

Orators of the Senate.

The three most valuable senators, Beck, Morgan and Plumb, neither write or specially prepare their speeches, excepting to gather their facts. None of these three, however, make any claim to the possession of oratorical powers, though each is singular in one respect. Mr. Plumb is the most rapid speaker who has been in the senate for many years. He and senator Beck are the only men who over taxed Mr. Murphy's power as a stenographer to the fullest, and many think Mr. Murphy is the most rapid stenographer in the world. Mr. Plumb's words are emitted with terrific speed. He sometimes utters as many as 250 words in a minute. Mr. Beck, while scarcely less rapid, speaks less clearly than Mr. Plumb, so that his words sound just as the posts of a Virginia fence look to a man sitting at the window of a lightning express. Mr. Morgan's speech is rapid, flows as continuously as a running brook, with much the same pleasantly bubbling sound. He never prepares nor revises his speeches. They appear in the "Record" precisely as he delivers them, and yet Mr. Murphy says that he never yet has found in them an error of grammar or of diction, and that as specimens of pure, classic English they are unequalled by the speeches of any senator. Mr. Bayard does not read his speeches, but with exceptions almost all the others do. It did cause his Indiana friends some astonishment when Mr. Voorhees first unravelled his manuscript, but the custom is now confirmed with him. Mr. Pendleton, too, whose oratory used to be a delight to his Ohio friends, now reads his speeches. Mr. Bayard labors with a voice that is weak, almost effeminate; yet he is regarded as one of the most graceful speakers in the senate. He is more diffident in his style than some others, but no man's diction is superior to his. Mr. Bayard follows the traditions of the schools. His oratory and gestures are accurate, proper, and he never violates the rules in this respect. Mr. Vest is a flowery speaker. He has something of Mr. Carpenter's power of bedecking a legal argument with rhetorical flowers, and as he sometimes gets hot with conviction and the desire for impressing it, he seldom speaks without having the entire senate for listeners. Two of the most enterprising speakers of the senate are Logan and Ingalls, and for precisely opposite reasons. Logan is fierce, often when there seems to be no call for ferocity; Ingalls is cold as an icicle. Logan easily works up to white heat; no one ever saw Ingalls when he seemed to have an emotion. Logan wanders in his enthusiasm all over the fields of rhetoric, and sometimes gets mixed in his swamps. Ingalls is always classically correct. Logan is effective when delivering sledge-hammer blows, and absurd when he utters sarcasm. Ingalls never attempts to wield the sledge-hammer, but his sarcasm cuts as keenly, quickly and deeply as a Japanese harikari knife. Ingalls stands like a statue, like the zero point personified; Logan dances and prances over the chamber like a hot blooded savage at a war dance. Both of these men, however, are effective speakers, both command the attention of the senate and the galleries, and both effect their purpose in their speeches, for both make an impression.—"Philadelphia North American."

The Doctile American Horse.

It has long been accepted as a theory by our trans-Atlantic kinsmen that vice in animals is almost always the result of unkindness and maltreatment received by them from their human companions, and that the paucity of vicious horses in the United States is to be explained by the gentleness and, so to speak, the familiarity with which the noble animal is treated in every part of the Union. There can be little doubt that in no country is the intelligence of quadrupeds more developed and cultivated than in the United States, where it is well understood that by kindness alone can their characteristics, traits, dispositions, and qualities be fully drawn forth. Nothing is more common, for instance, than to see an American horse harnessed to a buggy and standing alone in New York—his master having entered a shop by the curbstone's edge, in the midst of the crush and turmoil of Broadway, one of the most crowded and noisy thoroughfares upon the face of the earth. Before descending from his buggy the master says a word or two to his horse, and leaves him standing in the street without restraint. The sagacious animal, whose eyes are not shielded by blinkers, and who is not tormented by a Procrustean bearing-rein, understands perfectly that he is expected to wait until his master has transacted his business; and wait, accordingly, he does, sometimes for hours at a time, and without regard to the winter's cold or summer's heat.

Again, in the wildest parts of the western and southern states, there is not a farmer who thinks anything of driving his horses by night over a wooden bridge full of holes, caused by many planks having been dropped into the stream beneath. The careful beast, who may or may not have crossed the bridge on many previous occasions, feels his way in the darkness, and his head having been surrendered to him by the driver, steps as carefully and with as much precision as a dancing master. Whenever, indeed, a horse is found to be possessed of a violent, or to use an old Yorkshire word, a "mischaney," temper in the United States, the odds are in favor of his having been imported from abroad.

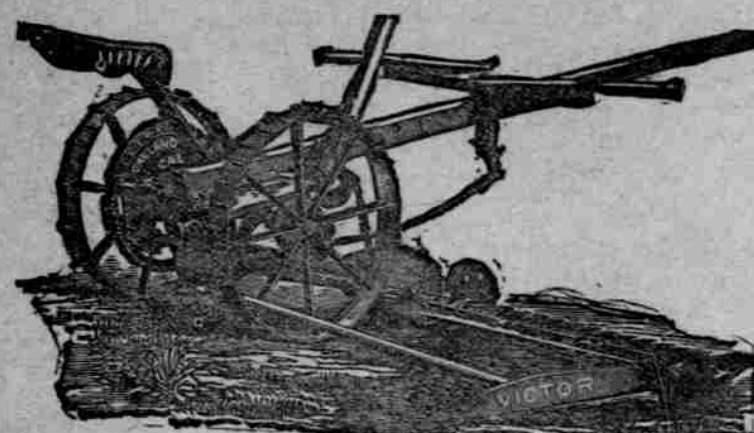
