Last week's issue of the "Times," contained a short review of Mrs. Leavitt's lecture in this place, that differed, somewhat, from the usual style of that paper, as the writer had the "manner of a gentleman, and did not indulge in billingsgate slang" as is common in their reference to the public work of woman. He says: She pleaded earnestly for the curtailment of the liquor-traffic, but let the cat out of the bag when she admitted she did not expect much improvement, until woman gets the ballot; and, of course, she did not tell us about reforms wrought in Wyoming, where woman suffrage has had a fair test; perhaps she thought; very likely, and we give her the benefit of the doubt. Wonderful magnanimity, unspicable generosity after an insinuation that it had been purposely withheld; beneath the dignity of a gentleman. Now will the writer, with the columns of a news paper at his command, that boast of a circulation more than equal to that of all the other papers in this part of the state combined, enlighten us on the effects of woman suffrage in Wyoming? We are approaching an election, where the woman suffrage question will be submitted to the people, and every argument bearing on the question, either pro or con, should be brought forward without prejudice, so that voters may fairly understand the measure; and we would ask our friend of the "Times" in whatsoever woman suffrage has been determined to the best interests of the people of Wyoming Territory? Can he ask why wives and mothers, born under the abnormal conditions of Polygamy, refuse to cast a vote that would forever stigmatize, and ostracize themselves and their children? A Story of the War.

Henry J. Savage, one of the Soldiers' Home veterans, tells the following thrilling story of a war incident to the Milwaukee "Sentinel."

The oft mooted question, "Was ever a desperately wounded soldier shot dead, at his own earnest solicitation, by a comrade?" is answered in the affirmative by your humble servant. It happened as follows:

The writer, a member of Company G, First Delaware Infantry, was then attached to the Third brigade (Weber's) Third division (French's), Second corps (Sumner's). After wading Antietam Creek, plunged through plowed fields, stubble fields and corn fields, his regiment was finally located within plain view of the enemy, when the welcome command ran along the line to "load and fire at will." It was then that our daily target practice at Fortress Monroe came into excellent use, as many a poor devil of the Sixth Alabama learned to his cost. After firing eleven rounds, the writer was wounded and ordered to the rear.

While retreating in good order, but making most excellent time, his route led him through a portion of the Irish brigade. Here he saw a sight that clapped the climax of horror. A member of that devoted brigade was aimlessly stumbling around with both eyes shot out, begging some one, "for the love of God," to put an end to his misery. A lieutenant of the Fourth New York was passing by, and seeing the poor fellow's condition and hearing his appeal, he halted before him and asked if he really meant what he said.

"Oh, yes, comrade," was the reply, "I cannot possibly live, and my agony is unendurable."

Without another word the officer drew his pistol, placed it to the victim's right ear, turned away his head and pulled the trigger. A half hour, a convulsive gasp, and one more unfortunate had passed over to the silent majority.

"It was better thus," said the lieutenant, replacing his pistol and turning toward the writer, "for the poor fellow could—"

Just then a solid shot took the lieutenant's head off.

Mail Robbery. VICTORIA, B. C., May 1.—The Colophon of this morning contains the following under the heading of "Astounding Discovery!" Within the past few days an alarming fact has come to light. It has been ascertained that all English and Canadian letters which left Victoria on the 21st and 24th of March, by the Puget Sound steamer, for transportation Eastward via the Northern Pacific railway, have never reached their destination. Included in the two mails were over 200 registered letters and a very large number of unregistered letters. Without exception, all these have disappeared. The custom is to take a receipt from the United States mail agent on the Sound steamer, after which the bags are passed to his care. It is presumed that he in turn takes a receipt from the mail agent on the train at Tacoma, and that from that point on the proper precautions are taken for the protection and care of the mails. The robbery is believed to have occurred somewhere on the line of the Northern Pacific railway. The pecuniary loss is doubtless heavy, and it will fall with peculiar force upon many persons residing here, some of whom were sending remittances from Canada and England for British Columbia, via the Northern Pacific railway, were stolen. Subsequently some parties in Oregon were found to have about \$40,000 in Canadian Government cheques and drafts in their possession, which they tried to negotiate but could not. The paper was sent on to this place where it had been previously cancelled. It is hoped that a rigid inquiry will be instituted by both the Canadian and United States Government, and that the guilty parties will be brought to justice.
