CHRISTMAS TREE.—A Christmas tree under the auspices of the lady members and teachers of the Presbyterian Sunday School is being decorated with presents for the little ones. FOOT RACE.—A match race for \$500 a side, distance 75 yards, to be run at Ashland on Christmas day, was made between Henry Messer and Charles Pendegast on Thursday of this week and the money has all been put up in Geo. W. Stephenson's hands as stakeholder. Don. Neberker of Ashland puts up on Pendegast and J. R. Little and others back Messer.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES.—Rev. A. R. Biekenbach will deliver a Christmas sermon at the Presbyterian Church tomorrow morning at the usual hour. No services will be held there on Christmas day as was announced. High Mass will be celebrated at the Catholic Church in this place Christmas morning. An excellent choir will be in attendance and the ceremonies will be highly impressive and appropriate to the eventful occasion.

FIFTY CENT.—J. R. Cameron, of the firm of Cesar and Co. of Portland, was in the valley several days this week trying to buy the surplus wheat crop now in the valley. He offers fifty cents per bushel for good clean merchantable wheat delivered at any station on the railroad but says that a cleaning apparatus must be used with all that he has seen so far before it will come up to the standard. Our farmers should prepare for this in the future.

MURDER HANG.—Martin and Wm. Mackey, convicted of the murder of Miss Parrell in Josephine county not long since, made a motion through their attorneys for a new trial. The motion was argued before Judge Webster at Korbville on the 16th inst. when a new trial was denied. On Wednesday they appeared for sentence, which could be nothing less than hanging, and Friday, February 13, 1885, was the date set for the execution. The case will no doubt be appealed to the Supreme Court as a matter of last resort.

THE STORM.—For several days past a heavy rain has been pouring down in Southern Oregon which has been kept up with only short intervals. North of us it snowed first and then turned into a warm rain causing a small flood and damaging the railroad track telegraph lines and other property. Several wash-outs are reported on the railroad north of Oakland and it took three days to repair damages before the first train got through. The barometer was still falling as we went to press and more rough weather can be looked for.

CLOSE CALL.—Last Monday evening T. G. Reames smelled cloth burning and on examining where it came from found the fire in some cotton goods on his shelves. As none about the premises smoked the origin of the fire was a mystery for a while but it was finally concluded that it started from a spark flying over the transom in the back end of the store and falling on the goods. It had made fair headway when discovered and if Mr. Reames had not been close by at the time a first class fire would have been the result. As it was the only loss in the damaging of several bolts of cotton cloth.

Saturday, December 13th, D. B. Newcomb, solicitor for the Pacific Express Company deposited \$50,000 with the State Treasurer at Salem, which entitles said company to do a general forwarding and express business in the State of Oregon. We learn that this company will also do business on the line of the O. & C. railroad, making a competing line with W. F. & Co.

It seems now that the town authorities will either have to stand a law suit or abandon their water right by which the fire cisterns are filled. The privilege belongs to Louis Zigler, deceased, and his heirs now demand a rental of \$100 per year for using the same. The present Board does not seem favorable to the proposition but how the matter will end remains to be seen.

Circuit Court will be in session again next Monday to wind up the business of the term. While this has been one of the largest and most expensive terms ever held in the county there is surely no one to blame besides the large number of criminals that presented themselves for trial. A little judicious hanging would tend towards stepping the commission of so much crime in Jacksonville county.

Ducks and other wild fowl are so plentiful at Klamath Lake, that no one cares to cook and eat them, and the sport of hunting afforded, could break up a man in buying ammunition. We acknowledge a pleasant call this week from Hon. Sol. Hirsch whose name is among the prominent ones mentioned in connection with the Senatorship from Oregon, to succeed J. H. Slater. Mr. Hirsch is an industrious worker, and with his experience as a legislator, having served ten years in the Oregon legislature, and was President of the Senate last term, he could be of more service to the State than most of those whose names are being brought forward for this honor.

Captain Ankeny, the well-known pioneer and mine owner was in a good humor yesterday afternoon when an "Oregonian" reporter met him. He had just returned from the O. and C. train dispatcher's room and learned that it was still raining hard in Jackson and Josephine counties. This means a plentiful stock of water and remunerative places mining during the winter and early spring. Said Capt. Ankeny: "The weather has been very curious for the last three years. For twenty six years I watched the weather in Southern Oregon, and rain always began to fall about October 1, and after that time there never was anything but maddy roads known south of Eugene. Every one who went out with a team always took a rail alone to pry the wagon out of the mud. All this seems to be changed now, and the road between Roseburg and Jacksonville was actually dusty a week ago, and we had this same dry weather every fall since 1881. There was no mining last year to speak of, but it looks as if we will have plenty of water now."
