MASQUERADE BALL.—Oregonian-Pocahontas Tribe of Red Men will give a Masquerade Ball in their new hall on New Years eve and extend a general invitation to everybody to attend. The advertisement and full programme will appear next week.

FOUND GUILTY.—After staying out 56 hours the jury in the Bassett case, charged with robbing the stage in January last, brought in a verdict of guilty as charged in the indictment and recommended him to the mercy of the court. Sentence will be passed on him to-day at one o'clock.

FOR PORTLAND.—Of those who attended the Democratic jubilee at Portland from this place we have heard of the following: Thos. G. Reames, N. Fisher, A. G. Colvin and family, M. Mensor, Mrs. Joseph Solomon, T. F. and R. V. Beall, R. H. Moore and Wm. Linn. About 75 went from Ashland and the attendance from here could also have been larger if Circuit Court had not been in session. All are expected home this morning.

GOT ROBBED.—A man named Charles Davis was knocked down and robbed in the streets of Ashland last evening shortly after dark the robbers getting away with something like \$180 in gold coin. Davis was also robbed of a valuable gold watch which the attacking party dropped in their hurry to get away. At last accounts no arrests were made. Our citizens should be on their guard at all times as there are numerous hard cases around that will take desperate chances for a very small amount of money. Be prepared to give them a warm reception.

INCENDIARISM.—While passing D. Linn's carpenter shop last Sunday evening about eight o'clock Mrs. E. Jacobs noticed a light there which seemed unusual, when she went to see, she and the two went to the place and found a candle had been placed in the center of a pile of shavings and in a short time more the candle would have burned down and the blaze would have been started. There can be no doubt whatever but what it was the work of an incendiary and was surely a narrow escape. The guilty party has not yet been caught.

SPECIAL MEETING OF STOCKHOLDERS.—George H. Andrews, secretary of the Oregon and California railroad company has issued a call for a special meeting of the stockholders for December 22, in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the board of directors at a meeting held last Friday. The meeting is stated to be for the following purposes: To amend the by-laws and increase the number of directors; to authorize a contract for the completion of the railroad, and to raise sufficient money for that purpose by bonds or other securities; to give bondholders the right of voting for directors; to increase both the common and preferred stock; and to authorize negotiations for the transfer of the road by lease or sale to the Central Pacific.

ANOTHER MURDER.—Lewis McDaniel, an old settler of this county, was found in a dying condition in the road leading to his residence in Ashland last Thursday night about eight o'clock. The appearance indicated that he had been shot by some party unknown while on his way home from the store. When discovered he was just breathing his last and could not tell who shot him or for what cause. Justice E. Banks subpoenaed a coroner's jury for 10 o'clock Friday and immediately telegraphed District Attorney Kent to attend to take evidence but the examination had not concluded last night. A man named O'Neil has been arrested on suspicion and is being held to await developments. Mr. McDaniel was something like 48 years of age, married, and was generally supposed to be well fixed in worldly goods. All kinds of rumors are afloat as to what might have been the cause of the murder, and as the coroner's jury had not yet completed its labors last evening we forbear further comment for the present. District Attorney Kent telegraphed late last evening that "it was a very rough case."

GRAND JURY REPORT.—We the grand jury of the county of Jackson State of Oregon at its November term beg leave to submit this our final report on the condition of the various offices and of the county buildings. We have examined the Court House and from our observation find it complete in all its appointments and an ornament that any county might be proud of. We have examined the county records and find them neat, clean and well kept and all the county records kept in a convenient and safe place. We find that there have been some bills from E. G. Browning, Justice of the Peace of Leland precinct presented to the former board of County Commissioners and disallowed by them and has been taken up and allowed by the present board, and we examined these bills and we are not satisfied in regard to the matters set forth in the said bills and we would recommend this matter adjusted. The bills referred to are as follows: February 27, 1884 as dated Dec. 12, 1883, March 19, 1884. We find the jail small and badly ventilated and from our observation the Sheriff uses all care for the prisoners therein. We have examined the county hospital and found it in good order and the patients well cared for.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19.—M. H. DeYoung, proprietor of the "Chronicle," was shot at 5:30 this evening by Adolph Spreckles, son of Claus Spreckles, the Hawaiian sugar king. The shooting took place in the business office of the "Chronicle," corner of Bush and Kearney streets. Spreckles fired two shots. The first one struck DeYoung in the left arm, a little above the elbow, and the second one hit him in the shoulder. The wounds are not considered dangerous. The cause of the shooting is attributed to an article published in the "Chronicle" Sunday morning, in reference to the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar company, of which Claus Spreckles was president. Adolph Spreckles was arrested and taken to the city prison.
