

Burned to Death.

Mrs. Sally Gilmore, aged 74, residing at Willamette street in Coos county, was burned to death a few days ago by her clothing catching fire at the stove and there being no one near at hand to rescue her by extinguishing the flames. The Coos Bay "News," published at Marshfield, has the following particulars of the deplorable and fatal accident:

Grandma Gilmore, as she was familiarly known, had been totally blind for ten or twelve years, yet she was in the habit of doing a great deal of the housework for her husband and son William, with whom the old folks lived and were cared for. Sunday morning William went to work in a field a half mile or so from the house, and about the middle of the forenoon his father, some 75 years of age, left the house to go to a truck patch a quarter of a mile away, after vegetables for dinner.

When the old gentleman returned to the house he found his wife lying on a lounge, shockingly burned and almost naked, yet some fragments of her clothing adhered to her and were still afire. He at once called his son and such temporary relief as could be given by the means at hand was rendered to the sufferer. Immediately after, a doctor was summoned from Marshfield, but Mrs. Gilmore was beyond medical aid; her injuries and the resulting shock therefore were too much for one of her advanced age and she died within eight or nine hours.

Just how the misfortune happened is unknown. Mrs. Gilmore, being blind, could not, of course, tell exactly how her clothes caught fire. She displayed great coolness and presence of mind in divesting herself of her burning clothing as far as possible, but she died before she could get it off. Her hands, arms and the upper part of her body were fearfully burned, one of her ears being burned to a crisp.

A Hotel in the Sea.

The situation of the hotel where I am stopping is especially charming. It is built over the water, so that the sea actually passes under the rooms. There is a long glass enclosed balcony looking seaward, from which one never tires of surveying the blue Mediterranean beyond and below. There is always variety in the movement of the sea. Now its swash is so gentle and soothing that it is the most effective of lullabies when one wishes to fall asleep. Again, the sea is in an uproar, and the spray leaps up to the very windows. The illusion that we are actually at sea is quite hard to shake off at times. The fish have learned to watch for the refuse that is committed to the sea from the hotel galleries and are consequently very tame. Portly looking fellows a foot or two long come right under the balcony and stare up impudently at us. The temptation is strong to make them atone for their temerity, and not a few of them have been hauled up with rod and line to the broad veranda. One day somebody got up more enthusiasm than usual and cast a torpedo from the balcony into the school of inquisitive marine beauties. A boy sprang in after the explosion and brought three fat fellows to the surface. Many others were stunned, but not sufficient, to keep them from evading the swimmer. Nets are also cast in front of the hotel, and many bushels of fish meat captured.

A Cobra Acts as Nurse.

The cobra is not generally credited with kindly feelings toward humanity; on the contrary, it has the reputation of being almost the equal of the ban-dry in misanthropy. Perhaps, however, it frames the same chase against man, on the ground that whenever it crosses his path he invariably seeks its life. From an interesting incident which occurred lately at Padouet, in the Madras Presidency, it appears that there are some cobras at all events, who experience a yearning for more friendly relations with the human race. An English lady, returning to her house after the evening's drive, was horrified on entering the nursery to see a huge cobra, with expanded hood, rearing itself over her sleeping infant. The reptile did not attempt, however, to harm the baby, but contented itself with softly hissing as it moved its head slowly to and fro. Clearly it must have watched the nurse when putting the child to sleep, and sought in its humble way to execute a lullaby with the proper accompaniments. On an alarm being raised the serpent made off in haste, but without taking even a nibble at the little one. Perhaps it was just as lucky that the latter did not awake a baby in full year has been known before now to provoke even human beings to wrath. —"London Globe."

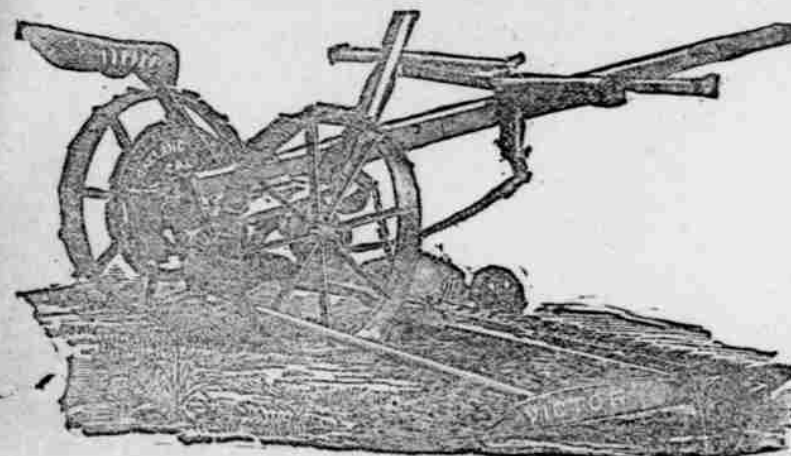
