Oregon's next legislature will stand 16 Republicans to 14 Democrats in senate and 35 Republicans to 25 Democrats in the house, giving the Republicans a majority of 12 on joint ballot.

This recent report of the national board of fire underwriters shows that no fewer than 2872 hotels in the United States have been destroyed by fire during the past eight years, an average of 259 yearly.

The first public Blaine and Logan flag of the campaign was raised in San Francisco yesterday at the corner of Powell and Union streets by B. D. Jackson, an employee of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company.

SALEM (Or.), June 19.—The case of Mrs. David Swartz, accused of complicity in the murder of her husband, went to the jury this evening, and after a few minutes' deliberation they returned a verdict of acquittal.

TILDEN'S withdrawal as presidential candidate gives the delegates elected to the democratic national convention in his behalf a splendid opportunity to sell out at good figures to the man with the biggest bar; and they'll do it, too.

SONORA (Cal.), June 19.—Last night the body of James Bowden, a man who had attempted suicide by cutting his throat and had made his escape from the County Hospital, was found in a mining hole where he had evidently drowned himself.

ON LAST Monday evening, says the Lake County Examiner, a water spout struck the mountain northeast of town, transforming the numerous hill-side gulches into rivers of respectable proportion, flooding the level plain below to a depth of six or eight inches. No serious damage was done.

WRITING of Heron Siding, on the Northern Pacific, the Spokane Falls "Chronicle" says: It seems now to be the headquarters for gamblers and bunco sharps. They make use of cunning devices to trap the unwary. Reports have been published of a number of their tricks, by which innocent parties have been robbed of their hard earnings. The gang who invested this city for several days are doubtless located there now.

UNDER date of the 10th inst. Samuel J. Tilden sent a letter to Daniel Manning, chairman of the Democratic state committee of New York, formally withdrawing from further political aspirations. This is supposed to settle the "old ticket," business and explode the democratic thunder in regard to presidential election of 1876. But it was a powerful bomb in the democratic camp. Now they are awfully at sea for a man to fleece and sacrifice this year.

NEW HALL, June 19.—The work train which has been clearing the San Fernando tunnel, on its way to Lang's yesterday encountered an engine with the pile-driver and several flats which blocked the way. The collision occurred on a short curve, about a mile and a half from this place. The north bound engine had its head knocked in, three flat cars were disabled and a Chinaman was slightly injured. Otherwise the damage was light and the track is clear.

FROM the Albany Democrat we learn these items: We understand that the hop pickers of Lane county are contemplating hiring Chinamen this summer instead of Indians and white people to pick their hops, the reason for the move, it is taken, being that they will do it a few cents cheaper. This is hardly fair, and certainly is not consistent with the spread eagle opposition to the Celestial; yet it shows how much more many think of a little money than principle.

ST. PAUL, June 19.—This evening there occurred what will probably be a double murder and suicide. J. C. Cechura, owner of a house, had rented rooms to Mrs. Catherine Messerschmidt, aged 76, and her daughter, Margaret, aged 27. The women paid the rent to Cechura's wife, which angered him, and to-night he entered the rooms of the mother and daughter armed with a large butcher-knife, and after a short talk, he attacked the woman, stabbing the old woman in the back and breast, resulting in instant death. He then attacked the daughter and stabbed her in the left lung and inflicted a dozen other wounds. She will probably die. Cechura then went to his own room, looked himself in, took poison and cut the arteries of both his arms.
