

How to Cool a Room.

The composing room of the New Orleans "Picayune" is situated in the upper story of its publication house, just under the roof, and in summer is extremely hot. An inspiration seemed to have come to one of the oppressed occupants, and in accordance with it a vertical wooden box was constructed in the corner of the room, with openings at the floor and ceiling, and furnished with a pipe for supplying water at the top, and a pan and drain at the bottom for receiving the flow and carrying it safely away. The supply pipe was bent over the upper end of the shaft, and fitted with a rose like that of a watering pot, so as to deliver a shower of spray instead of a solid stream. On connecting it with the service pipe, the movement of the water was found to cause an active circulation of the air in that part of the room, which was drawn in at the upper opening of the shaft and issued again, cool and fresh, at the floor level. The most surprising thing about the experiment seems to have been the effect of the water in cooling the air to a degree much below its own temperature. With Mississippi water, which, when drawn from the service pipe, indicated a temperature of eighty-four degrees, the air of the room, in which the thermometer at the beginning of the trial stood at ninety-six, was cooled in passing through the length of the shaft to seventy-four degrees, or about twenty degrees below the temperature at which it entered, and ten degrees below that of the water which was used to cool it. Of course the absorption of heat by the evaporation of a portion of the water, accounts for its refrigerating effect, but the result seems to have been so easily and inexpensively attained, that the experiment would be well worth repeating in other cases.

Henry Ward Beecher is a great preacher, but he is a gusher in politics. His prejudices are strong, and his judgment of men and measures unclouded. I join with you most heartily, then, in rendering my testimony to respect to Dosey for the great services he has performed in the campaign, which has changed the aspect of the whole continent for the next ten or fifteen years." Now Beecher has advanced to such a stage of purity that he cannot vote for Blaine. We submit that it is time Beecher retired from public view.

Margaret Brent, said John L. Thomas in a lecture before the Maryland Historical society, was the first woman in America to claim the right to vote. She landed in St. Mary's City on the Mary's river in 1638. She was connected with Lord Baltimore either by blood or marriage. Leonard Calvert, Lord Baltimore's brother, suddenly prostrated on his deathbed, and not having time to make his will, said to Margaret Brent: "Take all and pay all." Then he asked for a private conference with her, and she received his dying words. She took the governor's house and lived in it. As Leonard Calvert was agent of Lord Baltimore, she claimed control of all rents, issues, and profits of Lord Baltimore. The court confirmed her in his position. She claimed that she had the right to vote in the assembly as the representative of Leonard Calvert, and also of Lord Baltimore. She claimed, not one, but two votes. On January 21, 1648, when the legislature assembled at Fort St. Johns, she demanded her right to vote as a member of the general assembly of the state of Maryland. It was denied her.

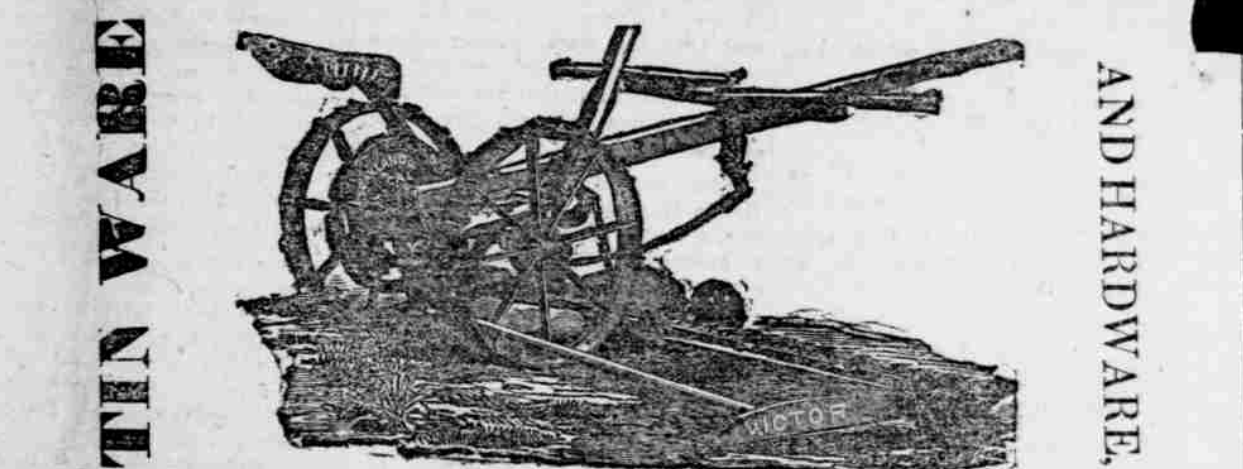
