

Binger Herman.
Hon. Binger Hermann, the Republican candidate for Congress, will stump the State, commencing at Ashland on May 8th. A reference to an advertisement in this issue will furnish the reader with the time and place at which this gentleman will speak during the month of May. On the 31st of May he will speak before a Portland audience on the political issues of the day. As many inquiries have been made in regard to the antecedents of Mr. Hermann, a brief sketch of his career may perhaps not be out of place. This popular gentleman first saw the light of day in Baltimore, Maryland, in the year 1812. His parents were German. The father of the future statesman was an eminent medical man of Hesse Cassel, Germany. In 1833 the elder Hermann, moved by a spirit of adventure, and a prospect of bettering his condition in the far West, organized a large colony, which he led through the wilderness, and finally settled within the then wilds of Coos County. It was amidst these pioneer scenes that young Hermann was raised, living in both Coos and Douglas counties. He acquired his primary education at the crude schools and by studying hard at once under the tutelage of his father. When quite a youth Hermann taught school at Yonocilla and other places. Becoming tired of "teaching the young idea how to shoot," and desiring to advance himself, the future statesman left his home and went to San Francisco. In the Golden City he entered the law office of John B. Felton, a prominent and famous lawyer of California, to study law. During all this time the subject of this sketch supported himself. Of course he had to endure more or less poverty, but never complained, and was able to economize and temperate habits. It is needless to say that all self-made men young Hermann gave himself a fine practical education. Returning to his home he remained for some little time, and finally was elected to the Legislature from Douglas county and represented it for several terms in the Legislature. Finally in 1873 he was appointed Receiver of the Land Office at Roseburg. This office he filled with the greatest ability for four years. At the end of this term he settled down to a lucrative practice of the law, and he is now considered one of the best posted jurists of Southern Oregon. Mr. Hermann has by his integrity, industry and ability accumulated a fortune. He owns a large quantity of land in Jackson and Coos counties. Besides he has a huge saw mill at Coquille City, and has done great deal towards developing that section of the State. This gentleman, in contest for Congress, will be enthusiastically supported by the Coos and Roseburgers, by whom he is justly worshipped for his sterling qualities. Mr. Hermann is well acquainted with the interests of Oregon in the halls of congress. His election is almost a foregone conclusion.

Republican Platform.
WHEREAS, The Republican party has for a quarter of a century had the political thought of the nation, and
AND, This great party has succeeded by being aggressive and fearless in the face of all opposition, and by the glorious which cluster around its name, rescue our pledges of fidelity to the principles which have repeatedly been the foundation of our country, and do make and affirm the following declaration of our political principles:
1. That we favor honest, efficient and economical administration of every department of government.
2. That we favor equal protection of the rights of labor and capital.
3. That we regard the free school system of our state as the special care and duty of the Republican party.
4. To the important and rapidly increasing manufacturing and wool growing interests of Oregon, we favor the protective care of the general government equal in extent to the importance of these industries.
5. That we reaffirm the past policy of the Republican party to foster and encourage railroad building in all parts of our state, and at the same time we hold corporations to be strictly responsible for their liabilities under the law, and insist on the right and duty of the legislature, both state and national, to enact all reasonable limitations upon corporate powers.
6. That by the generous policy of the Republican party in congress, liberal appropriations have been made to various portions of our state, and we favor a continuation of that policy for the further development and to let the country, and we demand prompt and liberal appropriations for the improvement of the bar of the Columbia river; also for the entrance to all harbors and bays of our coast; also for the improvement of all our navigable rivers, including the chinook and necessary locks, to the end that our rivers may be made public highways untrammeled by private and unnecessary dikes.
7. That all unearned grants to railroads and wagon roads in this state should be withheld and opened to settlement by those entitled to the benefit of the land laws of the United States.
8. That the laws of Oregon providing for assessment and collecting revenue, including the "mortgage tax law," should be amended so as to insure an equal and just distribution of taxation upon all the property real and personal in the state.
9. That we demand of the next session of the legislative assembly of the state the passage of a more just and efficient anti-trusts law.
10. We renege our declarations in favor of restricting Chinese immigration to this country and demand such additional legislation by congress as is necessary to effectively prevent any evasion of the laws in force on that subject.
11. That we favor the enactment of a good and sufficient registry law, to the end that illegal voting may be prevented.
12. That the Republicans of Oregon approve all legislation which tends to promote fidelity and efficiency in the civil service of the country, and we declare the Republican party pledged to civil service reform.
13. That the convention cordially indorses the administration of President Arthur, whose broad statesmanship and good judgment in the details of administrative duty have won for him the approval of the entire country.

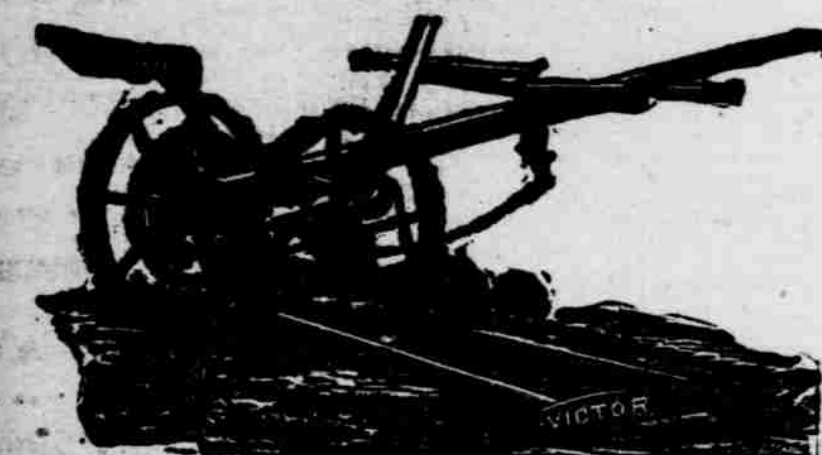
