

Presentation.

On last sabbath Rev. A. R. Bickenbach preached by special appointment to the children at 2:30 P. M. After a few preliminary remarks on the encouraging progress of the Sunday school work, Rev. A. R. Bickenbach on behalf of the friends and children of the Sunday school presented Father Hoffman the "Bible Galaxy" in the following address:

My Dear Mr. Hoffman. Such an occasion as the present, the first one in the history of the school—cannot pass without some reference to the continued interest you have taken in the Sabbath school work. For over twenty years you have labored earnestly in this place in the work of instructing the young in God's word. As your mind runs over that time, you perceive that nearly one generation has passed away and the children you were privileged and pleased to instruct have grown to manhood and womanhood and carry with them the teachings of former years. By the blessing of God your example has been as influential as your instruction. For over twenty years, on almost every Sabbath day, the fathers and mothers of this place have seen, walking down the familiar streets, one man who was interested in the future welfare of their children. For over twenty years the young men have had the example of one man loving the truth for the truth's sake and constantly maintaining the dignity of the Sabbath school. For over twenty years the children and their teachers have seen one enter the Sabbath school room, whom they have learned to respect and to venerate. How far that example has entered into their lives as an ennobling influence it is impossible for me to state who has been so short a time as I on the field. That that influence may still continue to grow is the earnest prayer of us all until it shall at last meet once more the merits of the labor. For work that has been so willingly, conscientiously and zealously performed, and conducted with such painstaking and self-denying efforts, merits more than human thanks, and will one day receive the applaud from a tribunal, more august, more grand, more solemn than can be found upon earth. That the Divine Father may continue to bless that influence and grant you health and strength for further usefulness is the wish of all those who have gathered here to-day. Your one object during all those years was to teach God's word; your great pleasure has been to study Bible lessons. With you that pleasure will never dim, and therefore it has been the wish of the friends of the Sabbath school to present to you this afternoon—as an expression of their gratitude as well as a testimonial of their esteem—"The Bible Galaxy" through the illustrious artist, Gustave Dore. Through his illustrations the Bible scenes have a keener interest and a greater relief, in the years the Master still allots to you. Kindly accept this gift with the respect and veneration of us all.

When the venerable recipient arose, and in a voice tremulous with emotions expressed his thanks for this unexpected testimonial of the high esteem of pastor, parents and children, many were affected to tears. Mr. Hoffman during his long residence with us has embellished his public and private life with all the characteristics of a courteous christian gentleman, and this expression of the good will of his co-laborers, in the Sunday school, is in perfect accord with the sentiment of this entire community. May he live long to enjoy the well earned fruits of his faithful labor.

Immigration News.

Immigrants by steamers from California are put into possession of Oregon State Board literature at Astoria, says the "Oregonian," and by this means are guided where they can find accurate and interesting information.

The immigrants who visited the rooms of the State board on Saturday, and were ticketed to points in this state, brought more than \$40,000 worth in cash or bank notes.

Thirty-eight immigrants visited the rooms of the State Board of Immigration yesterday. The secretary ticketed most of them to points in central region. A party of Germans went to Lebanon.

At the rooms of the State Board of Immigration there is an unusually great demand for farming property located in Western Oregon. It will be a great assistance to the secretary of the board, Mr. Carlisle, if those having farms for sale in this or any other section of the state will make a short record of the land and send it in. The work performed by the board is wholly gratuitous. In a short time the secretary will issue another list of farms for sale for distribution, and those who send now will have the advantage of this wide-reaching advertisement.

Among the Germans arriving by the train from St. Paul yesterday was Jacob Bors, who, through Elder Bowersox of Salem, bought and paid for a fine farm near Lebanon, Linn county, before he left his native soil. A great many families will follow Mr. Bors from his part of the German empire.

Immigration Matters.

The County Board of Immigration met in Jacksonville, last Wednesday afternoon. Present, Messrs. Wisley, (chairman) Peterson, Daley, Pennebaker and Maury. The board effected an organization by appointing G. A. Hubbell as temporary secretary. Several topics were discussed, the most important being the printing and circulation of a pamphlet setting forth the resources of the county. It was resolved that the secretary be instructed to notify the people of the several towns in Jackson county that the board will consider proposals for establishing its office, the town offering the greatest inducements as to free office rent etc., to have the preference. The board is unfolding its plans for inducing immigration as follows:

A certain amount of printing is to be done, so as to reach the greatest possible number of readers, whereby they may become instructed as to the advantages of this section. Second, an exhibit of the agricultural and mineral products and woods of the county is to be created, which will be on view in the rooms of the board. This exhibit will embrace wheat and other cereals, root products, fruit, etc., and will be accompanied with maps of the county. Files of local newspapers will also be kept there.

It will be seen that the board intend to go into the thing with thoroughness and effect. It is worth while for Jacksonville to put forth an effort to secure the location of the board at this place. There will necessarily be a great number of inquiring immigrants who will visit the rooms in order to make themselves familiar with the situation, and these may as well be brought here as not. The county court house has vacant apartments well adapted to such a use and a decree of the county court would set them apart for this valuable use.

In regard to printing pamphlets, we are informed that a Portland publishing house has made a proposition to print 20,000 copies of an extended and detailed description of the county, of which the board is asked to purchase 5,000 at figures surprisingly low. Such a chance should not be lost.

An instrument is now in use in the Secretary of State's office, by which the taxes of any amount can be told, from a small sum to millions of dollars, without making a figure, and the work can be done by almost any one which has heretofore required the service of an expert in figures. Interest, at all ordinary rates, can also be computed instantly.

The Northern Pacific Co. is receiving bids for the construction of one of the largest tunnels on this continent, the Cascade tunnel, which will be 9,800 feet in length. The machinery and material for constructing this tunnel will cost \$100,000.
