And Yet the Solid South.

When the men, late in the rebellion against the old flag, gathered at Chicago, their first promise to northern Democrats was the support of the Solid South. All through the campaign northern papers repeated the assurance, and even to the very last hour before election the same solid south assurance rang in our ears. How long would the Democrats of the north allow a Democratic majority to be suppressed in a few, say, of the northern states? Well do we know that the Republican party would not allow the attempt by their own friends to suppress or drive away by intimidation a single Democratic vote. Republicans believe that whenever the time comes that the intimidation policy is inaugurated at the north, the liberties of our people shall have been overthrown. And now are we to hear the exulting cry that the negro vote is squelched, that the whole Republican vote in the south is set aside, and rest contented? When the election of Tilden was claimed and the great cry rose up all over our land that he was counted out by fraud, Democrats knew as well as the sun shone, that several southern states had effectively prevented the colored vote a full expression, and while they cried fraud, they themselves were guilty of a most despicable outrage against the Republicans of the South.

Now how long are we to endure this thing? When the least prospect of the success of the Democratic party brings out hurrahs from throats that were dumb and tongues that were tied at the overthrow of rebellion, what next are we to expect? When in the feeble sunshine of apparent Democratic success the old copperheads crawl out of their holes, draw forth their forked tongues and hiss forth their greetings to the echo of secession, does it take a very penetrating glance to perceive that away down in their contracted bosoms rankle the same animosities, the same subservience to southern dictation, and the same disposition to lay the glories of a great free nation at the feet of the old decayed gentility of the blustering south? The Republican party owes it to the world, America, to the United States, to herself, to awake from her lethargic sleep, and concentrate her energies in a still more determined resistance to the encroachments of the enslaving and denigrating theories of a past generation. It will not do to suppose that old sinners are converted because they are quiet. The party of progress, moral, social, and political must not abate one iota of her zeal, nor take for granted anything as to the repentance of her foes. Onward! Onward! must be her motto. If cranks desert her, or enthusiasts approach her, she must pay no regard whatever to their threats but pursue the even tenor of her way, amid all discouragements or defeats, knowing that as the metals are most beautiful and most enduring are those tried in the fiercest fire, so the principles that survive the most intense bitterness of party strife, are those that bring with their triumph a glory no trickery can obscure nor false logic tarnish in the least.

It has been suggested more than once in the late campaign that a reform should be demanded in the manner of carrying on a Presidential campaign. The present plan of putting a partial stop to business and allowing political candidates to talk for two months before an election is regarded as an unnecessary waste of time and effort. Thirty years ago, when the telegraph was little used, the time was none too long for all constituents to get a fair idea of a candidate's opinions, but now, when every one in the country may read a great speech the day after it is delivered, the case is entirely changed. Shortening the canvass would reduce the cost of a campaign and it would reduce also the chances for the elaborate schemes of fraud which are now so frequently worked up.

An interesting feature of the World's Exposition at New Orleans will be a united encampment of veterans of the war, embracing the soldiers of the Union and Confederate armies. The Board of Managers of the Exposition have voted \$10,000 for this purpose, and 1,000 tents will be constructed for the free accommodation of the veterans.

General Sheridan in his annual report says it would require an army of a million and a half to successfully invade this country, but thinks the greatest danger is not invasion; the trouble he anticipates will be in our midst and will come through the strained relations between capital and labor.

Victors and Spoils.

In the following from the San Francisco "Post" let the reader use the word Oregon instead of California and it hits to a dot.

Everything now points to the conclusion that the "solid South" has gained a victory over the North. The sound of the fish horn is heard in the land, and the Democrat prowls the street at all hours of the night with a stuffed bird on his hat, a tin horn in his hand and his last free lunch floating in whisky. He is right. It is a long time since he had a time to rejoice, and he should make the best of it. The South has gained a victory at last, and the Northern Democrat is just fool enough to suppose he is going to have his share in the division of the loot. In that he is very much mistaken. The New York Democrat may get something, the balance nothing; the California Democrat less than nothing. He will not be recognized in any way. He will not even have a Representative in Washington to ask for anything; and if he had, he would be met with the answer: "What have you done for the party?" Who have you elected? The solid South is the Democratic party. It represents 153 votes out of the 219 which Cleveland has. The Bourbon has gained the victory, and he will take the fruits thereof. The Northern mud sill may stand afar off and look on, but he shall not put his nose in the trough. California, more than any other state, will feel the chill of neglect. From Kentucky there will come a man as Collector of Port, and his employees will be imported. The collector of Interior Revenue may be a gentleman from North Carolina, and the railroads will be enriched by the fares of the members of his staff, who will come from the sunny South. The Superintendent of the Mint will come from Alabama and bring his retinue with him.

The Assistant Treasurer will come from Tennessee with his shot gun, his bowie knife and his staff. The United States Surveyor General will arrive from Mississippi, with a magnolia in his buttonhole and a knife in his boot, and behind him will march his clerks and his draftsman. In fact, the inspectors of everything, and everyone of the great army of federal officeholders will come from the land of alligators and alligators. Rejoice, ye Democrats of California, rejoice, early and while there is an opportunity, for wet and chilly blankets is being prepared for you in the South. The solid South has triumphed, and with the assistance of the English duties, the depraved pastor of Plymouth Church, the hiring Schurz, and the unforgiving Nemesis of politics—Conkling, will proceed to take charge of affairs.

Blaine Admits His Defeat.

A special to the "Herald" from Augusta (Me) says: Blaine regards the official count in New York as practically settling the Presidential question. Blaine, it is stated on authority, received this afternoon a telegram from New York announcing the completion of the official canvass in that city and informing him that the plurality for Cleveland in that State would be 1137. The same authority states that Blaine accepts the result very cheerfully, and has no regrets growing out of his connection with campaign. He feels that he made a good fight and gracefully bows to the verdict of the American people. He believes the Republican party will prove true to its grand past and will increase in strength with the coming years. He expects that in 1888 it will again be called back into power. Blaine leaves for Washington in the middle of next week, where he and his family will spend the winter. He has leased the Sargent house, in Farragut square, and will shortly resume his work on the second volume of "Twenty Years in Congress." The volume will be ready in June next for publication.
