

A Great City.

In old times there were seven "wonders of the world," the greatest of which was the pyramid of Cheops; but our world has wonderful things too numerous to mention, that rival, if they do not excel, the wonders of ancient days. The city of New York has one object of surpassing wonderment in the great bridge, over a mile in length, that spans the strait that separates that city from Brooklyn on Long Island. A suspension wire bridge that, no doubt, is the most wonderful achievement of human skill and labor. It seems impossible that this wonderful and ponderous structure grew from a single wire that was stretched from shore to shore. The great bridge is a beautiful structure viewed from the water above or below. Passing up the Sound at night we saw a wonderful arch of electric lights spanning the water-way beyond and above us. They were the lights on Brooklyn bridge. Passing over this bridge on a clear day it is very beautiful to behold the busy commerce gliding under us and in every possible direction, including great ships and steamers going to or coming from the sea.

Accompanied by a friend, who took pleasure in showing us the new wonders of the great city, we went to the top of several of the greatest buildings on Broadway. From the tower on top of the Equitable Insurance Co.'s building, where the signal service station is kept, we could overlook the great metropolis and its surroundings, certainly one of the grandest sights the world can afford. There is nothing left as nature made it, but we see everything as man has fashioned it. The shores that Hendrick Hudson sailed along, first of white discoverers, are remodeled, built upon and furnished after the designs of man. Every foot of the peninsula on which New York is built is occupied and built upon. Across on the Jersey shore a great city is crowded. The forts in the harbor occupy small islands, and on Long Island are Brooklyn, Williamsburg and Astoria, while Staten Island in the distance, is built up with beautiful towns and suburban homes. This tower is so high that we overlook a wide expanse of land water. Over two millions of people live under our very eyes, and we have in view the commerce of the metropolis of North America. The din of the streets the rush of trains on the elevated roads, the surrounding waters full of shipping of every description, all these things combine to make a picture grand beyond any description.

One could spend days and weeks in such a great city looking at its wonders and studying the different phases of humanity. We visited the immense building of the Produce Exchange, where great transactions are of hourly occurrence. The main hall of this exchange, where business is transacted, is 145x225 feet in size, with telegraph facilities handy, and every modern convenience at command. The building must have cost over a million. It has six elevators constantly going up and down, as the upper story is rented for offices. All the great hotels and business blocks have elevators, by means of which the tenth story of any building is easy of access. We saw an immense building on the New York shore, up the East river, that was thirteen stories high, said to be a tobacco warehouse. Ten stories is not unusual.

The time is not distant when New York and its suburbs will constitute the greatest city on the earth. The growth of our country is indexed by the progress of this great city. It has become a threat to the prosperity of the nation because its population is largely alien, and works with political rings, whose managers are no better than free booters. It possesses the greatest extremes of wealth and poverty and of virtue and vice. Soon New York will not only be the metropolis of America but of the civilized world.

The "capital vs. labor" question is of unending interest in all countries. Next January there is to be held in the city of Edinburgh, Scotland, a conference of artisans capitalists and persons interested in the study of social problems, to discuss from every point of view the questions connected with the distribution of the results of labor between the actual workers and those supplying the capital. A gentleman of Edinburgh has given \$5000 toward carrying out the proposed programme.

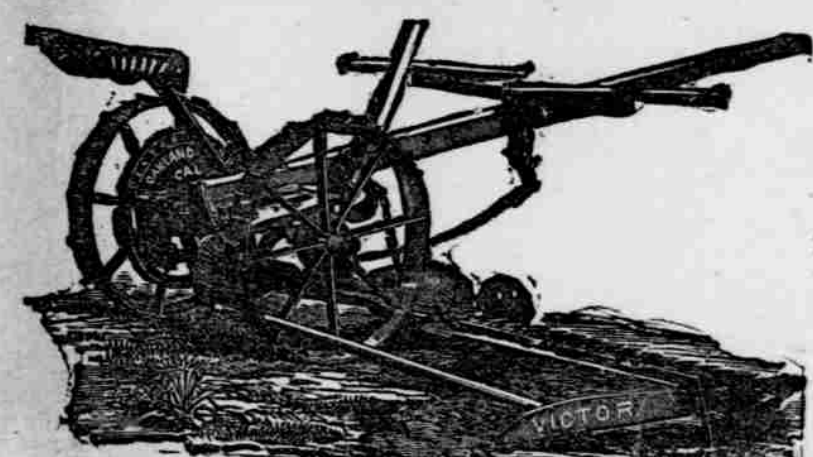
