Our Circuit Judge.

In this latest issue before the election we again call the attention of the peo ple to our candidate for circuit judge. We are gratified to know that the people have given earnest attention to the facts that have been presented in es tablishing Judge Webster's peculiar fit ness for the important position. The opposition have not tried to disparage or misrepresent him in any way and they could not have refuted our claims for him in any other way.
