The Monitor Speaks.

What a humiliating and pitiful sight the Democracy might be, made a foot ball for bosses to kick in whatever direction their diabolism dictate! It is possible that party bosses expect the people are as blind and as bad as they are themselves! Do they vainly imagine that the Democratic masses are "going it blind" at the beck of bosses whose special business it is to buy and sell candidates across bar-room counters—like so many chattels sold on the block in antebellum days south of Mason and Dixon's line! We have too much confidence in the intelligence of the Democracy to charge them with conniving at such crookedness, but they are cowards and evildoers if—as American citizens—they do not rise in their wrath in this State, and, with a stalwart blow struck through the ballot box, strike down forever the Boss rule that is dragging their party into disrepute and entailing certain ruin upon its political prospects in the forthcoming Presidential fight.—S. A contemporary says that "twenty odd years ago when the country called for Blaine's services he furnished a substitute." Yes, he did, and it was well that he did, for the lower house of Congress was then filled with Democrats who were doing damage to the Union cause by declaring that the war was a failure that ten regiments could do in the field. Blaine was the man who met these copperheads on their own ground and silenced them. They were always found in opposition to appropriations for the army, and had it not been for the gallant fight made by Blaine and others they would probably have succeeded in giving the rebels much valuable assistance. For these services Blaine will always be remembered by those who have the welfare of the country at heart. To say that he is hated by the class of Democrats who sympathized with the Rebellion is the highest compliment that could be paid him.

It is a suggestive fact that only the light weight Democratic newspapers affect relief and joy at the nomination of Blaine, and a cheerful assurance of a walk over in November. Such Democratic organs as the New York "Sun," the Buffalo "Courier" and the Washington Post are not cheering or propagating any illusions of that sort. One and all they are impressively cautioning their political brethren that it will require very excellent nominations this month and very diligent campaign work thereafter to defeat James G. Blaine and John A. Logan.

How it Will Come Out.

The Democrats are good at figuring out a victory before each election. For twenty years they have always had their candidates for President elected up to the hour of closing the polls, but after the polls closed the Republicans were always ahead, and the Democratic arithmeticians turned their attention from figuring up majorities to shouting "fraud." But on the present occasion they will have a hard task to figure up a victory before the election, and will be further behind than usual after the election. The solid south with Indiana, New Jersey, Connecticut and Massachusetts would only give them 197 votes, four less than the number required to elect. They are not likely to carry any one of the four States named outside of the South, and cannot reasonably expect to carry all of them. Tilden was their only hope to carry New York. Without that State they cannot figure at a majority.

Allowing the Democratic way of figuring, and as they claim several doubtful northern States, let's see what might be accomplished by the Republicans in the South: Suppose we say for the South 153, minus 10 for North Carolina, 12 for Virginia and 6 for West Virginia, which would leave 125 for the South; add 36 for New York, 15 for Indiana, 9 for New Jersey, 6 for Connecticut and 3 for Nevada, making 191 in all, or 10 less than enough. Or suppose we say 153 for the South, minus 12 for Virginia, 10 for North Carolina, and 9 for South Carolina, where the colored vote exceeds the white vote and is all Republican, making the total of Democratic electors for the South 122; plus 36 for New York, 3 for Nevada, 9 for New Jersey, 6 for Connecticut and 15 for Indiana, or a grand total of 191, or 10 less than enough. But there is no probability that Blaine will not get the 6 votes of Connecticut, or the 15 of Indiana; while there is a probability of his carrying New York and New Jersey. As for the South, we look to see that line broke in three and probably five States, for it will be very dangerous to repeat the Bourbon game of last year in the Virginia local election this year in a Presidential fight.

The O. and C. Lease.

New York, June 27.—The "Tribune" has the following: Details of the agreement for cancellation of the lease of the Oregon and California railroad to the Oregon Transcontinental company have been made, although possession of the property has not been surrendered. Private dispatches from Villard, who recently went to Europe for this purpose, have been received in this city, and the terms of the proposed agreement have been accepted by the directors of the Oregon and Transcontinental company at the meeting at Portland, Oregon, and the Transcontinental company is released from all liabilities under the lease, and has surrendered about \$2,200,000 of Oregon and California second mortgage bonds, on condition that the latter company shall assume all construction accounts and debts, and pay \$446,000 in cash for the release of a part of the bonds which have been pledged by the Oregon Transcontinental company. The construction debts are estimated at about \$200,000, so that the company has sold \$2,200,000 Oregon and California seconds at about 35.

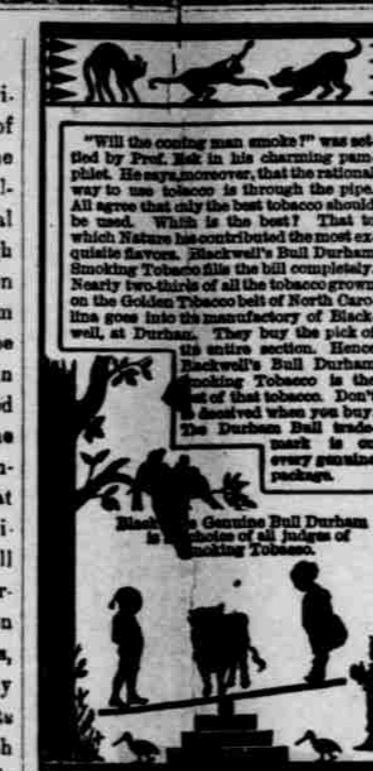

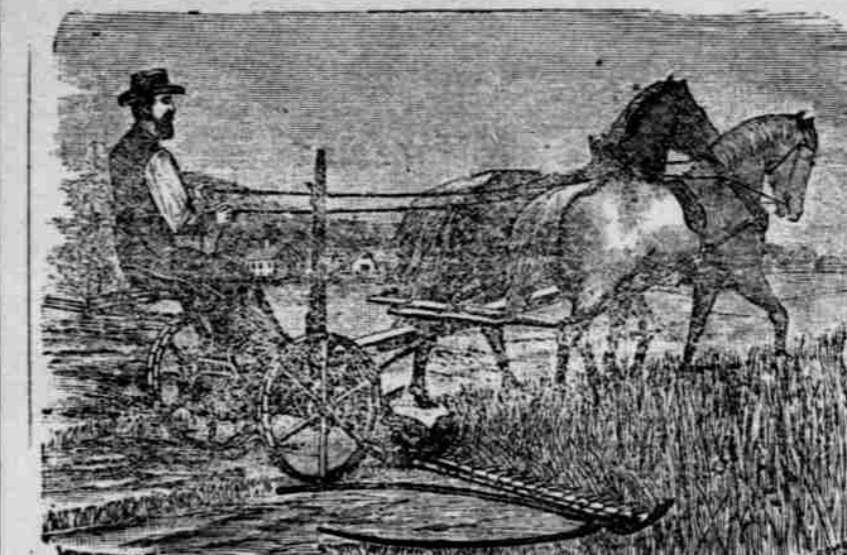
