

The Scandals

The substantial facts in the scandals affecting these two persons have now been laid before the public and to a limited degree before the readers of the "Sun."

The charge regarding Mr. Blaine refers to events said to have occurred in the year 1851, thirty-three years ago. According to the very worst interpretation which his antagonists seek to put upon the case, the accused repaired all the wrong that it is pretended he ever committed—and it is by no means proved that he committed any—in fact, he denies it entirely—in the one way in which a man of honor and a gentleman misled into such a situation, must repair it; and ever since that his mode of life has been moral, decorous, and reputable. We conclude, then, that Mr. Blaine is not to be condemned as a candidate on this account, even supposing that the worst state of facts—which he earnestly denies—should be established, not only because he repaired the wrong, but because his life has ever since been all that could be required. We add, here, that, in view of all the circumstances of the case, it is, in our judgment, an unspeakable outrage to bring forward such an accusation. It is an outrage if the accusation is true, and it is infinitely more an outrage if it is false.

With Mr. Cleveland, however, the situation is different. The particulars are not denied; in fact, they are admitted, the only variation in the admission put forward in his apology being that some of his defenders seek in addition to defame the woman without producing any evidence to support that position. All of them join in admitting the main facts. They also join in admitting with some minor discrepancies that the unfortunate woman was put into an asylum without authority of law by some of his friends and representatives; and it appears, likewise, that the equally unfortunate illegitimate child was kept for a considerable period of time in the county poorhouse, although his father was in prosperous business at the time. As for repairing the wrong done to the betrayed woman, we hear nothing of it in the case of Mr. Cleveland. A stone could not have shown less conscience than he.

On this state of facts, Mr. Cleveland is to be condemned most severely. For this cause alone, if there were no others, we say that he is not a fit man to become chosen President of the United States, and his election would be a serious public calamity.

A Sad Ending.

Nothing has heretofore been said of a very important fact that has been known to the general public for some time past and that is, that General and ex-Senator Nesmith is suffering from aberration of the mind and has at last been placed for treatment with Dr. Carpenter, at the Asylum. Kindly feelings toward a much respected family has prevented any reference to this unhappy matter but now the fact of his mental disorder is so firmly established that it need no longer be concealed. Mr. Nesmith appears in good bodily health and no cause is assigned for his mental malady. It is hardly possible to imagine how so strong a mind could be undermined in this way but so it is, and one of the brightest among the early pioneers to the Pacific is a wreck. It is to be hoped that care and treatment will bring back its tone and vigor.

The family of Mr. Nesmith has suffered great apprehension for months past, and finally secured competent professional advice, which decided that the disorder of mind was certain, and so far advanced that no time should be lost in seeking relief. It was decided that the only possible alleviation might come from travel and change of scene. Mrs. Nesmith and his son William had started with him, intending to make a visit to California, but he became so much worse on arriving at Portland that the journey was abandoned.

Ex-Senator Nesmith has filled an important place in the history of Oregon, and, during the war, when he was in the U. S. Senate, and a member of its military committee, he proved his devotion to his country and his sincere patriotism. He had the warm personal friendship of Lincoln, and commanded his confidence. We have listened with great interest to his accounts of the war episodes he figured in, and have heard him express the most sincere admiration for the character of Lincoln. Many will join in the hope that he will be himself again.—"Willamette Farmer."

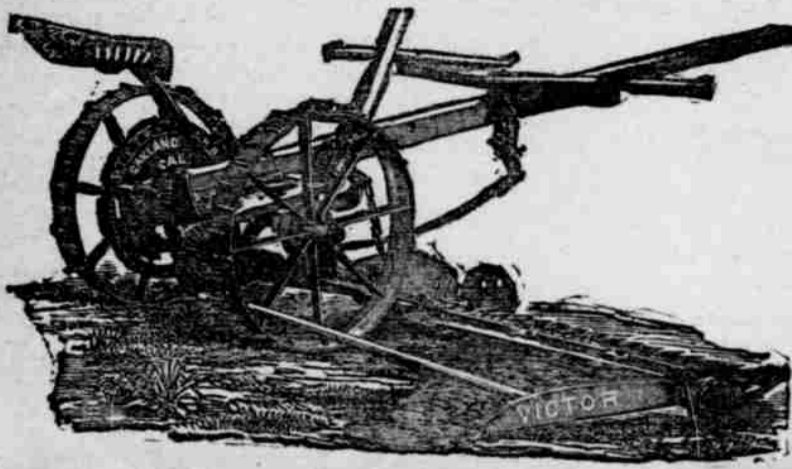
