"General, where is your corps?"

Hancock looked up, and, with the deepest regret in his tones, said: "It is buried between the Rapidan and the James."—Philadelphia Press.

Hog Disease.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 6.—Pneumonia has broken out in a serious form among the hogs in Western Maryland, and the animals are dying by the hundreds. Governor Hamilton to-day wrote a letter to Dr. Ward, State Veterinary Surgeon, stating that the disease is raging with great violence in Washington county, where the Governor resides, and although every remedy has been tried, so far nothing has been of the least avail in staying the plague. Governor Hamilton has lost over 100 hogs and shoats. The carcass of a hog which died Saturday was examined. The teeth were black, gums much diseased and the exhalations offensive in the extreme. Dr. Ward has replied to Governor Hamilton's letter that he will visit the locality to-morrow. He says the disease was at first of very small proportions, but has been spread through the reprehensible custom of casting the dead carcasses in the river.

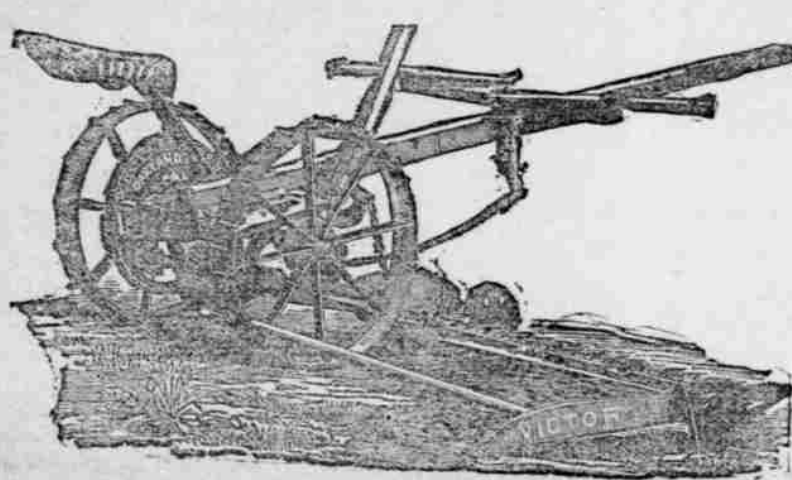
