Cleveland's Picture.

The New York "Sun" credits Mr. Alexander Sullivan, the eloquent Irish American leader, with presenting a better likeness of Cleveland than any orator or writer who has tried his tongue at the task.

"Dull, cold, sluggish, without experience as he is without education, unable to speak with propriety or fire his own language, or to write it with grammatical certainty; a man whose nature is harsh, whose hand is frigid, whose heart has gone up to the rich and powerful, and whose feet have spurned the claims of the toilers of his own State."
