

No Election.

So far there has been no election of Senator. The ninth ballot has been taken with much the same result that has been noted before.

The Democrats, who are hopefully in the minority, continue to honor prominent members of their party by giving some new man the party vote each succeeding day, while the Republican vote is so hopelessly scattered, that no preference has been indicated so far. The long delay in so important an election is growing monotonous to the people of this state as there is not a section of it but is interested in other legislation, and one half of the session has already been consumed without anything having been accomplished of very great importance to the state.

He must be determined, in common with the people he represents, to guard every interest of this state against the insidious encroachments of corporate wealth that is seeking to swallow up our public domain, and by its grasping greed to drive back the tide of emigration that is being attracted hitherto by the undeveloped resources of our magnificent state. In our opinion, and we believe the popular vote of the state would sustain us in it, Hon. J. H. Mitchell, who so faithfully represented us for one term in the United States Senate, is the man that every interest of this state demands for the position. We do not claim for him the modern requisition of Senators, the questionable ones of speedily-gotten wealth, for he is known to the people of this state as comparatively a poor man, a man who did not spend the six years of his representation, in the doubtful service of corporations, and the degradation of personal wealth, but devoted the entire term of his office to the advancement of the interests of every portion of the state, and we point with pride to his record, to bear us out in the assertion. We hope Democrats will obliterate party lines and confer upon themselves the lasting gratitude of the people by uniting with Republicans in the election of J. H. Mitchell as our next senator.

The vote on Friday stood as follows: Judge Strahan, 36, Hirsch, 26, Hare, 12, Failing, 5, Williams, 4, Kelsey 2, Johnson, 1, George, 1. Absent, Carson. A break is expected to-day. Among the dark horses mentioned, and it now looks as if a horse of that color stands the best chance, are J. H. Mitchell, E. B. Watson, C. C. Beckman and Z. F. Moody. We're a pulling for the black horse.

The reports from the legislature for the week would indicate a considerable amount of routine and committee work, but no special act of importance has been completed. The bill for the regulation of freights and fares will probably be amended in several respects before it passes, if indeed it passes in any form. The committee on public buildings has before it a bill appropriating \$100,000 for completing the State House, and there will probably be an amount sufficient for the purpose appropriated. The Senatorial questions as undecided as ever, the Democrats casting complimentary votes for each of their favorite statesmen in regular order, while the Republicans divide their votes among half a dozen favorites. Hirsch of Portland leads, with 23 votes yesterday—just half enough to elect. No one can give any satisfactory guess at the final result.

Governor Squire, of Washington Territory, in urging the claim of that territory to the right of admission as a state, says the present population is 147,000, and the volume of immigration promises to continue undiminished. He says that this territory is the only political division on the coast, outside of the United States which remains in a territorial condition. Its foreign commerce requires ampler conditions of government. The presence of an English colony, growing rapidly prosperous, also affords another reason for admission. The settlement of riparian rights on Puget sound would be greatly facilitated under a state administration of the territory's affairs.

The Ashland Woolen Mills resumed work again this week after a short suspension.

O'Donovan Rossa Shot.

O'Donovan Rossa, the noted dynamiter, was shot on the second inst. by an English woman in New York City. Five shots were fired but only one took effect, that lodging in the back. The object of the shooting is thought to be in revenge for the London explosion. Jeremiah O'Donovan has been a conspicuous figure in Irish national affairs for years. He tackled on the word "Rossa," which in Gaelic means "red," after reaching this country. After having been discharged from an English prison he came to this country, with Thomas Francis Burk, Dr. Dennis, Dowling Mulcahy and John Davoy, about 1869. He was engaged in a number of enterprises in New York, having been ticket agent for the Transcontinental Co. of steamers and hotel keeper. He ran for State Senator in the fourth Senatorial district, against William M. Tweed, and was badly defeated. He opened a hotel at the corner of Chatham square and Mott street, which for while did a good business, being a great resort for Irish nationalists; custom fell off, after a time, and Rossa was compelled to shut up the place. He subsequently founded the "United Irishman," a radical dynamite organ, of which sheet he is the purported editor. O'Donovan is 53 years old, but is remarkably well preserved for his years. He has a wife and five children, and lived with his family at 23 Duryea street, Brooklyn.

President Taylor's Sunday Sermon.

SALT LAKE, Feb. 2.—President John Taylor spoke in the tabernacle yesterday. He referred to his recent trip and said the saints were being persecuted in Arizona, and sent to the American Siberia for living their religion. He spoke of the federal officers here as sneaks and tramps, intruding with processes from the courts into the homes of the people. This was hard to bear, and forbearance might cease to be a virtue. Yet he advised his hearers to stand it a little longer,—did not want blood to flow just yet. There would be a change before long. He wouldn't give up the law of God, so help him God, and the congregation shouted amen. Persecutions were making most saints think of going to a foreign country to preserve religious liberty. There might be another pilgrim's day. He said the saints were illegally punished at home and killed in the southern states. No one was punished for murdering missionaries. He intimated that all must be silent on what they knew, and thus thwart the wicked men who were persecuting the people.
