**THE JUBILEE.**—The largest crowd of people that has been in Jacksonville for many years past attended the Democratic jubilee last night. The proceedings consisted of a torchlight procession, a general illumination, speech making and a free ball. Something like 350 torches were in the line and a fine display was made. An immense crowd attended the ball and everything passed off in good order.

**CHRISTMAS BALL.**—The residents of Medford have just completed a fine school house and being somewhat behind a benefit ball will be given in Byrns' hall on Christmas night. All friends of the school and popular education should come to the front and buy a ticket for \$2.50 whether they attend in person or not and they need never regret giving their money for such a cause. The floor managers are Messrs. D. H. Miller, John Griffin and Carlos Goddard, and all who come may rest assured that they get the best there is in the house.

**RELIGIOUS ITEMS.**—Elder M. Peterson will preach at Grant's Pass next Sunday. There will be regular services in the Catholic Church Rev. F. X. Bianchet officiating. Rev. J. A. Slover will hold services at the M. E. Church in this place Sunday morning and evening. Rev. A. M. Russell will preach at Medford on Sunday Dec. 7th, and regularly on the first Sunday in each month thereafter. Rev. A. R. Bickenbach preaches at Phoenix Sunday morning and at the Presbyterian church in this place in the evening of the same day. The first quarterly meeting of the M. E. Church, South, will be held at Eagle Point on Nov. 29th and 30th. Rev. E. G. Michael, P. E., will preside. Rev. M. A. Williams will preach at Medford next Sabbath, at 11 o'clock. M. also on the second Sabbath in December, at the same place and time. Rev. J. W. Shreve will preach at the Drake school house on the fifth Sunday in this month, at 11 o'clock a. m., and at the Union school house in the afternoon on the same day at 3 o'clock.

**POSTOFFICES.**—The whole number of postoffices is 50,491. Of these eighty-one are first class, 404 second class, and 1837 third class. The remainder are fourth class, and pay the incumbent less than \$1000 a year. There is little competition for fourth class offices, most of them yielding comparatively insignificant commissions. The offices above the fourth class are what are known as "presidential," that is, appointment to them are made by the president and confirmed by the senate. These appointments are for a term of four years, and the present incumbents cannot be legally removed, save for misconduct or disability, until their terms expire. Postmasters of the fourth class are appointed by the postmaster general, and are subject to removal at any time. The safety of the small fry postmasters will depend upon their own conduct and upon the views of the next postmaster general in regard to civil service reform, though most of them don't care whether they are "safe" or not. The Jacksonville postoffice is of the 3d class and postmaster Muller gets a salary of \$1,200 per year. His last appointment dates from May 1884, and it will require cause to remove him before 1888, which will be hard to find. Leaving politics out we doubt if there is another man here that could get anywhere near him in the way of endorsements.

**THE McDANIEL CASE.**—After a thorough investigation of the McDaniel murder case at Ashland the coronor's jury reported as follows and O'Neil is now in jail here having been committed by Justice Eubanks of that place:

We the undersigned, summoned to inquire into the causes which led to the death of Lewis McDaniel, do find as follows: That the person who was killed was a man by the name of Lewis McDaniel, a resident of Ashland, Jackson county, State of Oregon; that said Lewis McDaniel was killed on the night of the 20th day of November, A. D. 1884, at about 7:30 o'clock p. m., on Church street in the Town of Ashland, Jackson county, Oregon, by means of a shot gun which had been loaded with buck shot and fired at the deceased from a short distance. And we believe that said gun was held in the hands of a man by the name of Lewis O'Neil when said Lewis McDaniel was killed; and we hereby charge the said Lewis O'Neil with the murder of the said Lewis McDaniel.

According to telegraphic reports Tom Hendricks, vice president elect, seems to consider Cleveland's election a national disgrace. Trouble has already commenced in the Democratic camp.

Dr. J. A. Child and Robt. Newcomb are projecting an excursion to the Sandwich Islands, to start from Portland about January 11, 1885. The trip will consume ninety days. The expense will vary from \$140 to \$220, including a trip to the volcano.

Robt. A. Cook, ex County Commissioner, is now engaged in building a new town at the mouth of Foothill creek. He has just completed a neat store building at that place for Kubli & Bolt.

Max Brentano came down from Phoenix yesterday to take in the celebration. He seemed to be happy over the Democratic success and says he will now sell goods cheaper than any body.

