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How to Improve Young Women.

A primal defect in our social life is the notion that girls have nothing to do. Boys are brought up to some employment, but girls to none, except what pecuniary want compels them.

The faculty that is "well off" has busy boys and idle girls. The young man, after eating his breakfast, starts out to his daily occupation and returns at the close of the day.

After her breakfast (usually at a late hour), saunters about in quest of amusement. Novels, gossip, shopping, (for unnecessary trid-), dressing in three or four different costumes, formal visiting, drawing (if able), and lounging are the elements of the young woman's day.

In the evening, by way of recreation (if she goes to the theater or ball. This unequal discipline of the sexes is the basis of innumerable evils. It makes the girl careless and self-bit turns her mind to personal adornment and other frivolous matters as the great concern of life; it takes away the sense of probability, and produces feebleness and disease in her constitution.

It also prevents her from asserting her true dignity in the eyes of man; for the life of idleness is alone dignified. Women thus brought up in idleness are looked upon by men very much as were the women of the old dark times of the world, as mere playthings, expensive toys, not as counselors and friends.

Marriage in such circumstances belongs to the low sensual plane, and the girl is prepared neither in body or mind for the serious responsibilities and lofty duties which marriage implies.

Her training, moreover, or lack of training, has made it necessary for a long purse to apply for her. Economy, helpfulness, co-operation--these are not coming to the new household from this vain source.

Dresses, drives, entertainments--these will form the staple demands on the young husband. Accordingly, in the city life, where this class of young women is chief, a young man is (gracely to his hurt) kept from marrying by reason of its costliness, whereas, society should be so ordered that marriage would help the harder and not beggar it.

We want simplicity of life, frugality, modesty, industry and system. If we could introduce these virtues in our higher society, we should diminish the despair, envy, jealousy, and the lickings wretchedness, and divorces of the married. Let our girls have as regular daily duties as our boys. Let idleness be forbidden them.

Let recreation be indulged recreation, at proper times and in proper quantities. Let us open more numerous avenues of female industry, and let every woman be clothed with the dignity of a useful life.

Can such a reformation be brought about? My dear madame, begin it yourself. Rule your household on this principle. Have the courage to defy the fashion where it opposes. Be a bold leader of this reform, and you will see a host of followers glad to escape from the old folly.--Rev. Dr. Howard Crosby in Dio Lewis' Monthly.

Tilden's Critical Condition.

A New York correspondent of the Chicago "Tribune" declares that Tilden's hold on life is almost as precarious as that of Grant. Recently the Sage of Greystone has resigned the governorship of three large stock companies, in which he is heavily interested; his noble mansion in Gramercy Park has remained under the care of a watchman since last September; his steam yacht, which was fitted up for a cruise to the West Indies, has been lying at the wharf and its owner has not even been aboard of it.

The fact is, rumor declares, Samuel J. Tilden will never leave his country seat on the Hudson alive. His intimate friends, like John Bigelow, will go in to raptures over the keenness of Tilden's intellect, but they will not count themselves in regard to his physical condition any more than they would before the Chicago convention.

The natural inference drawn from his long absence from New York and his complete retirement this winter is that his health has broken and that he cannot last much longer. He has often been compared to Alexander H. Stephens in his tenacious hold on life when from all appearances he had only a few weeks of life left, and there is strong similarity between the two men in physique. But Tilden has never allowed himself the rest which the Georgia statesman obtained on his required plantation. Until within a few months Tilden has directed all his large business affairs, as well as looked after the interests of the Democratic party. This exertion of his Presidential campaign, the wearing suspense which followed it, the investigation of the cipher dispatches--all these were sufficient to break down a strong man. They found Tilden physically weak and they left him with shattered health, but with intellect as keen and vigorous as on the day when he started in to break up the Erie Canal ring.

The labor that he has done since, has been a fine example of the force of mind and will over the body. Even now there is no Democrat in the country who has so much influence as he over the new Administration. Taken altogether, he is one of the phenomenal men of his age, and his life furnishes a curious study of the possibilities in the way of career which are open to a man who possesses the shrewdness of a fine legal mind, with no moral scruples to distract him from the pursuit of wealth and power.

Given a firm will and high moral courage and Tilden could have played a part in the history of the party which is so proud of him second only to Jefferson.

A number of stock raisers in the vicinity of Walla Walla, W. T., have clubbed together to this week send ten car loads of horses to Chicago, via the Northern Pacific. It is only an experiment, but is not attended with much risk. The market on this coast is very dull now, and the better prices likely to be obtained east will overcome the freight charges, which are understood to be about \$300 a car. The same stock raisers are making arrangements to ship a train load, 20 cars, of cattle to Chicago. They have several fine bands, and the highest price obtainable at present is 3 1/2 cents, while the same quality of cattle is worth from 5 1/2 to 6 cents in Chicago. The cost of transportation including feed en route, will be within 1 1/2 cents per pound. There is ample provision all along the Northern Pacific for watering stock (live stock) and in Montana and Dakota numerous large corrals have been provided, where cattle can be unloaded and refreshed. The journey will take up from nine to ten days.
