

REPUBLICAN TICKET.

For President, James G. Blaine, of Maine. For Vice President, John A. Logan, of Illinois.

Nominees for Presidential Electors, D. P. THOMPSON, of Multnomah, WARREN TRUITT, of Polk, J. C. LEASURE, of Umatilla.

Governor St John has telegraphed his acceptance of the Prohibition nomination for the Presidency.

It is claimed by the Republicans in Baltimore that twenty of the thirty-seven lodges of Knights of Labor in that city have passed resolutions favorable to Blaine.

Lieut. Frederick Schwatka, of Arctic fame, has resigned from the army, and his resignation has been accepted.

An informal ballot was taken at a large iron foundry in New York, on Saturday, of the presidential preferences of 205 moulders, with this result: For Blaine, 181; for Cleveland, 24. They were mostly democrats.

There are now six candidates nominated for president. Blaine, Republican; Cleveland, Democrat; Butler by two conventions, Anti-Monopoly and Greenback; Pomeroy, by the American Prohibition, and St. John by the Pittsburg Prohibition convention.

According to the Boston Herald there is talk in Democratic circles of putting John L. Sullivan in nomination for Congress in Gen. Collin's district. If John should be elected, Massachusetts would have a Democratic Congressman with a national reputation.

Whatever may be said against Blaine, he has the record of a man of recognized abilities as a leader and a statesman. If elected he will be President; not the weak tool of designing schemers. He has been before the public for a quarter of a century, most of that time in congress, and who is there of his ability and prominence who has a clearer record?

Of the twenty one Presidents of the United States, twelve were of English descent—Washington, John Adams, Madison, Monroe, John Quincy Adams, Harrison Tyler, Taylor, Fillmore, Pierce, Lincoln and Grant. Five were of Scotch-Irish lineage—Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Johnson and Arthur; two were of Scotch—Grant and Hayes; one of Welsh descent—Jefferson; and one of Dutch—Martin Van Buren.

In deciding a Minnesota land case, the Secretary of the Interior holds that the fact of an assignment of land entry does not vest in the assignee a perfect title, so as to compel the issue of patent. The Secretary of the Interior has jurisdiction, the same as courts have afterward, to examine the question of original right, and to cancel the entry in the same manner as courts may cancel patents, if fraud was practiced by the pre-emptor.

Here is a good political sign. The Examiner abuses the Irish. Hear it: "An Irishman supporting Blaine chooses between his fealty to the party that has always befriended him and his race, and the party that has always denounced them. The curlicking hand that smites him has never been regarded as the illustration of Irish character." An editor of the Examiner is an old Kentucky Know Nothing, one of whose family tried to fit out a privateer on this coast to help English cruisers to prey upon American commerce during the secession rebellion.

Our cotemporary under the head of "Political Harmony," says: "Not a single Democratic newspaper or Democrat of any prominence has pronounced against Cleveland and Hendricks, while in another column he endeavors to explain that—Tannany is divided in its opposition to them and that the report that the laboring classes east of the Rocky mountains are opposed to them is one of the bossess' favorite dodges. Now our cotemporary should have left out one or the other of these items or have published two editions this week for he is so plainly manifesting Democratic enthusiasm and drawing on his fertile imagination for the facts (f) that he can hardly be able to hoodwink even a Chinese voter in November if he goes on in this way showing up his own inconsistencies to obtain material to bolster up his cant diflates. Won't some intelligent Democrat stop him."

The Suffrage Question.

