. Leasure of Umatilla and Warren Truitt of Polk, all men of recognized ability who will make it warm for their opponents next November at the Presidential election. Taken altogether the party is to be congratulated at the selections made and every Republican should turn out to send the ticket to victory by majorities larger than ever received by any candidate before.

The "Tidings" gets on its muscle and kicks at the "vigor and freshness of Ashland modesty," reported in last week's issue. That's right, were had down this way—awful bad; but we never corralled a county convention and got set down on—we ain't that kind of noodles. Some naughty fellow, who of course lives here—you haven't any of that class up there, and we're mighty glad of it—compared the victory to the strategic capture of a last year's bird's nest—He ought to be shot! By the way, how's prohibition up at the "corners?"

Some four years ago a young man asked General Grant for his autograph, together with a short rule of life, and obtained the following solid chunk of wisdom: "Vote the Republican ticket until every man in the nation, entitled to vote, can cast just one vote at each election, for which party he pleases, without fear or molestation, and have it honestly counted, and you will feel conscious of having done your duty as a citizen."

The Democratic nominee for Congress, Hon John Myers of Clackamas county, will speak here on the political issues of the day on May 23d. The appointments of Hon. Binger Hermann have not yet been announced but they will probably be the same and a joint discussion held throughout the state.

Our friend Nickell of the "Times" fully carries out the principles of the Democratic party on the tariff question: He's a Democrat "for revenue only."

Our Candidate for Judge.

We are gratified to announce to our patrons and the public generally that Hon. L. R. Webster, the present incumbent, has been nominated by the Republican State Convention for the office of Circuit Judge of this district. The Convention could not have done better, and its action in this regard will be heartily endorsed by his many friends as a graceful and becoming tribute to a worthy and efficient officer. The voters of this district, one and all, are to be congratulated upon the opportunity, thus offered, to cast their ballots for a man who has shown himself to be eminently fitted for the position and who has already, by his uniform courtesy and impartiality, won the confidence and esteem of the bar of this district.

Mr. Webster came to Jacksonville about four years ago, and though a stranger in a strange land he, at once, took rank as a dignified and polished gentleman and accomplished scholar.

Prior to coming here he had devoted considerable time to the study of law, with the view of engaging in it as a profession, and again, in connection with other business, resumed its study, and completing the course he passed a most creditable examination and was admitted to the bar, and at once, commenced the practice of law, under the most favorable auspices, winning deserved laurels in his first case, and carrying conviction that he was a shrewd, critical and practical lawyer. To illustrate his standing and the great confidence reposed in him by men of all parties it is a notable and significant fact, and one of which he has just cause to feel proud, that when Judge Hanna resigned, a petition, signed by most of this bar, and many leading members of both parties, was sent to the Governor asking his appointment to fill the position thus vacated.

The Governor, recognizing the force of such a joint petition, responded to the prayer of petitioners and appointed him. Entering upon his duties he has since discharged the functions of the office with marked ability and to the entire satisfaction of the bar and all concerned; and, if we may judge the future from the past, it is not assuming too much to confidently predict that he will, at no distant day, take a position as one of the leading lawyers of the state.

As a man of Mr. Webster's sterling qualities will naturally make friends wherever he may go it will be greatly to his advantage to have held a term of court in each county before the election, many voters will have thus been afforded an opportunity to make his acquaintance personally, to meet him face to face and weigh and measure him and decide for themselves concerning his qualifications for the office. There is an abiding and paramount interest in and surrounding this office which communities cannot afford to ignore or lightly set aside. The safety and in a great measure the moral status of society depend more largely and directly for their support and preservation upon a sound and reliable judiciary than upon any other source combined, for it must be a conceded fact that the multiplied wrongs and evils which derange and afflict society are almost wholly redressed and remedied finally through the courts. It is therefore the first duty of every man in the district who has property to be taxed and protected and who feels an interest in the peace and good order of society to vote for that person, be his politics what they may, who would be most likely to subserve the ends desired, and compass justice with the least delay and with the least possible expense.

This district, as is well known, is largely Democratic, and all things being equal the election of a Democrat might be set down as a foregone conclusion; but as voters of both parties are casting aside the party shackles and are coming to think more of men and less of party, and as there is no comparison between Mr. Webster and Mr. Cogswell so far as qualifications or fitness for the office is concerned, we believe the individual interests of voters, who will view this matter as business men from a social and business standpoint will be alone sufficient to determine them to give him a handsome majority.

But let the result be what it may it shall be our purpose during the campaign to discuss this matter in all candor and fairness and to give credit where we conceive credit to be due, and without it where it ought obviously to be withheld; and while we do not believe Mr. Cogswell is the man for the position, and do not believe he ought to be or that he will be elected, we shall, nevertheless, at all times, treat him with the courtesy and consideration due or which ought to be due an individual who has been nominated for a position of such importance.

And now in conclusion, we appeal to all, without regard to party, to come together as men having a common interest and unite for the common good in the election of a man whose qualifications are undoubted and who will prove faithful to the trust and one of whom we may all justly feel proud.

Republican Platform.

WHEREAS, The Republican party has for a quarter of a century had the political thought of the nation; and
WHEREAS, This great party has succeeded by being aggressive and fearless in support of right, we, the Republicans of Oregon in convention assembled, mindful of the glories which cluster around its past history, renew our pledges of fidelity to the doctrines which have repeatedly received the endorsement of the people, and do make and affirm the following declaration of our political principles:

1. That we favor honest, efficient and economic administration of every department of government.
2. That we favor equal protection of the rights of labor and capital.
3. That we regard the free school system of our state as the special care and pride of the Republican party.
4. To the important and rapidly increasing manufacturing and wool growing interests of Oregon we favor the protecting care of the general government equal in extent to the importance of these industries.
5. That we reaffirm the past policy of the Republican party to foster and encourage railroad building in all parts of our state; and at the same time we hold a corporation to be strictly responsible for their liabilities under the law, and insist on the right and duty of the legislature, both state and national, to enact all reasonable limitations upon corporate powers.

6. That by the generous policy of the Republican party in congress, liberal appropriations have been made to various portions of our state, and we favor a continuation of that policy for the further development and relief of the country, and we demand prompt and liberal appropriations for the improvement of the river of the Columbia river; a so for the entrance to all harbors and bays of our coast; also for the improvement of all our navigable rivers, including the building of necessary locks, to the end that our rivers may be made public highways untrammelled by private and unnecessary obstructions.
7. That all unearned grants to railroads and wagon roads in this state should be forfeited and opened to settlement by those entitled to the benefit of the land laws of the United States.
8. That the laws of Oregon providing for assessment and collecting revenue, including the "mortgage tax law," should be amended so as to insure an equal and just distribution of taxation upon all the property real and personal in the state.
9. That we demand of the next session of the legislative assembly of the state the passage of a more just and efficient mechanics' lien law.
10. We renounce all declarations in favor of restricting Chinese immigration to this country and demand such additional legislation by congress as is necessary to effectively prevent any evasion of the laws now in force on that subject.

11. That we favor the enactment of a good and sufficient registry law, to the end that illegal voting may be prevented.
12. That the Republicans of Oregon approve all legislation which tends to promote fidelity and efficiency in the civil service of the country, and we declare the Republican party pledged to civil service reform.
13. That the convention cordially indorses the administration of President Arthur, whose broad statesmanship and good judgment in the details of administrative duty have won for him the approval of the entire country.

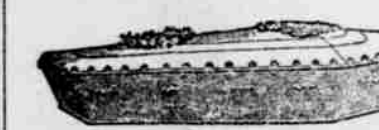
