Senatorial Election

On Tuesday of this week the Oregon Legislature commenced balloting for U. S. Senator to succeed James H. Slater. The Republicans have 14 majority on joint ballot and it takes 46 votes to elect, there being 90 votes in all. The Republicans have held no caucus and consequently every member can vote for his choice as long as he wants to. The Democratic members of that body held a caucus one night this week when the majority present decided not to be bound to any particular man on that side and they are just as free as the other fellows. Up to the time of going to press no election has yet been had although one ballot has been had each day since Tuesday. The action taken by the Democrats would indicate that they are ready to cast their votes for some one they consider their choice among the Republicans, but their being so many candidates on the majority side it will likely be several days before the Senator is elected. We have several times stated our choice and as things look favorable at this time we hope our Representatives will stand firm till the last and thereby secure the best and ablest of all that are mentioned. Absent Warren and Senator Hirsch did not vote.

Senator Miller of Josephine county, upon a petition of citizens of that county and Grants Pass, has introduced a bill to establish the boundary line between that county and this, the object of which is to cut off 4 townships from this county and annex them to Josephine. An effort has been made at each recurring session of the legislature since Hon. N. Langell was a member to cut off these townships, and the proposition has always been met and defeated by our Senator and Representatives, and we predict and hope it will be defeated again. It is apparent that there are many important influences at work to accomplish this object at this session, among which is a determination on the part of its principal advocates to make Grants Pass the county seat of Josephine county, and at the same time to add largely to her population; but it must be remembered that what would be Josephine's gain would be our loss, and we have neither wealth or population to spare. Senator Miller of Josephine who is said to be a Portland capitalist, has large property interests in Ashland and Grants Pass and he was doubtless elected to further this scheme. The "Times" unseasonably congratulated last summer over the election of Miller is now fully explained, as Miller defeated a Democrat. Mr. Nickell also owns large interests in the new town of Grants Pass. So much for the editor of the "Times" since pure Democracy. It required a threatened heavy withdrawal of patronage to induce Mr. Nickell to sign the remonstrance and his silence on the measure indicates clearly that he wants to take his customary "sweet and sour pie" position on this important question. It is clearly evident that the more to divide the county is being made in the interest of a few scoundrel individuals for their own personal gain and we hope the legislature will set emphatically down on them.

British Columbia has on its hands a vexatious and alarming Chinese incubus. It is passing through the same difficulties which for years have menaced the prosperity and retarded the growth of Oregon and the Pacific coast. Cheap labor is not the blessing that many people suppose it to be.

Salaries in Different Countries.

In Hungary each member of the Imperial legislative body receives for every day of the session about \$2.40, besides \$400 annually for lodging; in Austria about \$5 a day during the session. France pays her Senators and Deputies about \$2,250 per annum; Holland about \$850 per annum and traveling expenses; Belgium \$84 a month during the session; Norway about \$3.30 a day and traveling expenses; Portugal, \$2.50 per diem. Members of the Canadian Parliament receive, for every session lasting over a month, \$1,000 and 10 cents mileage; Brazil gives to her Senators \$1,800 for the session, and to the Representatives \$1,200 and traveling expenses; Mexico allows the members of both Houses \$2,000 per annum; the Argentine Republic even goes as high as \$3,500; and in the United States both Senators and members of the House of Representatives receive \$5,000 annually, with mileage at 20 cents per mile.

We hope the people of this county will not fail to note the fact that Mr. Nickell of the "Times" has not even so much as intimated that our people are opposed to cutting off the four townships from our western boundary and adding them to Josephine. In last week's issue he mentioned the matter three or four times without saying a word against it, and this week he is still more profuse in his mention of the matter but—not one word against it. Is it possible that his financial interests at Grants Pass have closed his mouth to the public good? It looks as though our contemporary never had an impulse that rose above his pocket strings. Will our people never fathom him?

This Sarah Althea business, says the Colusa "Sun," will yet bring Sharon's gray hairs in sorrow to the grave. He cannot sell any real estate without his signature, as the purchasers do not wish to take the chances on her dowerly interest. The Trustees of the Masonic Cemetery, in which Sharon caused the grave of one Olin to be opened, to get the shirt Althea placed there, have sued him for \$5,000 damages, for deserting their deceased brother. To get rid of the odious paper, Sharon has signed suit in the U. S. Circuit Court, and will begin to talk by Friday that "Jordan am a hard road to travel."

"Gath" says in a letter to the Cincinnati "Enquirer," that of all the prominent "Independents" who figured in the last Presidential campaign, as workers against Blaine, Carl Shurz is the only one who is seeking office under the incoming Administration. Gath has been told at Albany that Shurz wants to take care of the Interior Department again. But judging by the way the Grantman vote went in Ohio, where Shurz was supposed to have the most influence, he certainly cannot claim that Cleveland "owes" him anything.