In the case of S. F. Chadwick against the State for salary as Governor during the unexpired term of Senator Grover, a decision was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, allowing him \$2,500.

Mrs. Lena Peterson, recently here from California, wants to find the whereabouts of her nephew George Peterson, a blacksmith by trade, who is supposed to be somewhere in Jackson county.

Chas. Kiefer, formerly of this place, but now the leading brewer of Albany came up on the excursion after an absence of about twenty years. Outside of gray hairs he looks about as young and hearty as ever.

The latest news in regard to the cholera in Europe is to the effect that it is gradually dying out and will be likely soon to disappear altogether. Italy has suffered much more than any other country where it has made its appearance.

A charge of assault and battery was preferred against Isaac Raglin by J. S. Horn and Justice Foundry defendant Raglin but let him off with out any extra fine Raglin paying the costs in the case. Constable Birdsey made the arrest.

The Justus murder case will not reach the jury till this afternoon. Public opinion seems about evenly divided as to the result of the deliberation. They have been kept together since the trial began in charge of one of the bailiffs of the court.

The Blaine hat club of Sacramento, headed the Cleveland torchlight procession in Sacramento a few nights since, per agreement before the election, and enjoyed the occasion, shooting off fireworks and blowing horns as energetically as the most enthusiastic Democrats.

The total vote of New York at the late election was 1,167,169. The highest Democratic elector received 563,154. The highest Republican elector received 562,005. The highest St. John elector, 25,006. Highest for Butler 17,004. Democratic plurality on highest votes, 1,149.

The only representative from Portland on the Democratic excursion yesterday was Oscar Kilbourn. He says he has not yet changed his politics, if Cleveland is elected, and only came out to represent as the Multnomah Democrats were not in good condition to celebrate the victory in this state.

A doctor in the Yakima country with a practice of \$1200 has only collected \$16 in cash in the last twenty months. The rest has been taken in orders on stores, saw mill, lime kilns, tailors and well diggers. An account of \$7 was taken out in fiddling, and the fiddler could not play but one tune.

A Medford correspondent of the "Tidings" delivers himself of the following in yesterday's issue: One week from today I suppose we shall hear something definite about our roads from here to Jacksonville. We shall see which our county commissioners will work for the farmers and the community in general or the old Jacksonville ring and a few of their allies in this place; for one petition was signed by a large number of farmers in the road district and a number of men this place and the other petition was endorsed exclusively by the men in this town and Jacksonville.

The "Oregonian" tells of a farmer who was trying on Tuesday to get a high price for some turkeys, and finally bet the poulters \$2.50 that one of them would weigh 11 pounds. It weighed 10 1/2 pounds. He settled the bet by giving the poulters a turkey in place of money. This he done because the money was his own and the turkey belonged to his wife.

There seems to be a general impression that railroad work in Oregon and California will be resumed next spring, towards a speedy completion of the gap between Delta and Ashland. The Oregon company will probably make the first start, and the Central Pacific is bound to complete their end for connection, as we understand they are under bonds to effect a junction together.—"Trekka Journal."

Walter Sutton, editor of the "Gold Beach Gazette," arrived in Crescent City from Ellensburg on Saturday, and made this office a pleasant visit, whether more on account of personal acquaintance that makes us feel safe in calling Walter a warm friend or for the common sympathy that exists between newspaper men in general we are not prepared to say, but we were pleased to see him all the same. He runs one of the best little papers in Oregon, considering the meager resources upon which he has to draw, and we are more than glad to understand, by implication, that the people of Curry County appreciate him, electing him to the Oregon Legislature. He goes to Salem soon to labor in the capacity alluded to, and we are fully confident that at the expiration of his term of office not one from among his constituents can point to an instance wherein he did not act conscientiously with regard to his ideas of the "greatest good to the greatest number."—"Del Norte Record."

So THEY WON'T BE IMPOSED ON.—Several Democrats in this city have received this week circulars from Henry N. Copp of Washington, D. C., calling attention to his book which gives a list of all federal offices that pay more than \$500 a year. It says: "Applicants for office, if wise, will buy this book, so that they cannot be imposed on with a small salary, when their special position and political influence ought to be rewarded with an office paying several thousand dollars annually." The book ought to have a large sale in Oregon where there are acres and acres, in fact whole sections and townships of "social position and political influence." Now is the time to push the sale of the work. Perhaps, so says the "Oregonian" after the new president has declared his position on the question of civil service, the demand will not be so great.
