More Civil Service.

It will be remembered that after Kelley had been put in possession of the Cayote creek mine in accordance with an order of this court, Ruble procured the arrest of Kelley's men who were working in the mine for barony. They were taken before Justice Browning and were held three days, the preliminary testimony all being written down by Mr. Browning's son by direction of Mr. Browning and at the expense of the county. In obedience to a telegram the District Attorney went down to investigate the matter, and after fully satisfying himself that the men were there by authority of law, he dismissed the whole matter, as trumped up and unworthy of notice. A short time afterwards these same men were again arrested upon the same charge and taken before this same Justice Browning where they were subjected to a week's investigation, the testimony all being written down as before. They were this time held to answer by Mr. Browning and sent in here, in charge of an officer, and after an examination of the matter by the Circuit Judge, the charges were found to be wholly without foundation, and they were discharged. In dismissing the defendants the Judge made a forcible speech, in which he said it was the first time he had ever heard of men being bound over without some shadow of authority; in this instance he had found none whatever, and he took occasion during his pointed remarks, to censure Mr. Browning for his action in the matter. The District Attorney went before the Board of Supervisors, the charges were discussed, and when the bills for this mock investigation were put in, they were one and all promptly disallowed by the court. At the time the men were arrested they were in the mine at work under authority of the circuit court of this county. Mr. Browning knew this, knowing as he ought to have known and did know that the arrest and subsequent investigation were a farce and only intended to subvert a purpose, and that the attendant expense was unauthorized and illegal, and in every sense inexcusable. Now comes the new Board, and as we are forced to believe, without investigation, audits and allowances these same bills including the large item for taking down the testimony, amounting to \$238.70. Such an allowance has never been made by any Board before, and we hope in consideration to tax-payers and for the credit of this and other boards that it may never be done again. Besides this Board had no right either in law or fact to review and set aside acts of the former Board, and especially acts of this character. The Board has gone beyond its jurisdiction and has laid itself liable to the charge of not knowing any more law than it ought, to fill a position of such responsibility. The only way this matter could have been legally reached was by a writ of review to the circuit court. There is no such thing known in law or common sense as an appeal from one county court to another. If there was, no act of our county court would be worth a straw and might be reversed at any time. The allowance of this bill under the circumstances ought to, and will, subject the Board to the severest censure.

The "Times" says "an extravagant inefficient prosecution of criminals has had more to do with the present indebtedness of Jackson county than anything else." He refers to the same Democratic Prosecuting Attorney whom he has been lauding to the skies for the last eight years, but when he refuses to wear the nickel plated collar the editor of the "Times" piles the whole county indebtedness on him. The present officials, for whom the "Times" has been industriously apologizing and explaining, came near saving us the expense of the "inefficient prosecution" of our criminals, and still our Democratic friends don't "happy." Why Irish-Americans Support Blaine.

The Independent Republicans in supporting Cleveland have a clearly defined object in view. They recognize in him a man of their own way of thinking, who, if elected, will be ready to carry out their Free Trade programme. Now, Free Trade is in the interest of England and for that reason the Independent Republicans, who are pro English to a man, favor it. In supporting Cleveland they are, therefore, actuated by the wish of assisting England.

Now, to the question of the Independent Republican organs, "What do his Irish-American supporters expect of Mr. Blaine?" We answer, absolutely nothing except what is for the best interests of the United States. Irish Americans do not expect and they do not ask that Mr. Blaine, if elected, will in any way intermeddle in Ireland's affairs. All they demand is that in our foreign relations he will carry out his own views of the rights of American citizenship as embodied in the following extract from his letter of acceptance:—"Citizenship of the Republic must be the panoply and the safeguard of him who wears it. The American citizen, rich or poor, native or naturalized, white or colored, must everywhere walk secure in his personal and civil rights. The Republic should never accept a lesser duty, it can never assume a nobler one, than the protection of the humblest man who owes it loyalty—protection at home and protection which shall follow him abroad in whatever land he may go upon a lawful errand." This is an American policy that, of course, does not meet with the approval of the Independent Republicans, who believe that England ought to be permitted to spit her contempt on American citizenship whenever she finds it convenient to do so.

Because thousands of Irish Americans are signifying their intention of voting for the man who proposes carrying out this policy, independent Republican organs, like the New York "Herald," are charging them with thinking more of Ireland than of the United States. Just as if upholding the dignity of American citizenship were not a question affecting the interests of the United States.

The Irish-Americans who refuse to support the Independent Republican candidate, will vote for Mr. Blaine. It does not because they are in an American policy and do not want to see Free Trade forced on the United States, and American citizenship despised in every country in Europe—"Irish World."

More Recruits Coming.

We are creditably informed that Wm. Wilshire of Ashland has joined the Blaine and Logan club of that place and declares his intention to vote for them in November. Mr. Wilshire was one of the leading Democrats of this county, and he, and Mr. Nickell of this place, represented the Democracy of old Jackson in the State convention last Spring. He was also Mr. Nickell's favorite aspirant for the nomination of Prosecuting Attorney of this District. We welcome Mr. W. as a member of the party of progress and hope that he may ever remain a faithful member thereof. Would it not be proper for the editor of the "Times" to follow the example of his friend in this great and glorious cause? What say you, Charles?

Last week's issue of the "Times" refers to the "handsome style" in which the sheriff recaptured Bassett and returned him to jail. This is something entirely new in the fall and winter styles not observed in the fashion reports of other journals, and will not probably be as popular with our people as the old fashioned way of keeping criminals without so much catching. The "flimsy locks" that the "Times" makes great ado about have always answered well enough to hold our criminals under other official administrations, and "additional bolts and bars" only mean additional expense to the county unless the criminals are properly guarded.
