## Latest From New York.

The "Mail and Express" of New York, published on the evening of the 11th, sums up the matter as follows: "The official canvass of the vote of this State is in progress to day. Few changes were made by the canvassers yesterday. It is now generally conceded that the vote of the counties above the Harlem bridge cannot be changed to affect Cleveland's plurality. An accidental error may entirely wipe out the plurality, and on this alone are based the hopes of the Republicans. At midnight forty of the sixty counties have been heard from officially. They gave a net gain of 33 for Cleveland, leaving his plurality at 1225. According to the claim of the Democrats this practically ends any probability of any serious increase to Blaine's majorities in the rural counties, although it is fair to bear in mind that when gains are expected the canvass is delayed, and a case may yet be presented in the eight or ten counties where cases have been made up. The real fight is in this city, and Republican hopes were greatly dampened when Elihu Root announced yesterday that he found the majority to be 43,226 wiping out the gain of 426 votes announced on Saturday. The total number of votes reported which, in some form or another, George Bliss expects to take exceptions to the informal count already had, is about 4000. About one third of these are defective or blank ballots, and the rest are Butler, St John and other votes which were miscounted, excluded or otherwise added to swell the Cleveland vote."

## Canvass in New York.

On November 11th the sixty boards of county supervisors of New York state, forty-three of which are Republican and seventeen Democratic, met at their county seats, to open and canvass returns by election districts. Of course it is not known, officially, what the plurality is even on the face of the returns, until this canvass is made; much less can it be declared whether the plurality rests on accurate returns. The election laws require that at every county seat, there shall be deposited returns for each poll made out, by the inspectors of the election, and at the close of the continuous session, they are required to count, announce and record the vote. The ballots counted are destroyed in every county but Kings. The boards of supervisors can correct manifest clerical errors, but this is all they can do, and when it comes to determine what a clerical error is, a difference of opinion cannot be finally determined, if either party chooses to resort to the supreme court of the state for a mandamus. The law specifies in this state the proper caption and type of a ticket, and it is the duty of the election inspector to see that none but such ballots as are stipulated by statute are voted. In N. Y. city and elsewhere, it is said, quite a large number of Republican ballots were rejected, because, in cutting the tickets apart, the names had been slightly clipped. It is stated the validity of these ballots will be made a question for the courts to decide, both by Republicans and Democrats.

The Plenary Council which convened at Baltimore Sunday, is the largest Catholic Council which has ever met in the country. The first Plenary Council convoked by Archbishop Kerrick, met May, 9, 1852. There were present six Archbishops, twenty-five Bishops, one Mirrored Abbott, eleven Superiors of religious orders and seminaries, twelve Vicars General and a great number of clergymen.

Present estimates as to the complexion of the Illinois State Legislature are that it will be a tie in joint ballot, the Senate having the majority of one Republican and the House a majority of one Democrat. Contests are likely to ensue in three districts, which may reverse this condition of affairs. The situation is made more interesting from the fact that a successor to Senator Logan is to be elected.

Burchard the preacher who sadly damaged Blaine by his fanatical outbursts in New York against "Rum, Romanism and rebellion," is now said to be a Cleveland man in disguise. This would be in accord with the tactics used against the Republican candidate. Whatever Burchard may be in politics, in actual life he is an one of the most aggravated type.

## Wilted Them.

Old Sol Miller, editor of the Troy Kanzer, "Chief," and who has a wide reputation as the possessor of a pen dipped deep in red-hot gall, but withal a little wicked and a good deal irreverent, was recently nominated for the Kansas Senate by the Republicans. The religious element held a meeting, and indignantly determined not to support him. The crowd was large, unanimous and enthusiastic. They appointed a committee, so the story goes, to wait on old Sol, and notify him that he must withdraw or they would bust him. The committee found the old man in his sanctum, and proceeded to unfold their mission. When the spokesman had finished and the others of the committee had endorsed his remarks, the old grey headed editor straightened to his full height, pointed a long, bony finger at the committee, while a strange glitter came into his eyes, and he spoke in low, freezing tones: "For thirty years I have been publishing a paper in this town. Not a week has passed in all that time but some truly good Christian man has been to me and begged that something to his discredit should be withheld from publication. I have always complied. But the articles, though not printed, were always written and filed away. I'm a methodical man. I have more than one thousand articles written in reach of my hand, embodying every disreputable scrape and adventure that the 'best and religious element' in this community has been engaged in for the past thirty years. And I just want to say that if I am beaten at the polls I will start a daily paper the next day, and I will never stop until I have printed every one of those stories. That is my answer." The committee crept quietly out and returned to the meeting to make their report. A silence like that of death fell upon the assembly, till the purring of a cat upon the pulpit cushion sounded like the filing of a circular saw. For ten minutes no one spoke, when at last the sexton said, "I move we adjourn." It was carried unanimously. And thus miserably perished a promising independent movement.—"Globe."
