DEPARTMENT PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, SALEM, OGN., June 13, 1885.

The State Teachers Association will convene at Astoria Monday evening, July 6th, and continue in session July 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th.

All teachers and friends of education are cordially invited to attend and aid in promoting and developing the educational work of our State.

An excellent programme is being prepared, and will be published at an early day. Prominent teachers and lecturers from our colleges and leading public schools will be present and take part in the exercises of the Association.

Arrangements have been made by which all persons attending the Association and paying full fare over the East and West Side Divisions of the Oregon and California Railway to Portland, will be entitled to return tickets at eighty (80) per cent. off from regular fare to destination.

Arrangements have been made with the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company for excursion rates of two dollars and fifty (\$2.50) per person from Portland to Astoria and return.

The Oregon Railway and Navigation Company's excursion steamers will leave Ash street dock, Portland, at 6 o'clock a. m. for Astoria, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, July 6th, 7th and 8th, at which time round trip tickets may be purchased at the Ash street office.

By special arrangement, the return time on the Oregon and California Railway has been extended so as to include Thursday, July 16th, and by special arrangement the excursion rates on the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company's steamers will be good to return to Portland until September 30th.

This will enable persons from different parts of the State attending the Association to remain and visit the seacoast at they desire.

Thursday, July 9th, will be devoted to excursions to Fort Stevens, Fort Canby, Ilwaco, Young's River Falls, and other points of interest. For this purpose arrangements have been made with Captain J. H. D. Gray, of the Ilwaco Steam Navigation Company, to furnish transportation on that company's steamers.

The leading hotels in Astoria will make liberal reductions, and the hospitable citizens of that city have arranged to entertain the visiting teachers during the days of the Association.

J. W. Nesmith's Death.

Ex Senator J. W. Nesmith died at his home in Deser, Polk county, at noon Wednesday. He had been ill for some time and his death was not unexpected. J. W. Nesmith was born in Washington county, Maine, July 23, 1820; he removed in youth to New Hampshire in 1838, thence to Ohio, thence to Missouri, and in 1843 to this State coming with the Applegate party. He was elected a Supreme Judge for the Territory at the election of June 3, 1847. He took a riant part in the Cayuse war of 1848 and was Captain of Company G, Oregon Volunteers. At the election of June 22, 1848, he was elected a representative to the State Legislature from Polk county. Shortly after Captain Nesmith, as he was then called, led an exploring band southward through the dangerous Indian country of Southern Oregon, seeking for a practicable route to California. He ran for delegate to Congress in 1849, and was defeated by Samuel R. Thurston, and in 1852 was elected Treasurer for Polk county. In 1853, he was appointed United States Marshal for Oregon, in which capacity he served until 1855. In the Yakima war of 1855 he served the country in connection with General Phil. Sheridan, who had command of a small force of United States Regulars. In 1861-'67 he was United States Senator from Oregon, his colleague being Colonel E. D. Baker, who was killed at the battle of Bull's Bluff. General Nesmith's residence has been at Deser for many years where he farmed on a large scale, and kept house in the old style of hospitality and welcome.

Senator Nesmith was noted for his keen wit and humor, and some of his humorous sayings had a national reputation. He was a typical pioneer, and one of the foremost figures of the early settlers of this State who are rapidly passing away. It is to be regretted that the latter part of the life of this brilliant man was clouded by a diseased mind.

Quartz Prospecting at Woodville.

JACKSONVILLE: EDITOR OF THE SENTINEL:—I promise you at no distant day, I would give you a description of some of the ledges that were being prospecting in this locality.

About 18 months ago, while I was hunting, I picked up some favorable looking quartz, and after looking some time I found the ledge and gave a party interest to put on the first year's assessment. After working some time and the ledge seeming broken, work was suspended and nothing has been done with it since. I received assay from J. H. Fisk of this rock, none less than \$40, and some as high as \$150 to the ton carrying some silver. About the same time Dr. Sturdney and W. J. Stanley located what is known here as the old copper lode 1 1/2 miles below Woodville. This is what is called a true fissure vein lying between proph and slate. Though the ore is not high grade it is no doubt he a paying mine, as it is from 8 to 10 feet wide, some of the best ore assays 25 per cent. copper, and 20 in gold and silver. This ledge runs about 10 degrees east of north. Having received information from T. D. Jervitt last spring during his stay in Woodville, that some rich silver ore had been found in this locality, I encouraged O. Boyd an old Colorado prospector to spend some time looking for the ledge. He soon found some good float ore and a small vein running 100 oz in silver. After looking at the ground, he located on a ledge running quartzing across the small vein. The ledge is called the Oliver Boyd and runs 20 degrees west of north, and lies between proph and granite, and the owners think they have a bonanza. The Little Galena owned by Otto Lind H. Kinney and others is about 1 1/2 miles west from the Boyd claim and runs nearly north and south and assays from \$25 to \$50, in gold and silver to the ton. On upper Gravel creek about 20 miles from Woodville, the Blalock Bros. have a large and promising ledge running N. W. and S. E. The assay shows 20 per cent. copper and from \$8 to \$16 in gold and silver. Samples of ore from these ledges can be seen at T. T. McKenzie's of your town. Any information we can give you of present and not of past prospects will be gladly furnished.

Hon. Singer Hermann, Congressman-elect, is preparing to make a tour of the State to familiarize himself with its people and interests. He will start from Jacksonville in about two weeks, going across Klamath and Lake counties into Grant, through Eastern Oregon, along the Columbia into Portland, thence along the coast and the valley. He will stop at all the principal points, examine the mines, Indian reservations and see just what rivers and harbors need improvement. The Congressman elect will ride behind his own team and the trip will consume most of the summer. Mr. Hermann has already been to Washington and has become acquainted with most of the Senators and Congressmen of other States, and he is now to familiarize with Oregon and its interests. He proposes to go to Washington as a walking lexicon of Oregon and its resources.—"Register."
