

Republicans, Attention.

Articles like the following ought to be studied by Republicans in their hour of defeat. It is from a labor journal, the "Slogan."

Summer, Greeley, Julian, C. C. Sumner, Trumbull, General Palmer, Wendell Phillips, General Butler, and numerous others, the lights and leaders of the Republican party when, like Minerva from the head of Jupiter, it sprang into full grown life, abandoned it for conscience' sake. Thaddeus Stevens denounced its financial policy and wept over the consequent ruin which he foresaw. Lincoln said deploringly: "There is one point to which I ask attention; it is the effort to place capital on an equal footing with, if not above, labor in the structure of the government. I bid the laboring people beware of surrendering a power which they already possess, and which, surrendered, will surely be used to close the door of advancement to such as they, and fix new disabilities and burdens upon them until all of liberty shall be lost."

Ponder these words, working men and working women. Lincoln feared that capital should be placed on an equal footing with labor. Who is so blind as not to see that labor is prostrate under the foot of capital? There is the railroad dictating the price of every commodity that is sold in a distant market, and therefore the price of labor which produces it. There are the banks, doing business on a public donation which comes out of the price of labor, with power to regulate the amount of money in circulation, to create "hard times" or "boom" at will. There are the public lands, which it was a radical plank in the early Republican policy to reserve sacred as homes for the people, now sold in quantities large enough for whole States, to corporations, to English lords, and herders of sheep and cattle. There are the thirty thousand million dollars, which Blaine says in his letter of acceptance have been added to the wealth of the nation since 1861, gone all and altogether into the pockets of the Goulds, Vanderbilts, Sages and other thieves. Do you have any doubt that the state that Lincoln feared has already become a pernicious fact, and that capital has been exalted above labor?

Do you know also that the political party which has wholly forgotten the principles of its founders and organized the enslavement of labor into a system, is not the party of Lincoln and Stevens and Seward and Charles Sumner?

Now, what use are the Republicans to make of their defeat? If its members will look at it rightly and wisely, they will see that they have been defeated for their own good. The great masses of the party believe to-day as they did in the days of Lincoln. They hate slavery as they hated it then, and are no more willing to accept the system of oppression of white people than they were then to approve the chattelhood of the black. Has the party, the spirit, the integrity, the purity of purpose to reform itself? Will its people like the native California horse, buck off their riders, face right about on the policy which has led to this defeat, accept manfully the news issues that have come up for solution, and not like moral cowards dodge them? We shall see.

Blaine at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Blaine arrived here this afternoon from New York. There was a desire on the part of some of his friends to make his welcome here a public affair, but when Blaine heard of it he discontinued the whole thing. His arrival here, therefore, was strictly private. He was met at the depot by his son. As he passed along the avenue to M street, in his carriage, he recognized a number of personal friends. Though Blaine stood the fatigue of his wonderful campaign remarkably well, he has not stood his inaction since it closed so well. He looks pale and tired. To a personal friend last night he said he had been suffering from a cold for several days, but beyond that he was as well as ever. He said he intended living as quietly as possible here this winter, and would devote a part of his time to his book, as he desired to complete the second volume by next summer. Since his nomination in June he has, of course, owing to other duties, given but little attention to his book. During that time, however, a great quantity of material has been gathered under his direction, and this he has now to digest and put in shape. Blaine will be here during the inauguration of Cleveland, and may attend the inauguration ball.

CAME NEAR MISSING IT.

How Each Taylor Was Notified of His Nomination.

[Washington Cor. New York Sun.] The convention that nominated Gen. Taylor met in Philadelphia June 7, 1848. The chairman was the Hon. John C. Calhoun, of North Carolina. The 10th of that month Governor Morehead addressed Gen. Taylor a letter officially notifying him of his nomination. The distraction into which the Whig party was thrown by Gen. Taylor's nomination was not made less in the ensuing thirty-five days by the silence of Gen. Taylor. Governor Morehead, in reply to inquiries by leading Whigs—notably Mr. Weed—said that he had positively written the general, and he knew of no reason why the reply was not forthcoming. Gen. Taylor was such a crochety old fellow, and Whig leaders in general knew so little of him personally, that it was not thought best to stir him up on the subject. Letters from the old soldiers were appearing in different quarters, some of them not altogether satisfactory to Whig leaders, but not a word came from him about the nomination. It began to look like an indignity. Mr. Weed, to whom more than any other man Gen. Taylor owed his nomination, was desperate under the suspense. Meetings were proposed, and one was actually called in Albany, looking to the repudiation of the nomination. When it met, however, other counsels prevailed, through the suspense continued.

July 22 the postmaster at Baton Rouge, where Gen. Taylor lived, addressed the postmaster general a letter saying that with the request for the current quarter from that office two bundles of letters were forwarded for the dead letter office, they having been declined on account of the non-payment of the postage by the sender. It was the 10-cent and non-payment time. Of the forty-eight letters thus forwarded to the dead letter office the Baton Rouge postmaster said a majority were addressed to Gen. Taylor, who had declined to pay the postage on them and take them out of the office because his mail expenses had become burdensome. The general had since become aware that some of the letters were of importance, and asked for their return. In due course the letters were sent back to Baton Rouge. Among them was Governor Morehead's letter notifying Gen. Taylor of the action of the Philadelphia convention.

Gen. Taylor's response was dated July 13, a month and five days after the letter of notification was written. It had lain in the Baton Rouge postoffice four weeks after Gen. Taylor refused to pay the 10 cents postage. Gen. Taylor's acceptance was couched in respectful terms, in a letter not exceeding 200 words. He expressed his thanks for the nomination, said he did not seek it, and that if he were elected president, for which position he did not think he possessed the requisite qualifications, he would do his best. He discussed nothing, laid down no principles, and gave no indications what course he would pursue. In this general cut it too short to satisfy the Whigs. He had to write another letter—one of considerable length—to his friend Capt. Allison, in which he set things right. The authorship of this letter was the subject of no little conjecture. If living, Thurlow Weed and Alexander H. Stevens could shed light on the subject.

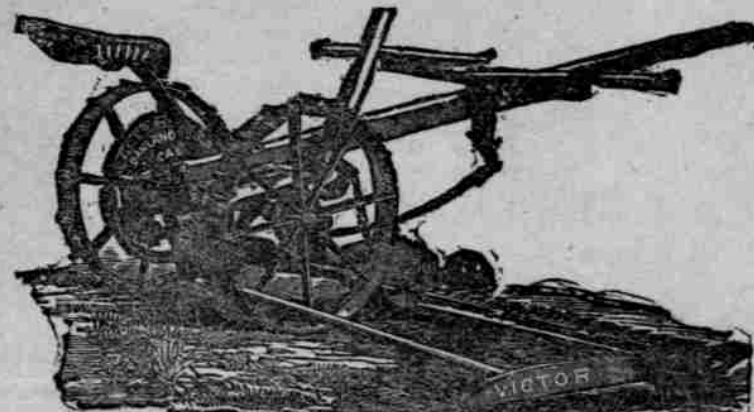
