

The Next Senate.

The terms of twenty-five senators expire on the 4th of March. Of these twenty-two have been re-elected or their successors have been chosen. Twelve of these are Democrats and ten Republicans. Six Republicans have been re-elected—Platt of Connecticut, Allison of Iowa, Ingalls of Kansas, Jones of Nevada, Cameron of Pennsylvania and Merrill of Vermont. Hill of Colorado will be succeeded by Secretary Teller, Lapham of New York by William M. Everts, and Cameron of Wisconsin by John C. Spooner. Seven Democratic senators have been re-elected—Pugh of Alabama, Call of Florida, Brown of Georgia, Voorhees of Indiana, Vest of Missouri, Vance of North Carolina, and Hampton of South Carolina. Walker of Arkansas is succeeded by James K. Jones; Farley of California by Leland Stanford, Republican; Williams of Kentucky by Representative Blackburn; Jones of Louisiana by Rustie; Greene of Maryland by E. K. Wilson, and Pendleton of Ohio by Henry B. Payne.

With a Republican senator from this state and a Republican yet to be chosen from New Hampshire, if Illinois should elect a Republican, the senate will stand forty-two Republicans to thirty-four Democrats. The Republicans gain as much in the weight and influence of their men as in numbers. Mr. Everts is worth half a dozen smaller spirits. Secretary Teller, it is said, will be, after Senator Edmunds, the best authority on strictly constitutional matters in the senate. Leland Stanford is a man of mind and will, as well as of enormous wealth, and will be more influential than his predecessor. Spooner is brilliant, and is sure to make his reputation in the senate. If John A. Logan should win in Illinois, we should have such a phalanx of strong men on the Republican side in the senate as has not been seen for many a day. At all events, the prospect is far from discouraging, and the Republican party is to be congratulated, not only upon the power which it will hold, in the possession of the senate, but upon the men to whom the party has intrusted that power.

A Young Lady Buried Alive.

SPRINGFIELD, W. Va., Feb. 13.—Mary Cox, while suffering from neuralgia of the stomach, was given morphine in excess of what was prescribed by the attending physician, and her death was announced a few hours afterwards. Two days later the body was buried. At the funeral one lady insisted that Miss Cox was not dead and begged that a physician be sent for. That night the dogs of a man living near the graveyard stationed themselves near the tomb and kept up a persistent howling. Next day the grave was opened, and to the horror of all it was found that the girl had been buried alive. The lining was torn from the sides of the coffin, and the pillow was in shreds. The poor girl had literally stripped the clothes from her body. Her arms and hands were torn and bleeding, her lips were bitten through and handfuls of hair were torn from her head. The girl had come to life, and evidently made a fearful struggle to escape. The awful affair fills the community with horror.

The recent dynamite explosion in the house of commons demonstrated the fact that under existing rules governing admission of strangers to galleries and lobbies of the houses of parliament, it will be an easy matter for dynamiters to convey explosives into the buildings during a session of parliament, and cause the death of many of its members. The government has decided to adopt more stringent rules regarding admission of visitors, and members of parliament in future will not be allowed to introduce strangers in the galleries and lobbies. The speaker of the house of commons alone will have the right of granting tickets to visitors, and he will only issue tickets of admission to visitors, and he will only issue tickets to members for their friends, after having received a week's notice, so that in the meantime the antecedents of the proposed visitors can be inquired into. Turnstiles will be erected at the entrance to the galleries and lobbies, and experienced detectives be placed at each turnstile to carefully scrutinize strangers.

The St. Paul Pioneer Press published three columns telling about the blockade, last month and was very severe on some people connected with the O. R. & N. Co. to shield N. P. R. officials no doubt. This long winded mass of spite had no effect save to give the impression that the road was blockaded still and to drive nine tenths of the travel to take the Oregon Short Line, which wasn't the intention. 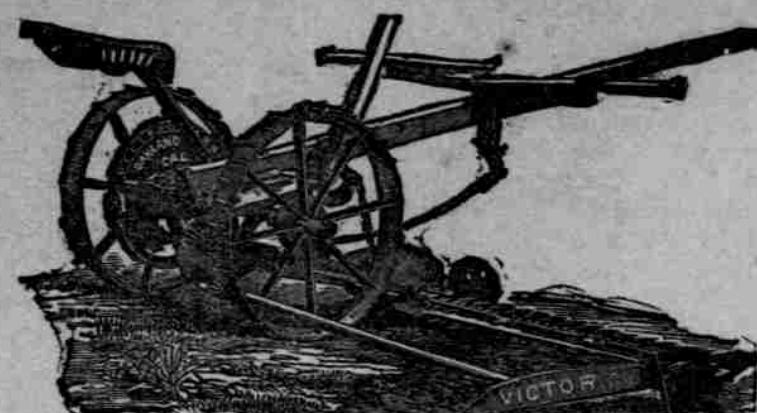
