A GOOD SHOWING.—Jay Beach's trotting stallion, Altamont lowered his record at the Union county fair this week, trotting one heat in 2:24 1/2 which we believe is the fastest time ever made in Oregon.

REPORTED DEATH.—San Francisco papers this week published death notices of Mrs. Clara Van Vorst in Yolo county Oct. 4th. No further information has yet been received but the deceased is supposed to be the daughter of Mrs. Little of this place.

DISCONTINUED.—The Northern Pacific Express Co. have discontinued business on the line of the O. & C. R. R. and Wells Fargo has a monopoly once more. J. R. Little, their local agent here received instructions to refuse express matter after Monday of this week.

LEAP YEAR PARTY.—The lady members of the leap year party held a meeting at the Town Hall last Thursday evening and decided on having the ball on the 24th inst. A full programme will be submitted next week and all who fail to receive invitations soon can consider themselves left.

Vermont gave her full Republican majority and Maine completely eclipsed her own record, giving at least ten thousand greater majority than the most sanguine had dared to hope for, and next Tuesday Ohio will add to the list such a startling array of figures that even hopeful Republicans will be satisfied.

The railroad company was assessed \$2500 per mile by Assessor Nichols for their line of road through this county and the company's agents went before the Board of Equalization this week to have it reduced. The Board decided, however, to leave it as it was—one action which they will be sustained in by the whole community.

BLACKLEG IN SCOTT VALLEY.—When Mr. Glendenning returned home to Scott Valley, from the Fair, in Yreka, he sent one of the boys out in the field to see how the calves in the field were getting along. Among the 300 head, 11 were found dead, 2 more died the same night, and 2 more were found dead next morning, or 15 in all. The disease with which they were afflicted, is supposed to have been blackleg, which is very severe on young cattle and calves. —Yreka Journal.

DEATH OF AN OREGON CADET.—Fred Schwatka Strang, the young man who was appointed to a cadetship in the naval academy at Annapolis, about the 1st of August, after having arrived at the academy passed a very satisfactory examination; but a few days after his admission was violently attacked with inflammation of the bowels, which finally led to his death on the 30th ult., and all the high hopes of a bright young man were dashed into the abyss of death in less than a month.