The extreme advocates of the woman suffrage amendment are circulating petitions asking that the measure be submitted to the people at a special election, claiming that it cannot get justice at a general election. The disastrous defeat of the amendment at the late election was not due to frauds, as might have been reasonably claimed, had it received anything near a majority vote, but solely to a strong public sentiment against it; and to thus ruthlessly attempt to force it before the people again, savors of a determined effort to thwart the will of the people, and will have the effect to prejudice the more conservative advocates against it. Such a radical change in our political system as would be engendered by the enfranchisement of women should be reached by a legitimate outgrowth of public opinion in its form, and while the friends of the measure endorsed its having been submitted to the people once, not with a hope of its success, but that public thought should be awakened, and that the people should weigh and measure it and consider it in all its possible results on our social and political institutions, the more conservative element will regard the present effort as detrimental to its final success. We believe that a large majority of the women of Oregon are opposed to the enfranchisement of women and that they would not have availed themselves of the privilege had it resulted favorably to them. We are in favor of woman suffrage and believe that it will be attended by the most favorable results in every way when the people shall have reached a proper understanding of the possibilities that will attend the great counsels and deliberations of the sexes in politics but are opposed to the agitation of the measure again until a majority of the women of Oregon shall have indicated at least an interest in it, and it is a matter of great surprise that men occupying high positions of honor and trust should endorse such petitions with their signature, even if accompanying them with their objections, and such persons will really be as much responsible as the petitioners should our Legislature be importuned on this subject again. But we presume as long as there is an Eve to tempt him, man will silence the voice of his better judgment and say "the women beguiled me and I did so" and to this class belongs every man that voted in favor of it at the last election to "please my wife." We want the women of Oregon to ask for the right of suffrage and then, as now, we will conscientiously and earnestly advocate it, believing that it will be attended with beneficial results, morally, socially, and politically.

Another of Gov. Cleveland's Vetoes.

Attention has been called to two of the vetoes of Governor Cleveland, which seriously affected the interests of people of limited incomes, and protected corporations in their exactions. These would seem to be sufficient to prove that Governor Cleveland is unfeeling of the well being of the masses, or he is lacking in the intelligence necessary to look out for the interests of the people at large. But a still more damaging veto has been brought to light—the veto of a bill passed by the legislature, which was designed to give laborers and mechanics a lien upon buildings in the construction of which they are employed. There is not a mechanic or even a hod carrier in the country who does not understand the value of such a law to him. Tens of thousands of men are employed by contractors upon buildings of all kinds. If the contractors should neglect to pay the mechanics and other laborers they would have no special remedy without a law which will give them a first claim upon the building for their wages. In all the states such laws afford protection to all kinds of laborers. They are just laws, because the man who sells labor usually sells it to obtain the necessities of life, while those who furnish capital or material are assumed to be in better circumstances. In this commonwealth, and in all the New England states, the rights of labor in this respect are fully protected by lien laws. In New York they are not. The mechanics of New York asked for this fair protection, and the legislature enacted a bill which, had it become a law, would have secured them their rights. It did not become a law because Governor Cleveland vetoed the bill. In consequence of his action tens of thousands of mechanics and laborers in New York have no remedy if a contractor fails or absconds without paying them. This is the fact. Perhaps some champion of the democratic candidate will undertake the task of explaining his most extraordinary conduct in this matter.—Boston Journal, July 17.

Death of Col. I. R. Moores.

Col. I. R. Moores died at his rooms in De-kum's block of apoplexy. He had a slight paralytic stroke a short time since from the effects of which he had not entirely recovered, although he had been able to attend to his duties. He was late at his desk yesterday morning and remarked that he had over-slept himself. He went to his luncheon at the usual hour and ate heartily, but remarked to a friend that he did not feel well. He did not return to his office and about 3 o'clock was found lying on his bed at his rooms, partially undressed, and unconscious. Dr. Watkins was at once summoned but the sufferer was past medical aid, and died at 10:20 last night without having recovered consciousness. His sons arrived from Salem by special train, and were in attendance at the deathbed. Mrs. Moores is in the east. The body will be embalmed and taken to Salem, but it is not yet settled when the funeral will take place. Mr. Moores was a native of Danville, Ohio, and one of the early pioneers of this state. He has been a resident of Salem for many years, and was widely known and universally respected. He was in business at Salem for about fifteen years, was a member of the legislature and has filled many offices of trust. He has been connected with the land office of the O. & C. railroad since it was instituted. He was 53 years of age, and leaves several sons to mourn the loss of a kind father. He was Grand Treasurer for the order of I. O. O. F., A. O. U. W., and Masons in this State.
