HOUSE BILLS.

No. 46, by Montanya, for the payment of Jason Wheeler for services in the Cayuse war. No. 151, by Cameron, Medford charter. No. 184, by Bilyeu, Junction City charter. No. 172, by Lyle, Dallas City charter. No. 65, by Bilyeu, to amend sections 306 and 307, chapter 28, title 1, Civil Code. No. 102, by Black, amending the mortgage tax law. No. 86, by Leinenweber, amending section 59, title 5, Miscellaneous Laws establishing a uniform course of instruction. No. 14, by Bourne, registry law. No. 139, by Porter, amending laws in relation to bridges. No. 66, by Keady, regulating the liquor traffic. No. 129, by Montanya, appropriating \$2,000 for a stone for the Washington monument. No. 115, by Gilbert, exempting firemen and exempt firemen of Volunteer Departments from jury duty and road and poll tax. No. 156, by Leinenweber, to create a boatman at Astoria, with authority to serve a process. No. 88, by Cole, to define the boundary of Columbia county. No. 202, by Story, to amend section 24, title 2, chapter 7. No. 129, by Kenworthy, to amend the Fire Department laws of East Portland. No. 8, by Lewis, authorizing the Dailies to sell certain property. No. 125, by Cameron, for the relief of A. W. Presley. No. 205, by Bilyeu, regulating proceedings in Justice Courts. No. 62, by Mayo, providing compensation for Assessors in Multnomah county, to take the census in 1885. No. 229, by Kenworthy, amending the Portland charter. No. 228, by Ways and Means Committee, general appropriation bill. No. 1, by Bilyeu, to make Drain Academy a State Normal School. No. 47, by Cox, amending the charter of Pendleton. No. 143, by Burton, amending the charter of Halsey. No. 41, by Nelson, to incorporate the town of Lafayette. No. 160, session of 1882, prohibiting the deposit, directly or indirectly, of any fish offal or any other offal from any fish stand or other source in the Willamette river or lake, or any of their tributaries. This bill was vetoed by Governor Moody on the ground that it was unconstitutional. The representatives from Eastern Oregon insisted that the water from the lake and river referred to was used for domestic purposes, and that it was being polluted by the deposit of putrid animal matter. The bill was readily passed over the Governor's veto at the beginning of the present session. No. 142, by Gilbert, making an appropriation of \$5,000 for salaries of Commissioners for Oregon at the World's Fair at New Orleans and for other expenses. No. 78, by Dick, amending the charter of La Grande, Union county, so as to include what is called the new town. No. 91, by Cox, providing for the building of an extension to the main building of the Penitentiary; completion of the hall intended for the House of Representatives; the section of a brick or stone wall around the Penitentiary, and the completion of the State Capitol. The work is to be done under the supervision of a Board of Commissioners, composed of the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer, and is to be done by contract in the order named. Money for the purpose is to be raised by a one and a half mill tax, which the bill levies. No. 97, by Cassner, amending the charter of Newport, Benton county. No. 100, by Cox, amending the charter of Weston, Umatilla county.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIALS.

No. 1, making provision for lost receipts of Governor Chadwick et al. This allows a credit of \$1088 on the judgment held by the State against Grover, Chadwick and Brown, that much money having been accounted for by the discovery of receipts which had been misplaced. No. 3, providing for the distribution and exchange of Oregon Reports with other States. No. 1, by Leinenweber, to members of Congress, urging an appropriation for the improvement of Tillamook bay. No. 2, by Cox, to the members of Congress, urging the forfeiture of lands granted to the Northern Pacific Railroad Company lying in Umatilla county. It is claimed that the railroad lands embrace a portion of the best part of that county, and moreover, the provisions of the grant have never been complied with, so that the land is withheld from settlement. No. 5, by Sutton, asking Congress for an appropriation to continue work on the harbor of refuge at Port Orford. No. 9, by Keady, urging Congress to open the locks and canal at Oregon City to the public use. SENATE BILLS. No. 71, by Bilyeu, amending the charter of Albany. No. 116, by Siglin, amending the charter of Empire City, Coos county, passed February 24. No. 35, by Bilyeu, to appropriate lands in aid of the Yakima Railroad; passed February 21. The bill extends the land grant from the State. No. 137, by Simon, to reduce fees in criminal cases in Multnomah county. The bill limits the fees of witnesses in the Circuit Court to \$2 per day, and in the Justice Court to \$1.50, with mileage; but no witness living within two miles of the Court to which he is summoned shall receive either fee or mileage. No. 135, by Cauthorn, making provision for the Agricultural College at Corvallis; passed February 6th. This bill takes the college out of the hands of the Methodist Church and places it under control of a State Board of Regents. No. 4, by Siglin, asking Congress for a further appropriation for the improvement of Yaquina bay. No. 28, by Cartwright, to create the county of Gilliam, from that portion of Wasco, north and east of the John Day river. No. 52, by Lee, Dallas charter. No. 23, by Prim, Jacksonville charter. No. 76, by Bilyeu, amending the school law. No. 149, by Simon, to regulate the manner of pleading ordinances. No. 70, by Emmet, prohibiting swine running at large. No. 103, by Voorless, to pay Territorial warrant No. 100, in favor of Col. Shiel, for \$250 for services. No. 111, by Hare, to provide a State pilot boat at the Columbia bar. No. 107, by Hare, Hillsboro charter. No. 112, by Burch, Amity charter. No. 134, by Davesport, Silverton charter. No. 143, by Cauthorn, Yaquina City charter. A special to the "Oregonian" dated Salem, February 23d, gives the following: Governor Moody is of the opinion that the legislature is not legally adjourned, owing to informality, and that the members, if they choose to do so, could meet in legal assembly tomorrow. This opens up several interesting questions. Has the governor the right to appoint a senator while the legislature is legally in session? The constitution provides that all laws in which a time is not fixed for their coming into effect shall become law of the land thirty days after adjournment. The question is, if the legislature is not adjourned, when will bills adopted go into effect? These questions open a wide field for speculation, and little else has been talked about at the state house to-day. It is suggested that in this emergency the governor can declare the session at an end, but there is neither authority nor precedent for this.
